The ASA hosts an Annual Meeting each year to foster networks of Africanist scholars and practitioners, provide access to path-breaking research and key debates in African Studies, and to promote a better understanding of Africa.

The ASA Annual Meeting is the largest gathering of Africanist scholars in the world. Paper Proposal

The paper abstract should consist of a statement about the topic, the nature and extent of the research on which the paper is based, and a brief summary of the main argument(s) (a maximum of 200 words). Both panels will be constructed of four papers, and will be chaired by a senior scholar of the African Studies Association. All paper proposals must be submitted via this [form](#).

Selected participants will be notified by the African Studies Association, and the ASA will coordinate all travel and lodging accommodations to ensure participation in the conference. Please note that all costs of participation (air fare, per diem, lodging, and registration) will be covered for accepted participants. If papers are co-authored and selected for one of the panels, only one individual will be eligible for funding from the ASA to attend the Annual Meeting. ***Please note: Individuals that have previously been awarded an ASA Presidential Fellowship or a CUNY Fellowship to attend the ASA Annual meeting are not eligible for the 2019 CUNY Fellowship.***

Pipeline for Emerging African Studies Scholars Workshop

All selected participants will also attend the *African Studies Review* Pipeline for Emerging African Studies Scholars (PEASS) Workshop, which will be held Wednesday, November 20, immediately preceding the Annual Meeting. The *African Studies Review* (ASR) convenes PEASS Workshops in collaboration with the African Studies Association (USA) to stimulate, solicit, and further develop high quality journal submissions from emerging scholars of African studies under the mentorship of senior Africanists. Emerging scholars will have an opportunity to work closely with senior scholars to re-work a pre-circulated draft article.
