What's Included in the OLLI Fall 2026 Catalog

At the time of printing, the information included in the fall catalog was current and accurate. Any updates to the listed information (changes, additions, cancellations, etc.) will be announced in OLLI's weekly newsletter, *Connections*, and online entries of courses and programs will be corrected to reflect the new information.

OLLI courses are typically 5-6 weeks long and meet once a week for 90 minutes. Courses explore a wide range of topics and are offered both in-person and online via Zoom. Class sessions are offered Monday-Saturday with varying times throughout the day, including some evening courses.

OLLI Talks are one-time lectures, presentations, or workshops typically held over the noon hour.

Shared Interest Groups (SIGs) are created around a common interest and like to meet outside the normal OLLI class environment to discuss and enjoy this mutual interest. Each group is different depending on

its focus, and all provide interesting lifelong learning opportunities as well as fun social experiences.

Theatre Outings. OLLI members enjoy discounted tickets to select theatre performances in the Boston area. The Theatre Committee works with various production companies to select shows and dates for OLLI to attend as a group.

Travel. Members enjoy fun and educational day trips as well as overnight travel (both domestic and international). Volunteers put together trip itineraries and promote them to OLLI members at discounted prices.

Introduction to Traditional Yang Style Tai Chi

Students will acquire a comprehensive understanding of Yang-style Tai Chi, the most widely practiced and popular style of Tai Chi, commonly referred to as “meditation in motion.” The Yang postures are characterized by their relaxed, expansive, simple, precise, centrally aligned, and harmoniously combined nature, incorporating both hard and soft elements. These postures can be positioned at high, middle, or low stances, accommodating individual preferences. This flexibility renders the Yang form suitable for health preservation and enhancement, thereby augmenting strength, balance, and overall fitness. Each class commences with warm-up exercises designed to promote softness, relaxation, and looseness. We will delve into fundamental principles and concepts, fostering body awareness, balance, and meditation.

Facilitator: John “Jack” Walsh, a retired U.S. official, honed his skills in the Yang style Tai Chi hand and sword forms under Master Liang Yin Zhao at Murray Hill Chinese School in New Jersey from 2003 to 2018. Post-retirement, he immersed himself in the study of Traditional Yang Tai Chi under Master Huan Zhang, a former OLLI instructor, and Sifu David Watts. Additionally, he delved into Sun style Tai Chi and obtained Instructor Certifications for Tai Chi for Arthritis and Fall Prevention from Dr. Paul Lam. Since April 2024, Jack has been teaching Tai Chi for Arthritis and Fall Prevention for Brigham and Women’s Hospital, Mass General Brigham, at the Boston Public Library. In May 2025, Master Zhang bestowed upon him an Instructor Certification for Traditional Yang Tai Chi, and in March 2026, he received a Lineage in the Tong Hua Men system. Currently, Jack serves as an assistant instructor at Tong Hua Men School of Kung Fu and Tai Chi Chuan in Cambridge. Furthermore, he maintains his teaching position at OLLI.

Tai Chi for Arthritis and Fall Prevention

Developed by Dr. Paul Lam and the Tai Chi for Health Institute, this comprehensive program, based on the Sun style of Tai Chi, provides an in-depth understanding of its distinctive characteristics. This evidence-based program serves as an effective exercise regimen promoting holistic well-being, with customizable exertion levels suitable for individuals of varying abilities, including young seniors. It incorporates unique gentle qigong practices and a higher stance, making the learning process engaging and enjoyable. Published medical studies have demonstrated that this program offers numerous health benefits, including arthritis symptom relief, reduced pain, improved balance, fall risk reduction, flexibility, strength, cardiovascular fitness, immune system support, and tranquility. Arthritis foundations and the CDC recommend these evidence-based exercises. Each class commences with gentle warm-up exercises to foster softness, relaxation, and looseness, followed by the learning of fundamental Tai Chi postures, principles, and concepts.

Art in Knitting

This class welcomes a mix of new and experienced knitters. To accommodate new knitters, the class will offer two sessions of basic information and how to’s. Experienced knitters will be provided with patterns, or they can bring their own, in order to get started on their projects. All participants will also be introduced to Ravelry, a free knitters website. In the third session there will be a discussion on colors and how to use different stitches and yarn to create original garments. According to what is new in knitting, the trend is to use a palette of colors (the bigger the contrast, the better!) and using a combination of stitches, yarn types, and geometrical pictures in the overall design. The rest of the course will be used to troubleshoot and to discuss different techniques.

Facilitator: Samia Awad is from Bolivia where in addition to regular scholastic classes, she learned how to embroider, knit, and sew. With her mother's guidance, Samia learned some of the knitting techniques and with additional classes and YouTube, mastered many knitting styles. She enjoys passing on her knowledge to other OLLI students and also leads the Knitting Shared Interest Group that meets once a month on campus.

"Ask not what...." Persuasion Performance and Power of Political Speeches

Drawing on speeches from the past 100 years, this course focuses on how political speeches persuade, inspire, divide, and shape history. Participants will analyze famous and lesser-known speeches from campaigns, debates, concessions, policy addresses as well as from other political events. Using video clips, transcripts, guided analysis, and discussions, we will explore how content, delivery, audience connection, timing, and historical context influence a speech's effectiveness and lasting impact. Together, we will examine why some political speeches inspire nations, shape history, or define a political era—while others fail, backfire, or disappear entirely.

Facilitator: Myrna Finn, professor emerita at Salem State University, taught courses in all aspects of oral communication. With her motto "you're never too old to learn something new," she is a lifelong learner always looking to expand her horizons, understand complex ideas, integrate the new with the old and have fun in the process.

Gender Troublemakers: The Cultural Contributions of America's Transgender Community

Despite facing decades of hatred and discrimination, Transgender people have built a rich, resilient culture and artistic tradition in America. This class is for anyone at any knowledge level on trans issues who wants to learn more about that culture and history. We will start with a practical guide on trans history, terminology, theory, and navigating real-world conversations. Then, we will look at and discuss excerpts from the landmark works of Trans Art. By the end of this class, you will have a better understanding of the Trans perspective and of the ways Trans people have impacted your own life.

Facilitator: Claire Arp is an Economics graduate student at UMass Boston, where she has conducted research into the economic disparities faced by Trans Americans. As a Trans woman herself, she advocates for increased recognition of the cultural contributions of her community. In her free time, she writes epic fantasy stories.

Vaccines: How to Make Your Immune System Work for You

Vaccines and sanitation are the medical advances which have saved the most lives throughout human history, but there have been skeptics of the former since at least the 14th century. In this course we will explore how vaccines work, what the differences between vaccines are, why some vaccines work better than others, and how we test the efficacy and safety of vaccines. We will also consider how we can continue to build new and better vaccines as we move into the future.

Facilitator: Michael Allara is a current PhD student at UMass Boston and a former BPS science teacher who currently studies immunology in flies. He has guest lectured on antibody formation and vaccination in immunology courses here at UMass Boston and has previously had the privilege of teaching OLLI courses about biological sex and genetically modified organisms.

Through the Artist's Eyes

Artists let us see the world through their eyes, transporting us through time and space. Throughout history, art has been used to record our daily lives, share our connections with people and our environment, and to visualize what we cannot see—such as the spiritual realm. Session topics will include: Andrew Wyeth's expressive watercolors of the people and places that surrounded him in rural Pennsylvania and Maine in the special exhibition *Spectacular Freedom: Andrew Wyeth and the Modern American Watercolor*; how medieval Koreans envisioned the world beyond death in the special exhibition *Ten Kings of Hell: The Afterlife in Medieval Korea*; as well as various examples across the museum's exhibitions and permanent collections.

Facilitator: Arielle Levine of the Cleveland Art Museum teaches students all around the world during video conferences in the museum's Distance Learning Program. She has a degree in art history from Case Western Reserve University and has been with the museum's education department for over 15 years.

We'll review what has been called the first American detective story - Dashiell Hammett's *The Maltese Falcon* '30 which introduced Sam Spade in the '41 movie. This image of the "hard-boiled" private investigator is pitted against a band of criminals and his woman of the moment. Under John Huston's direction this film (nominated for 3 Academy Awards) has been noted as the beginning of the film noir genre.

Facilitator: Caroline Chiccarelli's family stories about cinema have inspired her to share her love of film appreciation with life-long learners, their memories, and perspectives. She enjoys reviewing the Hollywood experience through a variety of genres.

Dr. Zhivago: The Poet and the Revolution

What happens to a middle-class family in a period of social upheaval? Russian author Boris Pasternak's novel *Dr. Zhivago* follows the title character, a physician and poet, through the Russian Revolution and its aftermath. Painting a sweeping picture of the revolution and its human costs, this remarkable book addresses the emotional, moral, and philosophical questions of the revolutionary era. How does revolution ripen and spread in a society? How do different individuals perceive and react to revolutionary change? How does an artist portray revolution? How does Pasternak's artistic vision resonate with us today?

Facilitator: Patricia Suhrcke received her PhD in Russian Literature from the University of Chicago. She previously taught Russian literature in translation in Chicago and Atlanta. She has been facilitating course for OLLI since 2016 and enjoys using her experience leading public dialogues for Cambridge Forum to discuss the great Russian novels with interested readers.

A New Look at the Gospels

Biblical Scholarship opens myriad perspectives on the four Gospels in the Christian Testament. The material in this course will enable us to more fully understand the ancient Gospel texts. We will focus on the ancient Jewish, Roman and Hellenistic context of the Gospels and the Early Christian Communities from which they emerged. We will concentrate on Mark, the oldest of

the Gospels. During each class session, we will read aloud from Mark for about 20 minutes. There will be lecture, question and answer, and discussion during each class.

Facilitator: Sharon Bilodeau taught academic courses on the Bible to High School students for 40 years. She has degrees in Theology and Education from Boston College. Sharon is a resident of Dorchester who is delighted to bike over to UMass to teach at OLLI. She is also a literacy coach at the Holmes Innovation School and a member of the BVocal Chorus.

In this course, we revisit Howard Zinn's *A People's History of the United States*, published in 1980, from the perspective of 2026. How does *A People's History*, which brings to life voices left out of most accounts of our history, help us make sense of the last decade, in which Donald Trump has dominated our political and cultural life as a nation? We will read and discuss selected chapters from *A People's History* to place Trump's rise in a coherent narrative arc that more traditional histories miss. We will also evaluate Zinn's prescription for healing what ails us, activism. Required text: *A People's History of the United States* by Howard Zinn.

Psychological Trauma and Posttraumatic Growth

This course covers the topic of psychological trauma and how it affects people, from some trauma-related disorders to the ways in which it helps people grow. It first covers the different types of trauma and the ways that it can manifest, including its classic definitions to contemporary understandings. Then, the course will cover some trauma-related psychological disorders and the best ways that people with trauma histories can be supported in mental health care. The course then considers how people can make meaning, find hope, and flourish after experiencing trauma.

Facilitator: Nicholas Pierorazio, M.A., is a Clinical Psychology Ph.D. candidate at the University of Massachusetts Boston. His work focuses on trauma, its impacts, and psychotherapy process and outcome. He brings a scientist-practitioner-activist perspective and has significant clinical, teaching, and research experience, with international awards recognizing his contributions.

Great Trials That Changed History: A Judge's Perspective

Some trials do not end simply with their verdict. They have a power that echoes throughout history. They have shaped and transformed the social, political and legal landscape. These trials deserve the description “Great” because they serve as enduring lessons for us all on such issues as social justice, race, abuse of power, and injustice. We will examine the Boston Massacre trials, the criminal minds in the Leopold and Loeb murders, the haunting Lindbergh baby kidnapping tragedy, the Lincoln assassination conspirators’ trial, and the Lizzie Borden case.

Facilitator: The Honorable Dennis J. Curran was an associate justice of the Massachusetts Superior Court, appointed to the seat by former governor Mitt Romney in 2006. He has taught the practice of Political Science and Law at Tufts University and Roger Williams University of Law. He was born and raised in Boston. He graduated from Boston Latin School and received his bachelor’s and master’s degrees from the University of Pennsylvania and his law degree from the University of Virginia. Curran’s lifelong passion has been history. He has been elected a Fellow of the Massachusetts Historical Society and is a member of the Board of Advisors of the nationally-respected Lincoln Forum.

Creative Movement with Abilities Dance Boston

This course is meant to be a movement class generated to the folks in the room. While we might take adapted ballet techniques, we're not rigid on meeting certain techniques. Instead, we focus on the physical/social/emotional wellness of the students in the virtual room. We believe that movement can be generated anywhere (like our homes or wherever you're calling from) while building community in virtual space (to show we can still build connection in virtual formats). This course is designed to get us in tune and connected to our bodies, develop a deeper sense of physicality, and enjoy joyful movement. Religion and the Constitution

This course will address the treatment of religion and religious beliefs under the First Amendment. We will first examine the evolution of the “separation of church and state” doctrine under the Establishment Clause, and explore the increasing tolerance for religious expressions in public life under recent decisions of the Supreme Court. We will also examine how the Roberts Court’s embrace of religious rights under the Free Exercise Clause, the Freedom of Speech Clause, and the Religious Freedom Restoration Act in recent years is redefining the traditional separation between government and religious organizations. Finally, we will touch on the current Christian Nationalist movement, the policies of Trump 2.0, and their impact on the resurgence of Christianity in public life.

Facilitator: John S. Ross, III (Jack) earned an A.B. (history) degree from Yale University, a J.D. degree from the University of Virginia School of Law, and an LL.M. (taxation) degree from New York University School of Law. He practiced law for 20 years in Washington, D.C., and served as Adjunct Professor of Law at Washington and Lee University School of Law. Jack has taught numerous courses on constitutional law and other topics in the Worcester Institute for Senior Education at Assumption University, and also facilitates the WISE Supreme Court Special Interest Group.

Fred Zinnemann was a young Austrian filmmaker when he came to Hollywood in 1929. After working as a cameraman, he began making films on his own within a few years. Although he made a wide variety of films, he was particularly gifted in featuring characters who face difficult, even impossible choices, particularly in wartime. We will view a variety of these films, including Vanessa Redgrave and Jane Fonda in *Julia*, which features Meryl Streep’s first film appearance, the great Paul Scofield in his Oscar winning role in *A Man for All Seasons*, and one of the best American westerns, *High Noon* with Gary Cooper and Grace Kelly.

Facilitator: Julie Kinchla enjoyed studying film while a student at UMass Boston in the 1970s. The experience sparked a lifelong love of movies and further attendance at many additional film classes. Julie is a retired librarian with many years of experience developing and presenting programs for the public. Previous classes for OLLI include “American Film Noir,” “Boston in the Movies,” and “Mel Brooks: Renaissance Man.”

Rediscover Shakespeare as we take a deep dive into *Julius Caesar* and *Twelfth Night*. For each play, outside of class, participants will be expected to read the play and view a selected film version. The texts we will use are the Folger Shakespeare Library editions (under \$10 apiece and/or available for free download from the Folger Shakespeare Library). In class we will discuss the plays in the contexts of Shakespeare's life and times as well as the historical periods of the plays, with reference to major critical research. Our goal is a rich appreciation of Shakespeare's work.

Facilitator: Evelyn Ryan is an experienced teacher who facilitated OLLI's "The Best of English Poetry" for eight years. She began this Shakespeare series in 2024. Evelyn has regularly attended productions of Shakespeare's plays since she first saw *Macbeth* in junior high school. Since then, she has also read Shakespeare's works, and studied related reviews, criticism, and biographies, as well as histories of the Elizabethan age.

Inherited Inequalities: Society, Economy, and the Global Persistence of Caste Discrimination

Amidst enormous social upheaval after the murder of George Floyd in 2020, Isabel Wilkerson published her book *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents*. In it, Wilkerson drew connections between racism in America and the caste system of India (as well as the ideology of Nazi Germany). Is the caste system the same as racial discrimination? Is there a caste system in the U.S.? What can the experiences of millions of marginalized caste people in India and the U.S. teach us about inequality, identity, and justice? In this course we will discuss these questions guided both by Wilkerson's book as well as the experiences of instructor Mahesh Admankar, a member both of an oppressed caste in India as well as a person of color in the United States. *Course Note:* This class was taught in Fall 2025 and has been updated with new material and content. *Purchasing and reading Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents is not required for this course. Readings will be provided by the instructor.*

Facilitator: Mahesh Admankar is a PhD Candidate in Public Policy in year 5 at UMass Boston. He was born in a village in India and his research interest is in social exclusion.

Memoir Workshop: Telling Your Own Story

Everyone has a story to tell! This workshop is designed to give you the space to write about your life, share your legacy. Whether you want to capture your family history for your grandchildren or write about an event that occurred in your life, all stories are valid and welcome. Memoir writing can be healing and magical. When a story persists in your consciousness, it is demanding to be told. You are the best person to tell it. You're the expert – you lived it. No writing experience is needed. This is a safe zone where you won't be judged for the content of the story or the writing! You'll hear where your writing resonates with us, your audience. What to expect? In each session, we will read a brief memoir piece, write for about 20 minutes from a prompt or whatever pops into your head, and finally, read our stories aloud. No one is obligated to share their work, but it's a good way to quiet your inner critic.

Facilitator: Tiana Gorham has been teaching writing for over 35 years. She earned a BA and an MA from UMB and won a national short story competition during her time there. Currently, she facilitates several memoir workshops and writing groups in the Boston Metrowest area. Currently she is working on a memoir about growing up as an immigrant in Boston. She is very excited for the opportunity to hear your stories.

She is a Fulbright scholar and has been teaching OLLI courses for two years. Her works focus on feminism, social justice, media, and gender equality.

Facilitator: Afia Akbar is a second-year PhD student in Public Policy at the University of Massachusetts Boston. Her interest in the motherhood penalty developed during her master's studies in Economics at Ohio University, where she focused on labor economics and gender inequality in the workforce. Currently, her research examines how childbirth affects women's careers and how public policies—such as childcare support and family leave—can better support mothers to remain and succeed in the labor force. Her broader research interests include labor policy, women's labor force participation, and economic development.

The 2026 Midterm Election: Power, Institutions, and the Trump Presidency

This six-week seminar examines the 2026 U.S. midterm elections through the lens of presidential power, institutional dynamics, and democratic norms. Using the presidency of Donald Trump as a central case study, the course provides a structured, non-partisan space to explore current events, historical precedent, and competing interpretations of American political life. This course will rely in part on OLLI students actively participating by bringing a weekly question or topic based on a news article or other media they have encountered. Zoom breakout rooms will be used for small group discussions. Understanding a pivotal election through history, institutions, and informed dialogue is our aim.

Facilitator: Marcela Maldonado brings nearly 20 years of experience teaching history and politics at the secondary level. Her curriculum development and instruction have spanned a wide range of subjects, including U.S. History, Political Philosophy, Politics and Ethics, the Modern Middle East, Latin American History, and Comparative Religions. Marcela will provide historical context and guiding frameworks while facilitating balanced discussion. The goal is to create a space where participants can engage thoughtfully with complex and often emotional topics, grounded in evidence and mutual respect.

Peter Paul Rubens: The Great Flemish and Italian Renaissance Tradition (early 17th century)

Sir Peter Paul Rubens was a Flemish artist and diplomat. He is considered the most influential artist of the Flemish Baroque tradition. Rubens's highly charged compositions focused on works associated with classical antiquity (encompassed the culture of ancient Greece & Rome) and Christian history. Due to the enormity of his work, we will focus on his mature period after he returned to Antwerp in 1609, following his stay in Italy. Early on he served as a diplomat to the Archdukes Albert and Isabella, and negotiating a peace treaty between England and Spain. This period also included notable paintings such as "The Elevation of the Cross" and huge commissions like the Medici Cycle. Surprisingly, there came a sea change in his style due to his reencounter with the works of Titian in Madrid in 1628. After retiring in the 1630s, he no longer worked on commission but rather for his own pleasure. He focused on landscapes and the life of peasants and portraits, characterized by a more relaxed, intimate technique.

Facilitator: Lucinda Gorry has facilitated many OLLI courses, including several on Dutch artists. During OLLI's Fall 2025 semester, she developed a course on Hans Memling and the Italian Renaissance. She has also researched and created lectures and courses on 19th-century Boston women artists, James McNeill Whistler, Édouard Manet, Berthe Morisot, Edgar Degas, Mary Cassatt, and many others.

Are you ready to put AI to work as your project assistant? If you are curious to learn more about what ChatGPT and other AI tools can really do, there's no substitute for personal experience. With long-time AI user Scott Guthery as your guide, this course will be a hands-on AI workshop for people who want to accomplish a specific objective. No AI experience is required. All you need to bring to the first meeting is a description of what you want to work on during the four-week workshop. This can be planning a vacation, learning about your neighborhood, writing a children's book, starting a business, or anything else that your smart, tireless assistant can help you with. From week to week, you will practice writing ChatGPT prompts that produce the most helpful results, discuss your results with other participants, and explore some of the advanced features that AI has to offer.

Professionally, he recently used AI to transcribe over 2,000 handwritten US patents and the 26-volume borrowed registers of the Boston Athenaeum. Branching Out: The Genres of American Roots Music

This class is presented as a continuation of and supplement to the popular Great Artists in American Roots Music series and is appropriate for both new and returning students. From the popular press to concert promotional materials to Grammy Awards categories, terms like “roots,” “Americana,” “folk,” “traditional,” and “bluegrass” are often thrown around with little distinction or context, yet these words carry specific meanings, histories, and legacies. In this course, we will study the genres of American roots music both as commercial categories and culturally specific musical practices. We'll begin by examining how these terms have been used and applied to specific genres at different points in their development. As the course progresses, we'll move beyond identifying what makes each genre unique to uncover the many ways they connect.

Facilitator: Taylor Ackley is a scholar, composer, and performer of American Roots music. He holds a master's degree and PhD in Composition, and master's degree in Ethnomusicology from Stony Brook University. After four years as Assistant Professor of Music at Brandeis, he is now Program Director at North Valley Music School in Northwestern Montana and works as an independent scholar and performing artist. As a singer and multi-instrumentalist, Taylor performs and lectures around the US. He released four albums of original compositions and arrangements of traditional repertoire. His writing has been published by the MIT Press, Equinox Publishing and *Popular Music History*.

Attention Must Be Paid: *A Look at Miller's Death of a Salesman and All My Sons*

"A small man can be just as exhausted as a great man."
—Linda, *Death of a Salesman*

Aristotle's *Poetics* suggests that tragedy is most powerful when it depicts a person of stature falling from prosperity into suffering—think Othello, Hamlet, or Oedipus. Arthur Miller's modern drama challenges this inherited model, turning instead to the tragedy of the ordinary man: a failing door-to-door salesman who dreams of being well-liked while struggling to like himself. In this course, we'll read Miller's *Death of a Salesman* and *All My Sons*, asking what tragedy looks like when its hero is not a king, prince, or general, but a father, husband, worker, and dreamer. Prior to the first class, please obtain copies of both plays and read Act I of *Death of a Salesman*.

Facilitator: Michele Harris received a BA in English from Allegheny College and an MFA in poetry from UMass Boston. She is the author of the poetry collection *Blackdamp* (David Robert Books, 2019), a recipient of the 2011 David A. Kennedy prize, and a finalist for the 2018 New Millennium Award. Dr. Iqbal's work focuses on bridging global divides through dialogue, sustainability, and inclusive perspectives that connect ideas across cultures, religions, political systems, and disciplines.

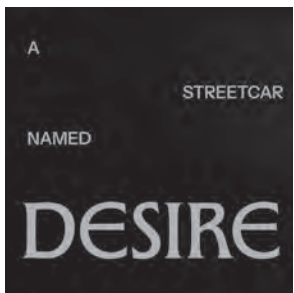

A course evaluation form is provided at the end of each course, and your constructive suggestions are welcomed by our facilitators. If you would like to complete an evaluation before the end of the course, please request a form from the OLLI office.

OLLI Scholars

This symbol indicates courses that are taught by UMass Boston graduate students under the OLLI Scholar program. The OLLI Curriculum Committee reviews proposals, interviews candidates, and mentors students from various graduate programs on campus. If accepted into the program, OLLI Scholars receive a stipend after successful completion of their courses. This intergenerational experience benefits both UMass graduate students and OLLI members.

Course Fees

- \$45 per course for OLLI Carte members, or
- Free for Full and Trial Semester members.

Additional fees are sometimes required for courses that involve off-campus activities, special events, or a high amount of handout copying or instructional supplies.

Course fees are due a week after final course confirmations are released.

Course Cancellation

OLLI reserves the right to cancel a scheduled course because of low registration, non-availability of a facilitator, or any other unavoidable circumstance. Students will be notified as soon as possible.

Course Capacities

The maximum number of students registered for each course depends on the course topic (some may work best with a smaller class size) and the preference of the facilitator. If requests for a course exceed capacity, the registration priority system is used to determine who will be enrolled, based on the priorities set by each registrant.

Course Registration Process

OLLI at UMass Boston uses a priority/lottery system to determine final course registrations. Full, OLLI Carte, and Trial Semester members must submit their course requests before the **Priority Registration Deadline of August 14** to be included in the lottery allocation process.

Please list your course choices in order of priority (highest priority = 1, and so on) on the Course Request Form or when using OLLI's online registration system. How does the lottery work? If demand exceeds the number of seats for a course, the computer assigns those seats by lottery based on your priority rankings.

Course requests received after the **August 14** deadline will be assigned based on availability on a first-come, first-served basis.

Paper Registration: Please complete the Course Request Form on page 32 and mail or fax to the OLLI office.

Online Registration: All current OLLI members have an account they can use for online course requests and registrations. Visit OLLI's online registration site where instructions are posted on how to use the system. Site address: <https://www.campusce.net/umb/category/category.aspx>

Course Confirmation: Students are not registered for courses until they receive a final confirmation. Confirmations will be emailed in late August. Please pay close attention to the details of the confirmation correspondence: "registered" means a student has been confirmed to attend the class; "not registered" means the course was oversubscribed, and the course request could not be accommodated; "registered not paid" indicates a student is registered for course but needs to pay the associated course fee.

Dropping or Adding Courses: Requests to drop a course or other OLLI program are handled by the OLLI office. Please email ollireg@gmail.com or call 617.287.7312 as soon as you determine that you will not be able to attending a program for which you are confirmed. If you would like to be placed on a waitlist for a course or program that is full, please contact the OLLI office, and you will be notified if a space becomes available.
