Process & 2023 Grants

We review questionnaire responses and financials annually from our agencies. Meetings are open to the parish and are held the first Thursday of the month at 1:30 in the Fireplace Room. Through the Outreach Committee, CHS made grants to 18 agencies on Cape Cod. We also donated off Cape to support relief efforts in Turkey and through the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem (earthquake relief), Israel/Gaza and Ukraine (war refugee relief) and the Endupoto primary school in Tanzania. For 2023, these awards totaled \$62,000.

We host twice-monthly club meetings via zoom for 12–15-year-olds. We also have a

Mentor-In-Training Program for 16-year-olds and a Junior Mentor program for 17-year-olds. Seventy-seven children from 60 families have been supported since our founding in 2014. Our services are available through six ministries: The Hands of Hope Food Pantry and Outreach Center provides free groceries, rental and utility financial assistance, and Christmas gifts for families throughout the mid-Cape area; A Baby Center provides young families with children up to five years old with baby essentials such as diapers, wipes, formula, baby clothing and equipment and period supplies; Faith Family Kitchen serves free nutritious meals three times weekly year round to alleviate hunger; Covenant to Care for Foster Families provides church liaisons to support foster families along with the Fostering a Dream Fund to help finance enrichment activities for foster children; Homeless Ministries provides short-term emergency hotel sheltering for those facing homelessness and also sponsors Youth StreetReach and Here Now Ministry to connect youth with our unsheltered community; Hospital Chaplaincy places a chaplain at Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital Cape Cod. FOOD FOR KIDS is a ministry of Church of the Holy Spirit in partnership with the US Department of Agriculture that works to alleviate childhood hunger on the lower/outer Cape and beyond by bringing together CHS and local communities to provide free meals for children and teens to make up for the absence of school lunches during summer months. ENDUPOTO PRIMARY SCHOOL was started in 2008 with one classroom in a remote and arid area in the Maasai Steppe in Tanzania. Presently there are over 800 Maasai girls and boys attending K-7 in 2024. The Church of the Holy Spirit donations have helped with the building of 10 classrooms, 4 teachers 'houses, 6 rainwater harvesting tanks, as well as providing daily porridge and fresh water, supplying textbooks, planting trees, and working with the government and the Massai elders. It is the Massai villagers' school and they are proud of it. The program of education continues as the students who passed the National Exam attend Oljoro Secondary School. Donations to our work at Oljoro Secondary School have helped to provide a computer, textbooks, outfitting the students, and lab materials, building a teachers' house, renovating an existing teachers 'house, building a kitchen, boys and girls dorms, latrines, classroom and completing the physics and biology labs. LATHAM CENTERS The Latham School began in 1970 as a therapeutic residential program for girls aged 8 – 22 who had traumatic backgrounds and behavioral issues. Since then, Latham has evolved into a coed program for children and adults with complex special needs, including PTSD, Reactive Attachment Disorder, Autism, Depression, Anxiety, Learning Disabilities, and Prader-Willi Syndrome. PWS is a genetic disorder that results in lifelong cognitive limitations, behavioral issues, and insatiable appetite. Without food-security and the proper treatment, PWS is a life-threatening condition. Latham is the only program in the country that meets the complex needs of children, youth and adults with PWS.

Through member contacts from the three Lower Cape High Schools and a Case Manager at Homeless Prevention Council, YOH is available to all high school students and other youth and young adults on the Lower Cape in urgent need of a safe place to stay the night, funds for rent, car repairs or food. Because LGBTQ youth and youth of color are disproportionately represented in the homeless population YOH invites speakers to raise consciousness on this issue and how this might be addressed and prevented. A YOH Scholarship is awarded to one student graduating from each of the three Lower Cape High Schools each year who has been homeless, at risk, or has overcome significant adversity.
