DIVERSITY IN ACTIONBy Dean Heather Vacek

As I write, the Seminary community has begun its Lenten journey. With attendees gathered in Santee Chapel, and from many other locations via Zoom, we joined in a prayer by an unknown author titled, "Invite Us Deeper":

Almighty and ever living God,
you invite us deeper into your world, your people, your Lent.
May this time be one of outward focus;
seeking you in those we often ignore.
Help us live a Lent focused on freedom, generosity, and encounter.
Give us hearts hungry to serve you
and those who need what we have to give.

These petitions brought to my mind Lancaster Theological Seminary's mission to educate and nurture leaders to join in God's redemptive and liberating work so that all creation may flourish. At LTS, we invite our students to go deeper in our classrooms, in our community, and in the world. We invite our students to encounter the past and present witness of God's people, so that all of creation may know God's freedom and generosity. I might amend the last line of the prayer by adding, "...and what we stand to receive in relationship with others." LTS's mission is accomplished with a willingness not only to serve, but also to learn from and with one another.

Two years ago this month, the Boards of Trustees of Lancaster Theological Seminary, Moravian Theological Seminary, and Moravian University had just formed a set of exploratory teams to discuss the possibility of partnership. Those conversations emerged from, and were rooted in, the LTS Board's intent to find the most sustainable future for the Seminary's mission. For Moravian, the conversations emerged from desires to support its own offerings in theological education and to expand the geographical reach of its other graduate and undergraduate offerings.

Central to those early conversations two years ago was **identifying the core commitments** that would be necessary for a partnership to materialize. As a result, the formal agreement to consolidate includes commitments to LTS's staff, tenured and tenure-track faculty along with the denominational connection to the United Church of Christ. Of central significance is a commitment, drafted by LTS members of the team, that reads this way in the agreement:

"The combined LTS and Moravian identity and culture embraces and values the diversity of all members of the community. We are committed to remaining an ecumenical, open and affirming, anti-racist seminary that recognizes and supports persons of all races, sexual orientations, gender identities and gender expressions into the full life, ministry and sacraments of the church."

Two years later, we are doing new things together while firmly anchored in these commitments. We are doing a new thing together because we need to. Because the church and the world have changed, even while our institutional commitments have not.

The first two years of the partnership have brought much in terms of structural support and efficiencies of operation including investment in many capital improvements on campus. The health of our facilities is critically important, but this month I want to offer three examples of **our commitment to diversity in action**.

- The joint faculty's dedicated work in crafting a common curriculum that will span both seminaries has proven to be exciting work. The new curriculum, which will enroll its first students in the fall of 2024 includes, among other things, a commitment to an anti-racist pedagogy. Students will be equipped to interpret sacred and theological texts, artifacts, and practices from their own and other relevant traditions with sensitivity to literary, historical, and cultural contexts, and to the social and spiritual implications of interpretation. They also will be formed and equipped to articulate and practice a theological and ethical understanding of authority, power, and accountability that recognizes, supports, and affirms the dignity and worth of all persons. Stay tuned for more about the new curriculum in the months ahead!
- In early February 2023, nearly 40 trustees, staff members, and faculty gathered
 in the newly renovated Hafer Center for a two-day anti-racism retreat that
 continued the progress of the Seminary's President's Commission on Race and
 Inclusion. We were invited to understand more deeply ourselves, our worlds,
 and each other, and to take faithful action for change.
- In case you missed it, this year's Baxter Forum, Retelling the Origin Story: The Power & Presence of the Afro-Christian Convention in the UCC, is available online here (use the passcode *=ZNq!1q). More than 100 attendees gathered to learn from four distinguished leaders how the legacy of the Afro-Christian Convention continues to be a major force in our commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion for all.

All of this has been underway while we continue to work through the remaining stages of the regulatory and accreditation processes of the consolidation, processes that will wrap up in the summer of 2024. All of this has been underway as we, together, continue to do a new thing, holding fast to preserving the identity and witness of Lancaster Theological Seminary amid new partnerships. This work is not always easy, yet more often than not it is filled with joy and delight. It is filled with both challenge and affirmation. It is grounded in the past and bold enough to trust leaps of faith into the future.

Recognizing that these significant changes bring a mix of excitement and hope, sadness and grief that is unique to each individual who calls LTS home now, and all who have called it home in the past, we are grateful for the support of many as we teach and learn, as we worship and engage together in community. Peace to you during this Lenten season. May you experience a deepening of God's call to you and to those among whom you live, learn, worship, and play.
