Pastor's Report 2018

The Apostle Paul was a master encourager of the communities he loved. One of my favorite notes comes from Philippians 1:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ.

Sincerity, gratitude and trust are the hallmarks of Paul's words and describe my thoughts and feelings as I write this final Pastor's Report.

Sincerity: An often repeated folk etymology proposes that "sincere" is derived from the Latin *sine* = without, *cera* = wax. In the ancient world, dishonest merchants would use wax to hide defects, such as cracks, in their pottery so that they could sell their merchandise at a higher price. More reputable merchants would hang a sign over their pottery — *sine cera* (without wax) — to inform customers that their merchandise was genuine.

Over these many years we have tried to be kind, understanding and even polite and we have also had the courage (sometimes painfully) to speak the truth in love. (Ephesians 4:15 "But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ.") Though we have not grown in numbers we have grown in depth. We have learned to speak the truth that all people—**ALL PEOPLE**—have a place at the Lord's table and are accepted in our beloved community. The recently developed welcome statement is a courageous and SINCERE expression of this truth.

Gratitude: I cannot possibly name all I am grateful for after almost 18 years of life and work together. We have lived through a lot. I am grateful for the countless words of encouragement that you have spoken to me when I felt a little down. I am grateful for those who have prompted me to pay more attention to important tasks I let slide or to people who needed a bit more care. The bottom line is we need each other... you were there for me as your pastor as I tried to be for you. For this and for much more I thank my God every time I remember you.

Trust: Though the challenges we face as a global community, a Church, and a particular community are great, I know, as the negro spiritual proclaims:

We shall overcome, we shall overcome We shall overcome some day **Oh, deep in my heart, I do believe** We shall overcome some day

Though I am called to leave this community I will always cherish you in the deepest places of my heart and know... really knowing that, "the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ." As another verse of the Spiritual affirms, I look forward to the day when:

We'll walk hand in hand, we'll walk hand in hand We'll walk hand in hand some day Oh, deep in my heart, I do believe We'll walk hand in hand some day.

The Session of the Forked River Presbyterian Church operates under a unicameral system. Session members are elected to serve as both Elders and Trustees. The Elders, in participation with the Pastor, are responsible for the congregational and ecclesiastical aspects of the church's life. The Trustees are responsible for administering the corporate business of the church.

The Reverend Dr. Terry L. Chapman is our Pastor; he also serves as Moderator of our Session. He has been our Pastor since 2001, and serves as spiritual leader of the congregation, as well as the head of staff. In that capacity, he supervises the activities of six part-time (6) paid employees. He also resources all of the Session Committees and Small Group Communities.

The Session usually consists of twelve (12) ruling Elders and one Youth Elder. The makeup of the Session at the beginning of January 2018 was four (4) male and eight (8) female Elders and one Youth Elder. Elder Joe Mathis served as the President of the Board of Trustees. Kelly Tripet served as the Treasurer. Elder Lynne Zahumeny served as Clerk of Session until December 2018. Elder John Czekaj served as Clerk of Session going forward.

Four Elders are elected each year for a three (3) year term. They replace a class of four (4) Elders who are completing a three (3) year term. Elders may serve two consecutive three-year terms. The Youth Elder is elected annually for a one-year term and may be elected so succeed him/herself for a second term.

Christian Education — Annual Report 2018

Jennifer Jeremiah and Kelly Fitzpatrick currently lead our Sunday School team at FRPC. The Sunday School is doing well and continues to surprise us each year despite the changes that have taken place. This year we lost two great teachers and changed the way we separate our children on Sunday mornings.

This year we utilized the REMIND App to request parents/congregants to assist in substitutes as well as combining classes on days when a teacher was absent. A list of substitutes is maintained to ensure teachers are available on an "as needed" basis.

Pastor Terry continued to serve the Sunday school Communion on the first Sunday of each month in Fetherman Hall. This is the third year doing this and the children, teachers, and parents that participate absolutely love it.

In 2018 we had approximately 67 children registered for Sunday school with an average attendance of 25 each week. These numbers are representative of the entire Sunday school.

The Jr. & Sr. High was led by Kelly Fitzpatrick. This class continues to thrive. Overall attendance in Sunday school is good but this class typically has about 10-18 youth that attend. Kelly provides a safe environment where these teens receive a strong foundation to help prepare those for Confirmation Class.

Confirmation Class meets in the Jr. & Sr. High class room each Sunday. In 2018 we had six confirmands who were all approved by the Session to join the church. In addition to their weekly class with Kelly Fitzpatrick, they met once a month with their mentors and parents for additional instruction, open discussion, and fellowship. Parents will be invited to assist throughout the year going forward with fundraising activities which assists in getting them more involved in this ever so special process.

The VBS program this summer was quite a success. This past summer we participated in "Ship Wrecked" and were able to use other church's VBS materials as they too were participating in Ship Wrecked curriculum. This resulted in a significant savings for FRPC CE. The team has already begun taking the first steps in preparing for VBS 2019. We were able to offer a week of music, crafts, games, and Christian fun to 40 registered children at no cost.

Our Youth Group program continues to flourish under the leadership of: Kelly Fitzpatrick, Steve Lundy, and Tadd Maffucci. These caring volunteers are the driving force behind what has become a cohesive, successful, and growing program. Participation is open to youth at FRPC and also those in the local community. Attendance on any given Sunday evening can be as many as 20 young people, Girls Only (GO) is lead by Kelly and attracts a significant number of girls to this meeting.

Youth group activities are as diverse as the group itself. In addition to Sunday evening meetings that include Bible study, discussions and games, the youth are involved in fund raisers, mission trips, and social outings. It should be noted that the youth are willing and able to volunteer and assist in other active FRPC groups as needed.

This past October, CE partnered with Isabel Orriss from Hunger Action Team and participated in a mini-CROP Walk. We raised \$278 in 2018 and were fortunate enough to have been under the guidance of Rev. Hank Lay, Coordinator of Toms River CROP walk. The children loved the event and look forward to next October to do it again.

This years' Christmas Pageant was a bit different than years past but it came together nicely and the children did an amazing job. We used the Christmas story from the children's bible used in Sunday School and was spearheaded by myself, Janine Popovich and Jennifer Jeremiah. We were strongly supported by many other members including Kelly Fitzpatrick, Wendi Massaro, Erica Dudley, Tammy Bacon, Heidi Hilinski, parents of participants, Al Siecke and Jacob Pray among others in our congregation. We were blessed to be given 12+ new angel wings, donated by Erica Dudley.

It has been my pleasure to serve as Chair to Christian Education. It is necessary to point out that Jennifer Jeremiah does so much that often goes unnoticed for our Sunday School. She puts in several hours weekly and is here Sunday mornings to make sure our Sunday School runs smoothly. Our lovely team at FRPC in the Christian Ed department couldn't survive without the commitment and support of these special people.

BUILDINGS & GROUNDS COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT 2018

Our main goal again this year and going forward in 2019 is to continue to focus on short term repairs and long term challenges of maintaining the church buildings and grounds at a reasonable cost. We have negotiated contracts with at least ten local contractors/vendors to do active and preventative work and find and repair problems before a breakdown is incurred. Also, we have people on call for us at FRPC. Some of their contracts were re-negotiated to get a better price for the same service.

Listed below are some of the projects completed in three different areas of the church complex—C=Church/Sanctuary; F=Fetherman Hall; B=Both church and Fetherman Hall:

- C New wall light fixtures installed in ladies and men's rooms
- C Estimates to repair two sets of front steps and railings
- C Change and re-size light bulbs inside Hallway & Sanctuary
- C New flag installed, old one to Elks to be retired
- C Mold inspection by Atlantic Mold and Quality First Basement Systems
- C Repair broken Lacey MUA water meter
- C Installed new battery in Defibrillator
- C Replaced two steel basement doors which had rotted off their hinges(As per State Fire Inspector)
- C MAJOR project to clean out basement ON GOING
- F Replace high outside security light bulbs to LED white lights
- F Wash, strip, wax all vinyl tile floors including the hallway and Sunday School office
- F Worked for a better Dumpster schedule(Tuesday: Garbage; Friday: Recycling)
- F Replace and repair frozen sprinkler regulator plate, pressure gauge and two sprinkler heads due to excessive cold temps in storage area; heat restored
- F Worked with Sunday School Superintendent to re-set classrooms
- F Replace torn down gutters on North side of Hall due to ice
- F Added three Carbon Monoxide Detectors: kitchen, stage, storage room behind CE office(As per State Fire Inspector)
- F MASSIVE project to get outside egress lights working—New LED fixtures, new master unit and wiring changes; the system NEVER WORKED; an electrician fixed the problem(As per State Fire Inspector)
- B New Contract with Gwen's Landscaping
- B Emergency tree work Broken branches hanging over road
- B Extensive tree trimming Dead branches cut/removed over cars/parking lot/road
- B Lacey Police visit to the church to educate on ALICE(Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate)in case of active shooter
- B The young men of Oceanfields help clean up outside church grounds(ON GOING, thanks coordinator Mark Salerno)
- B Established an outside volunteer group to "adopt" a section of church grounds to care for

- B Used Enewsletter and bulletin to broadcast "Help Needed for 2018 Projects"
- B Motion sensors placed in Fetherman Hall rest rooms and the Link Room

Special thanks to Bernie Schnaudt & Joanne Schnaudt for their total dedication to the church and on this committee. Without them, many listed projects wouldn't have been completed.

Here is a list of some upcoming projects for 2019:

- Fix pot holes in driveway(Approx. \$1,800)
- Replace 1st sanctuary A/C unit(\$10,000)
- More interior painting(to repaired damaged walls in sanctuary)
- De-humidifier system in basement(\$2,700)
- Finish basement project for rental/meeting purposes(paint, replace stained ceiling tiles, remove carpet)

The Buildings & Grounds Committee also handles all the rentals of Fetherman Hall. See the Building Usage line in the church budget. These are the dollars we bring in to help keep the church running.

MISSION OVERVIEW

2018 Annual Report

Our church is involved in many facets of mission work. With the exception of the African Mission Partnership Mission Group, all mission group work is local.

The areas of mission include:

African Mission Partnership (AMP) Mission Group Hunger Action Team (HAT) Mission Group Your Grandmother's Cupboard(YGC)

Detailed reports on the above mission groups will follow on the next few pages.

In the Narthex, our Mission Committee bulletin board highlights each one of our mission projects throughout the year.

Special offerings, such as World Wide Communion collected the first Sunday in November and One Great Hour of Sharing collected on Palm Sunday, are sent to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to assist people in times of need and disaster in the United States and around the world.

Our neighbors within our church and our community are served through the Deacons, and through the Discretionary Fund, which comes from the donations that are placed in the Communion envelopes on the first Sunday of each month.

A very special thank you to Joanne & Bernie Schnaudt for all their hard work over the years on the different mission committees. They were the driving force behind many mission projects. It could always be said, "If you want something done, give it to the Schnaudts!".

FORKED RIVER PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AFRICAN MISSION PARTNERSHIP MISSION GROUP ANNUAL REPORT 2018

The AMP mission group, formed in September 2007, works in partnership with Caleb Rukundo in providing the basic necessities, plus loving care for about 150 street children in local homes built for them in Uganda. This is done through the Amahoro Children's Development Initiative (ACDI) where several churches and religious groups work together to provide the children with their needs. We work with US partners to channel resources to the ministry.

This year's traditional "Lighting-The-Way" Fund raised \$1,400.00 by selling colored light bulbs to decorate the church entrance for Christmas. This paid for 140 children to have a special Christmas dinner and party. This dinner consisted of meat, rice, vegetables, potatoes, soda and cake. (They rarely get meat).

This year a team of 12 members, led by Pastor Terry, traveled on a pilgrimage to visit Caleb and his children in Uganda. They spent 12 days in Uganda. New friends were made by all.

While the team was there, part of the team screened 110 children and adults for dental problems, and with the help of some local Ugandan Denteks (local people trained previously to extract teeth), over 70 children had dental treatment done. The balance of the children did not need any treatment as this is a testament to Caleb and his team at the homes. Assorted antibiotics and over-the-counter pain killers were brought and left in the Country.

In addition, 50 water filtration units were brought and distributed in the local community to improve their health. Monies were raised by donations for these water filtration units.

American football equipment was donated by the local Walmart and the children received 2 days of training followed by a game attended by the whole team and many local residents.

75 pounds of Legos were donated by community members and brought with the team. The children loved them!

\$1,000.00 was raised through donations and given to Caleb to purchase needed medicines.

\$1,500.00 was donated by the Forked River Rotary and given to Caleb to purchase two lap tops for the schools.

Two teenage church members went on the trip as good will ambassadors. \$6,000.00 was raised to help send the teenagers on the trip.

Counselling was given to Caleb's team in dealing with "trauma", as most of the children have gone through some type of trauma.

Upon returning to the US the team sent \$700.00 of the monies raised to Caleb to purchase needed medical equipment for the on-site nurse.

Another project Caleb requested funding for was a project to send two of Caleb's people to get trained in making reusable feminine hygiene projects for Caleb's teenage girls. Without these the girls have been missing 5 days of school each month and they get very behind in school. \$1,500.00 was raised for this project and the money was sent to Caleb.

Caleb has brought up the need for further training for teachers at the elementary school that he runs. The school teaches Caleb's children plus 200 local children. Tote bags were made from Ugandan material and sold to friends and Church members for \$20 per bag. The first donation from this of \$500.00 was sent for teacher's training.

Two projects that have been identified for the future as follows:

- 1. \$2,500.00 to add to the Matuga dormitory to increase capacity by 15 children.
- 2. Build a vocational school at the boy's home to further increase the ability of Caleb's children to get meaningful jobs after they leave the home.

No monies were taken from the Church budget.

Support was donated by caring church members, friends, relatives, local Walmart, Rotary and others.

2018 HUNGER ACTION TEAM ANNUAL REPORT

THE PURPOSE OF THE HUNGER ACTION TEAM IS TO WORK TOGETHER TO EASE HUNGER IN OUR COMMUNITY.

CENTS-ABILITY OFFERING

Donations are collected on the first and second Sunday of the month from the congregation. Each month, 25% of the total is forwarded to the Presbytery Hunger Program and 75% remains with the HAT Committee for use at our local food bank. Over \$3,000 was collected through the Cents-Ability offering this year, with \$885 of that going towards the Presbytery Hunger Program.

LACEY FOOD BANK

Weekly food collections of non-perishable items, donated by the congregation, are delivered to the food bank every week.

Produce Program- During the year, fresh produce is packed for the food bank. The produce is donated and purchased. Funds for the program come from Cents-Ability donations from the congregation.

This year approximately \$350 - \$400 was spent each month on produce. A total of 1900 bags were packed for the year.

Produce was purchased from Costco, Silveri & Sons and Mike Russo's Orchid Lane Farms. As in the past, Mike was very generous, always adding extra produce to the amount purchased. In January, a winter food collection was held to help restock the food pantry at the Lacey Food Bank. Paper bags and a list of suggested items were giving to the congregation to fill. Over 130 bags were collected and delivered, with the help of our youth group who loaded the bags in cars. That was a record number of bags—well done Forked River Presbyterian Church!

3rd ANNUAL MINI CROP WALK

A mini CROP Walk by our Sunday School children was held in October. This event was organized by the Sunday School staff and the members of HAT. The children, who were sponsored by members of the congregation, friends and family, walked laps around the church parking lot. Almost \$300 was raised for this worthwhile mission. Kudos to Jenn Jeremiah for a great job organizing it.

OUTREACH

Members of the Hunger Action Team made a donation of \$300 in support of the Lacey Summer Lunch Program in cooperation with the Lacey United Methodist Church, and we also worked side by side with them at their church packing and delivering lunches to qualified school children. Forked River Presbyterian Church has been designated a Hunger Action Congregation by the Presbyterian Hunger Program PC(USA).

It has been a very successful and challenging year for HAT. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the following:

March 4, 2018 was the kick-off Sunday for the Presbytery program called One Great Hour of Sharing. This is the single, largest way that we can come together every year to work for a better world. In 2017, \$936.23 was raised. I challenged the congregation to reach \$1,000 this year. I wish to thank Tommie Lou Judson, Isabel Orriss and Sue Morris for their support. The program ended on Palm Sunday, March 25th. After receiving the Finance Committee's report, I was able to report the total amount raised on April 22nd. We EXCEEDED our goal! The total raised was \$1,303.50 with \$113.50 of that amount being from the Sunday School children. Praise the Lord! Thank you for all your support.

Throughout the year, I reminded church members of an envelope in the offering box called Per Capita. The amount per member for 2018 was \$37, which supports the administrative and ecclesiastical operations of the Monmouth Presbytery to which our church belongs. Our Session committed to pay 50% of the total our church owed—\$4,181. Only \$3,425 was raised.

Finance and Audit Committee Annual Report

January 1 – December 31, 2018

Chairman Discussion

The Finance and Audit Committee does not currently have a Chair. We thank Al Siecke for his 2 years of service and wish him the best as he relocates. If you or someone you know would like to be part of the Finance Committee or serve as Chair, please see any of the members for more information.

The year 2018 started out good with a balanced budget, but when some members started leaving early in the year, we knew we would be challenged with congregational giving and meeting our projected income. In fact, we had a cash flow loss in our general fund by over \$28,000, making 2018 the single biggest loss on record since we've been keeping track in 2008.

Income Categories

Congregational Giving remains to be the top category for the church income, amounting to 83% of the total (however missing expectation by \$25,000). I again thank the Congregation for your regular offerings. I encourage everyone to consider supporting the General Fund first in your weekly offerings with no stipulations. It is the support structure and foundation of the entire church and our many missions.

The building use fees are the second greatest source of income. We are always looking to increase this area of revenue so please contact a Session member if you know of a group looking to rent space in the church or

committee manages, but the bulk of this report will be based on the General Fund, which is supported by weekly envelope and plate giving, rental use of the church building, and the Flea Market and Holiday Craft Fair fundraisers.

There are many special

Fetherman Hall for a meeting place. We would like to give Joe Mathis special recognition for continuing to bring new outside groups to rent the building space for additional income.

Our Fund Raisers were another area that fell well short of expectations. Although we had budgeted \$11,250 for fund raisers for the year, there was no complete plan to realize this. The Flea Market and Holiday Craft Fair brought in around \$6,000, however, there were no other fund raisers that materialized throughout the year. I would strongly caution budgeting for fund raisers in the future without careful planning on each one.


I would like to encourage all to consider keeping the church in mind as each of us conducts our estate planning. One of the gifts we count on each year is the Grant Estate, which is an annuity of normally around \$4,000. We had a good year in 2018 as



Expense Categories

The General Fund pays mainly for the Pastor's salary and benefits, the building operations, maintenance, and the administrative costs to run the Church and the Missions it supports. The General Fund also supports the Music program, Worship Services, and Christian Education.

Our actual expenses were below the budget projections by about 2%. For 2019, expenses are budgeted to be reduced even further, mainly with the estimated reduction in the Pastor's Salary and Benefits as we go through our process of finding a replacement for Pastor Terry. There were cuts to other programs as well, and we continue to delay the Capital Recovery Expense, which the Finance Committee recommends striving to 'pay back' money that was taken out of other funds to pay our normal expenses. In fact, we had to take another \$20,000 out of our Building Capital Fund to meet our expenses in 2018. For a more detailed look at the expenses, please see the attached Treasurer's Report for 2018 which breaks down each category.



Net Income/Expenses

The below table and graph represent the actual cash flow spending each year as well as a cumulative total deficit. In 2018, we were cash flow negative by over \$28,000. Since 2008, we have spent down our Funds by over \$70,000. The downward trend was broken by a few cash-flow positive years in 2015-2017 however, we continue to spend from our other accounts to pay for expenses. This is not a good thing and we must be diligent about not continuing to spend more than we take in or risk further depleting our assets.


Assets

The General Funds act as our checking account, with budgeted income going in and expenses being paid from this account. We are starting off the year with about \$15,000 in the General Fund which should be enough to maintain a positive balance without borrowing from other accounts if the budget holds.

There are also several other Bank Assets. They are:

- Special Funds These are a collection of dedicated monies for each mission group including, HAT, Africa, and Youth Groups to name a few and are managed by each group
- Memorial Funds These are dedicated funds that were donated to the church for specific purposes and are managed by the Memorial Committee
- Building Capital Fund This is our "reserves" which have designated to help fund large projects to improve the building and then pay back (depreciate) over a fixed amount of time. This Fund is fully invested, and we also rely on it to realize dividends for income
- Endowment Fund This serves as our largest asset. Anyone can give to the Endowment Fund which will be protected and used only under the guidance of Finance and Session. This fund is currently fully invested, and we have started to take a portion each year as part of a 'total-return' policy to provide income.

I believe we have a great investment portfolio for our Endowment and Building Capital Funds. In fact, we have had appreciation of these funds of over \$79,000 since inception in 2011. The dividends that each of these funds produce will continue to increase each year and contribute more toward our budget the longer they are invested.

The Endowment Fund is invested in the Vanguard Balanced Index Fund (VBIAX), which consists of a mix of about 60% stocks and 40% bonds with an average 10-year annual return of 9.53%. This fund had an annual return of -2.86% for 2018 due to challenging market conditions.

The Building Capital Fund is invested in the Vanguard Wellesley Income Fund (VWIAX), which consists of a mix of about 60-65% bonds and 35-40% value stocks. This is a bit more conservative than the Endowment Fund since the purpose is to invest in capital building projects over time with the depreciation getting paid back into this fund from our budget. This fund had an annual return of -2.49% for 2018, again, due to challenging market conditions. The average 10-year annual return is 8.02%. We did not have any building projects in 2018, but, as stated earlier, we did have to take \$20,000 to pay for expenses our income did not cover.

Below is the Depreciation schedule and what we will need to budget each year in order to pay back the building projects. Over time, this fund should be able to support any capital improvements that need to go back into the building and grounds as long as we keep the commitment to pay back what was spent and not take any additional funds to pay for operating expenses.
