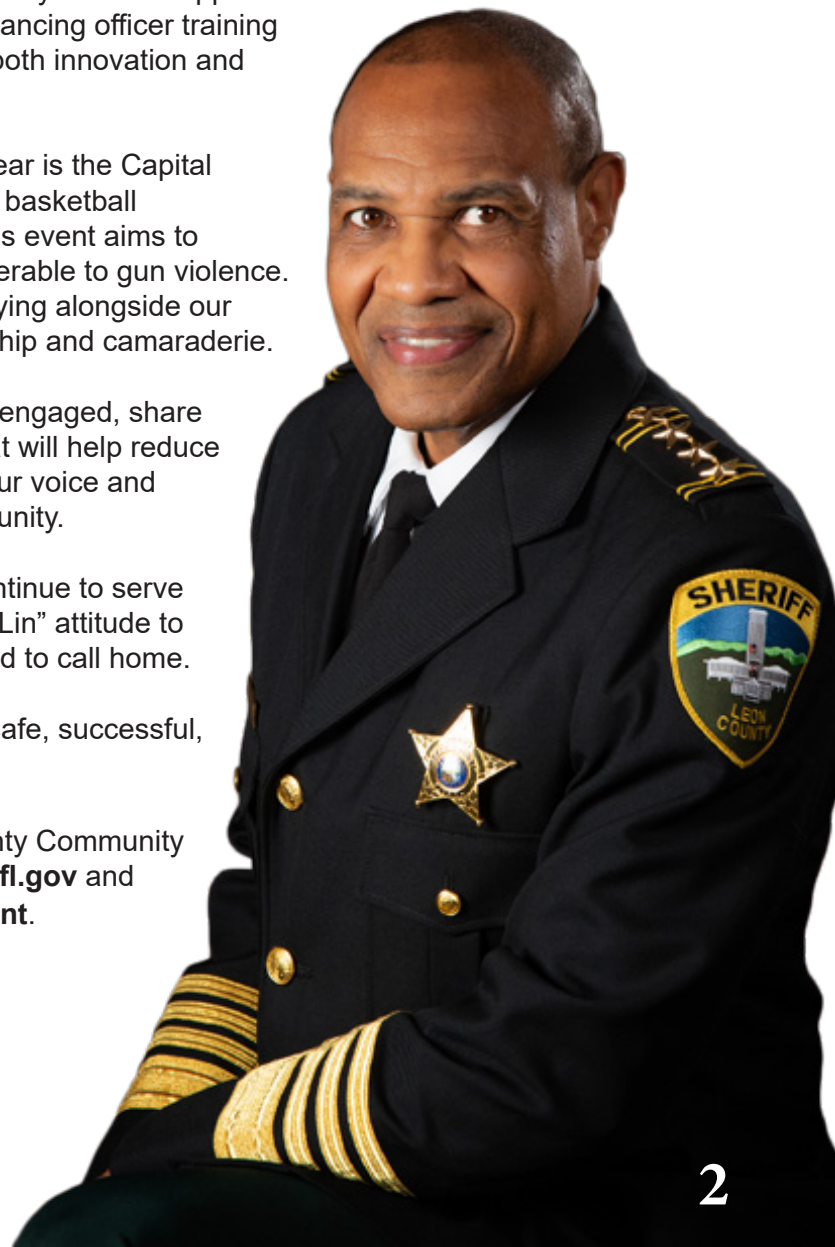

Operation Lifeguard

On December 19, 2024 the Leon County Sheriff's Office held a press conference to announce the results of Operation Lifeguard, a significant undercover operation targeting perpetrators of online child exploitation.

The operation resulted in the arrest of 15 individuals for felony-level charges in connection with attempting to meet or solicit a minor for sexual favors. LCSO is committed to protecting children from online predators and ensure those who exploit children face justice.

Precision Under Pressure: The Training Behind LCSO's Hazardous Devices Team

The Leon County Sheriff's Office Hazardous Devices Team, commonly known as the "Bomb Squad," plays a vital role in maintaining public safety by responding to incidents involving explosives, hazardous materials, and other high-risk scenarios. From suspicious packages to Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Environmental (CBRNE) threats, this elite team is trained to handle the most dangerous situations with precision and care.

Each member of the Bomb Squad is a highly trained professional who takes on this specialized

responsibility in addition to their primary assignments in patrol or investigations. Their journey begins with rigorous training at the FBI's Hazardous Devices School in Huntsville, Alabama, a six-week program designed to teach technicians how to safely identify and neutralize explosive devices. Team members also undergo regular local training twice a month, attend advanced courses, and re-certify every three years to remain at the forefront of their field.

Beyond their core duties, the team engages with the community through public safety displays, educational presentations, and participation in local events. These efforts not only enhance public awareness of their services, but also build trust between the community and law enforcement. Additionally, the team provides technical support to the SWAT team and contributes to dignitary protection missions.

Equipped with cutting-edge tools such as the ANDROS Wolverine Robot which has the capability of deploying x-ray systems, disrupters, and air/chemical monitors remotely, technicians can safely assess and neutralize threats. Through specialized training, advanced technology, and proactive outreach, the team ensures that even the most complex threats are met with preparedness and professionalism.

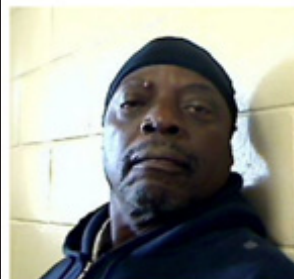

The Leon County Sheriff's Office Livestock Team had a busy and productive 2024, marked by the addition of new members, expanded community partnerships, and various training opportunities.

These efforts helped the team effectively manage stray and abandoned animals while strengthening its capacity to serve the community.

REUNITING LOST ANIMALS

As highlighted on LCSO's social media pages, a number of animals have recently wandered away from their homes. To ensure swift reunification, residents are encouraged to register their livestock through the free LCSO Animal Flex Registry.

By registering your property address and the animals you own, you can help streamline the process. Visit <https://www.leoncountysos.com> to register and assist in bringing animals home faster.

When animal owners cannot be located promptly, the team relies on its dedicated community livestock partners for temporary housing. These partners have played a vital role in caring for animals such as horses, pigs, and goats.

Leon County has seen an uptick in roaming pigs, both feral and abandoned pot-bellied pigs released into the community. If you encounter a pig and are unsure of its status, please contact the Livestock Team Commander, Lieutenant Mike Wallace, at (850) 743-7826. The team is committed to addressing these issues with care and efficiency.

LCSO extends heartfelt thanks to everyone who has provided shelter and support, demonstrating a remarkable commitment to Leon County's well-being.

STAY CONNECTED

December brought several success stories between citizens and the LCSO community livestock partners. In one instance, the team coordinated with community partners to rehome four animals for a single citizen.

Another success involved connecting with the Florida Sheriff's Youth Ranch, which sought additional horses for its programs. Within an hour, a partner stepped up to provide a horse, ensuring it would have a meaningful new role and home.

The LCSO Livestock Team values open communication and encourages residents to reach out with livestock-related concerns. Together, we can continue to protect and care for the animals and people of Leon County.
