Welcome to the Bauhaus

Date: Thursday, September 18

Location: Room 617, 3rd Floor, McCormack Hall, UMass Boston

In this presentation, OLLI members will learn about the revolutionary art school known as the Bauhaus, which existed from 1919 to 1933. It aimed to integrate fine arts with applied arts, emphasizing functionality and mass production. The Bauhaus style is characterized by its minimalist, geometric designs, use of modern materials like steel and glass, and rejection of ornamentation.

Presenter: David Pogue is a veteran educator with over thirty years of experience. His main areas of interest are music, art, literature, history, and evolutionary psychology.

Egon Schiele: Austrian Genius

In his short 28 years of life, Egon Schiele became one of the most influential visual artists of the 20th century. We will see why.

The Self-Taught Plant Mom: Tips for Greening Your Home

Date: Monday, October 6

Students will learn about different indoor plant types requiring different levels of care, how to acquire them less expensively, where to place them in your home, how to plant and care for them over time, how to address plant diseases and pests, and how to propogate plants. This course is more for beginners and somewhat experienced plant lovers; not for those who are more advanced.

Presenter: Laurie Stillman is retired, and since Covid, has become an avid "Plant Mom." She has nurtured and propagated over 70 plants in her home, turning it into a happier, healthier, more beautiful environment. She has studied plan behavior, care and reproduction and enjoys sharing her plants and what she has learned with others.

Beyond Expectations: 25 Years Aboard the International Space Station (ISS)

Date: Tuesday, October 7

Location: Thayer Public Library, Braintree

Launched as a symbol of international collaboration and scientific ambition, the International Space Station was expected to orbit until 2015. A decade beyond that, it's still going strong—and still stirring debate. With 280 astronauts from 23 nations and thousands of experiments completed, the ISS remains a unique, \$3 billion-a-year platform for innovation. But what have we really gained from this orbiting laboratory? In this talk, we'll explore the surprising scientific breakthroughs, global partnerships, and future plans that keep the ISS relevant—and ask the big question: Has it truly been worth the investment?

Presenter: Since retiring from UMass Boston, Pat Monteith reignited her passion for space exploration. As a NASA/JPL Solar System Ambassador since 2016, she's delivered dozens of dynamic programs—many with OLLI—sharing the wonders of NASA missions and space science with audiences of all ages in an engaging and accessible way.

Nice & the French Riviera:

Medieval Villages, Contemporary Art, and Breathtaking Coastlines

Date: Thursday, October 9

Location: Thayer Public Library, Braintree

The Riviera stretches along France's southeast Mediterranean coast and rambles into the mountainous Alps. The region got its nickname from vacationing Brits, but to the French it is known for the dazzling azure blue color of the sea - La Côte d'Azur. This sunny sliver of land has been occupied for over three thousand years by different rulers, who left their mark on the landscape, architecture, lifestyle and food. The unique play of light in the region has attracted a legion of artists from Matisse to Picasso for over a century. Barry Pell, the lecturer, lived in Nice for one month and explored and photographed the region's historic palaces, magnificent seafront, and cliff-hanging villages.

Presenter: Barry Pell is a world traveler and photojournalist. He has traveled widely over five decades, visiting and documenting landscapes and cultures in 170 countries on all continents. Mr. Pell has also lived and traveled in China, eastern Europe, North Africa, and South America. He currently lectures on international culture at schools, universities, libraries, community centers, and residential communities in the Boston area.

Hitler through Cigarette Carton Photographs

Date: Thursday, October 16

Location: Room 617, 3rd Floor, McCormack Hall, UMass Boston

In 1936, the publisher Cigaretten/Bilderdienst Altona/Bahrenfeld published a book of photographs of Adolf Hitler that were available to Germans with their purchase of cartons

of cigarettes. These photographs were collected by Germans and often traded in the same way as baseball cards were collected by Americans. The book also contained essays about Hitler by the major figures in the Nazi movement such as Hermann Goring and Joseph Goebbels. What is strange about this publication and these Hitler cards is that Adolf Hitler did not smoke and that German scientists had discovered the link between smoking and cancer at least twenty years ahead of other scientists. Since these cards and cigarette sales were a source of significant government revenue these results were not made public nor reflected in government policies.

Presenter: Paul Bookbinder has a BA in History from Queens College in New York City, an MA in History from Northeastern University in History and a Ph.d. in the History of Ideas from Brandeis University. He taught for five decades at UMass Boston concentrating on Weimar and Nazi Germany and 20th Century Europe. He was also a speaker nationally for the Facing History and Ourselves organization concentrating on the Holocaust.

Where on Earth is the United States? A Top 10 Summary!

How does the U.S. compare in meeting the challenges that exist in 2025? We will examine some 24 topics including: GDP, wages, taxes, trade balance, NATO funding, environment, energy, education, healthcare, climate change, immigration, safety, prosperity, happiness, "Best" Nations, et al.. We will use the "Top 10" format which provides a quick "snap-shot" of the U.S. rank relative to other nations. Our sources are international surveys by highly credible and impartial world-wide organizations. This is the 4th Bi-Annual Edition for the program and includes three discussion breaks. Presenter: Doug Stowell is a consumer and political polling veteran in both U.S. and EU markets. His career includes Market Research Director for the Xerox Corp., U.S. Clients Director for the U.K. firm NOP, Ltd. in London and Sr. Polling Executive - Wirthlin Worldwide in Washington, D.C.. He launched Market Resource Associates, in 2008 and conducts opinion research on global issues today. He is a member of the Furman University Osher Life-Long-Learning Group in Greenville, SC and conducts ZOOM programs for more than 80 organizations world-wide.
