This is also the day we release Blanding's turtles into the Rouge National Park, having first received a blessing from an elder before starting the next chapter of their lives in their natural world. Referred to as 'the turtle with the sun under its chin,' the Blanding's turtle is significant to First Nations communities, and we are proud to work with a long list of partners help re-introduce them into Rouge National Urban Park.

Thank you to those who sent us your votes and helped name the three cheetah cubs, born this past January. There were nearly 10,000 votes and it's always amazing to see the community actively participating in special Zoo moments. While it was a relatively close call, we are pleased to announce the winning name group was Marie, Berlioz and Toulouse, after Disney's animated film, *Aristocats*!
