

THE PRINCIPLES OF DESIGN FOR LETTERING ART

A Year Long Course for Intermediate to Advanced Students of Calligraphy


Course Description

In this course taught by Cora Pearl, we will study the principles of design as they relate specifically to calligraphy and hand lettering. Lettering art is a unique art form that features text written by hand. Usual approaches to teaching design have an orientation toward working with images, rather than text. Design teaching related to text is usually oriented toward graphic design. In this course the principles of design will be explored with the needs of the calligrapher and hand lettering artist in mind, with a focus on understanding these principles in terms of lettering art rather than drawing, painting, or graphic design, as they are usually presented. Each month we will focus on one principle of design in depth. Over the course of the year we will study the principles of Contrast, Hierarchy, Emphasis, Repetition, Pattern, Movement, Balance, and Unity. The emphasis of this course will be on

learning to think more in terms of design than on the finished work, though the completion of finished pieces is part of the course. The class is more process oriented than product oriented. In addition to studying the principles of design we will also address: What is design?, understanding your creative archetype, developing a personal design process, the psychology of creativity and getting in the creative flow.

Class Structure


After our opening ritual, class starts with a lecture rich with visual images and a discussion on the principle we are studying to create the foundation for the rest of the class work. This is generally followed by an exercise in which we use the principle in a way that is specific to lettering art. There is a critique of homework pieces from the previous principle. We will have a break for lunch as well as short breaks in the morning and in the afternoon as needed. Further exercises are explored after the critique and a homework assignment is given. We end the day together with a short closing ritual. Every month you will pair up with a buddy in the class to work with in a variety of ways to help you feel supported and to bounce ideas off one another. By the end of the course you will have worked with almost everyone in this way. In between class sessions, students will work on the homework assignment using each principle of design as the focus. In between class sessions there are weekly short exercises, readings, and videos to watch in an online classroom where students can post their work and comment on each other's posts. The weekly exercises are designed to foster a deeper understanding and



practice of the current design principle we are studying, as well as addressing creativity, understanding one's personal design process, and developing a creative mindset.

The goals of this class are for students to:

- Gain a greater understanding of design
- Become articulate about the principles of design
- Build design skills and develop a bigger toolbox of creative options
- Value the *process* of creation, not just the product
- Increase self-understanding and self-expression
- Develop more self-trust and self-kindness as an artist
- Be part of creating a safe space and community for creative exploration
- Create at least eight strong design ideas for further development and completion at the student's own pace



Course Prerequisites

For the purpose of being comfortable participating in this class, students **must** have an intermediate to advanced level of calligraphy/hand lettering skill. An intermediate student of calligraphy is someone who:

- Has had at least three recent years of experience studying calligraphy/lettering
- Has experience of completing at least seven pieces of finished work
- Is comfortable and confident in at least three different styles of calligraphic writing
- Is willing and able to share their work in a classroom setting

The course is structured towards participation and community, not observation and witnessing the participation of others. Therefore, in addition to the list above, prerequisites for students of this class also include:


- The ability to commit to doing monthly homework assignments and weekly online exercises
- A *willingness* to be vulnerable, share who they are, and to communicate their needs in a respectful manner
- The ability to participate in the online component of the class

You will need to email 3-4 examples of your best work to Cora Pearl at cora@corapearlcalligraphy.com. Label each image with your first and last name and a number (ex: Lenore Long 1, Lenore Long 2, etc.) You will also need to fill out an extensive registration questionnaire.

Instructor Bio

Cora Pearl is a full time calligrapher and teacher of lettering arts. She teaches full credit classes in Calligraphy and Hand Lettering at Portland Community College, has taught various lettering arts workshops at the Oregon College of Art and Craft, independent classes and workshops in lettering and design and has taught at many conference including Letters of Joy, IAMPETH, the International Calligraphy Conference, Letters California Style, the All Oregon Calligraphy Conference, TypeCon and will be teaching at the Red Deer Calligraphy Conference in 2020. Cora received a Regional Arts and Culture Council grant to take master classes with Sheila Waters in the fall of 2015 as well as a grant to attend Seattletters, the 38th International Calligraphy Conference. She majored in Art and Art History at Oberlin College. Cora is passionate about teaching and values a holistic approach to learning based on building trust and safety in the classroom environment.

Central to my teaching style is sharing my passion and enthusiasm to inspire students to ignite their own passion and desire for greater self-expression and artistic exploration. The study of calligraphy and hand lettering requires patience, persistence and practice. My teaching philosophy is centered on supporting students in developing this core set of skills as the foundation for artistic and calligraphic growth.




Teaching Philosophy of Cora Pearl

Teaching students about the art of calligraphy and hand lettering is a dream come true for me. I love being able to share my passion and experience in the classroom and I believe that teaching at its best, is also an art form.

Students of lettering arts tend to come from different backgrounds—some students already consider themselves artists, some students have had little or no artistic training at all, some students have a background in graphic design, others simply have a love of lettering that they would like to explore further.

I like to meet each student right where they are in the learning process and in their initial skill level—my goal is to see each student move forward and grow from where they started. I encourage my students to understand their creative evolution from their own starting place to their own ending place, rather than from using an outside reference point.



While supporting students individually is important to my teaching, I also believe that having a strong classroom community is essential. We can learn so much from each other's mistakes, successes and experiences. Making art can be a vulnerable experience and having a safe supportive classroom environment helps nourish the willingness to try new things and to grow as an artist. I encourage my students to share their experiences with each other and to rely on each other for additional support. This creates an environment where students care about each other, where they support one another, and celebrate each other's growth.

Because lettering arts do require precision, and making mistakes is inherent to the process, students can easily come face to face with their Inner Critic. I like to address this phenomenon directly and gently nurture students towards greater self-kindness and self-acceptance through the process of making mistakes.

Navigating this area of this art form in a gentle manner can help give students the ability to stick with the challenge of working through building their technical skill level and solving design problems.

My approach to teaching has always been a holistic one—I believe that the ability to present words in a striking and creative artistic way is a rare and beautiful skill to possess and it also gives students a powerful new connection to the use of language and text. In addition to developing this core skill I believe the study of lettering as an art form is an opportunity to develop greater self-confidence, self-kindness, and the ability to have a more sustained, and even meditative focus. In the widest sense of what creating art can be, I see the study of calligraphy and hand lettering as an opportunity to get to know oneself better.

SESSION DATES

DEVELOPING A DESIGN PROCESS;

The Psychology of Creativity and Getting in the Creative Flow.

- All sessions include hands-on instruction and making art in class, often including introduction to a new style of lettering and/or tool;
- Weekly (usually short and simple) online exercises for each element;
- Lecture and discussion of the element including visual calligraphic/lettering examples of each;
- Discussion and instruction for increasing one's ability to get into the creative mindset.

LEARNING ONLINE;

The online classroom is a big component of the year-long course adding value in between in-person class sessions.

Students should commit to doing monthly homework assignments and weekly online exercises as well as participate in the online component of the class on CourseCraft.net website.

- To increase the student's ability to draw, analyze, abstract and create with letterforms.
- To expose students to a wide variety of lettering materials and techniques.

- To help students use the principles and elements of proper design in all of their art work.
- To cause the students to critically analyze their own work as well as the work of others.

ARRIVING LATE OR LEAVING EARLY

Arriving after the instructor has given his opening remarks is disruptive to everyone. If you are late, please quietly try to catch up - the instructor is not expected to start the lesson over.

Late arrivers should participate in the class activity and set up their stations after the lecture/activity.
