From the Rabbi's Desk...



We live in a time when our lives seem filled with difficult decision making. When our government shut down and approximately 800,000 workers went for a month without pay we read about people having to decide between purchasing medication and paying for food and rent. While hopefully most of us do not have to make such challenging choices, still we struggle with setting priorities.

As tax season approaches and I begin organizing all the information for the tax forms, one of the things I do is review all the donations I made this past year. While some of those donations are annual gifts (support of CBI, Hadassah, Rotary, and Magen David Adom) others were gifts made for the first time in place of other donations. This year I chose to give to the Wheelchair Foundation but not to the Heart Association. I consider where I feel my donations will do the most good and where my money might make the greatest difference. These are tough decisions that can impact on people's lives.

Not all our challenging choices are about spending our money. Where we give of our time is equally as important. How challenging it is for our children to find time for their Hebrew studies when they also have sports and drama and music commitments. While we run an excellent religious and Hebrew studies program, it does not always fit into overly crowded schedules. We hope that the added cultural activities like singing with Cantor Alisa and cooking delicious Jewish foods will help our children want to make religious school a priority, but that is not always the case. My challenge is convincing our families to make sure Jewish education is near the top of their list!

I do not want to imply that other activities are not important in our lives. At times I have contemplated missing Shabbat evening services to attend a special event at the Sunset Center. While I have not made that choice, being the rabbi being a deciding factor, I certainly understand how modern

day life can pull us away from our Jewish practices. But somehow I feel we must make Jewish education a priority for our children. Even if as adults we choose not to be overly active in the congregation, at least we were given a strong connection to our Jewish heritage. We know what we are setting aside for other priorities. If we don't give this foundation to our children, they will never have any a chance to create a strong connection to their Jewish identity.

Throughout March our Jewish Film Festival will offer 9 different events filled with great films, special speakers and some wonderful receptions. Last year almost half of our events were sold out. I was both thrilled that so many non-members took advantage of what we are offering, and saddened that so many CBI members chose not to participate in any of the movies or programs.

On August 25 this summer we will host our 32nd annual Jewish Food Festival. Last year we struggled to get volunteers to serve on the Food festival committee or work the week of the festival. Our older members who have served in this capacity for years are beginning to step down and our younger families are not stepping in to fill these roles. Again, I wonder why this is not a priority? Joining the Food Festival volunteer group is fun, strengthens our community relationships and benefits our synagogue.

We have to make many tough decisions. How we set our priorities is certainly part of that challenge. May each of us recognize the value of active involvement with our synagogue community. It certainly can enrich our lives and the lives of our children.

Our Jewish Stories featuring: A Close up on Sam Ezekiel

March brings the Carmel Jewish Film Festival, so let's hear from one the trio of its organizers, who has been a member of CBI for about seven years. Sam Ezekiel comes to Monterey County from India, via England and Canada.

Sam was raised in what he terms "The New York of India," Bombay (now called Mumbai). He remembers a childhood where a diversity of religions lived in harmony, and where people were not defined by their religion. "It was a wonderful place to grow up." Sam grew up in a conservative Jewish family in a large Jewish community with several synagogues and Jewish schools. The Jewish community was well integrated with the rest of the Indian community. After completing High School, he moved to England to seek his fortune, leaving his family behind, including his Aunt Sarah, who started the Jewish Reform Movement in India with the famous Rabbi Hugo Gryn.

He got to England at the age of 16 years (!), with \$10, one suitcase and an eagerness to learn. While staying at a Jewish shelter in London, he got a job in a factory pleating skirts, and then worked in a mechanical workshop. Eventually he landed an apprenticeship at British Telecom and became interested and adept at all things technological. Life was hard, he had to work to support his school fees but he eventually earned a computer science degree. It was in England that he met Jews first hand who survived the holocaust and learned how religion divided people. He recalls it was these survivors who showed compassion and love for diverse people because of their recent experiences of pain and loss. During this time, Sam said he was "too busy surviving - going to school, working, and starting married life to worry about identity. I saw where I wanted to go and just kept going." He said his prayers and went to Temple on the High Holy Days, but didn't integrate into the Jewish community there.

Once he and Melanie moved to Toronto in 1969, he was able to live a more Jewish life, in part because his father and siblings had moved there. The Indian Jewish community also formed Congregation BINA where many Sephardic Jews worship. Sam said "Toronto had a thriving and vibrant Jewish community with many opportunities to experience the Jewish way of life." But soon, his success in technology and business drove him in 1980 to Silicon Valley for work, and the intense life of tech companies such as IBM, Cisco and several start-ups soon consumed him 24/7. Sam held senior executive positions at these companies. He travelled many times around the globe, worked with people from many different countries and religious backgrounds. He said "there is more in people that unites us than divides and all it takes is to look for it." Sam attended services at Congregation Shir Hadash (Los Gatos) and the Sephardic synagogue Magain David (San Francisco).

After close to 40 years in Silicon Valley, in 2012, (two sons and five grandchildren later), Sam and Melanie moved to the Monterey Peninsula and they celebrate their marriage of 52 years this year. Since his arrival, he has lent his expertise to various endeavors, including serving on the Monterey Planning Commission, the outreach committee at MIIS and closely working with County, City officials and leaders of the business community. At CBI, Sam found a welcoming community, caring, well-travelled with diverse interests, compassionate and accomplished. Sam felt he had "now arrived home." He feeds his wide breadth of interests, and appreciates how we have created our unique, diverse community. He feels privileged to contribute his experience and knowledge to the Carmel Jewish Film Festival, and we are happy that he does! Thank you, Sam!

Torah tells us not to destroy what has been created, and particularly what is of use. In Deuteronomy 20:19-20, we are told not to cut down the fruit trees of an enemy while we are besieging a city, and Talmudic scholars extended this idea to protect anything useful. The laws of thermodynamics tell us that it is impossible to create or destroy matter or energy, but we can turn something useful into something useless with little effort at all. We are constantly involved in buying things, using them, and then throwing them away to take up space in landfills--or worse, to end up loose and dangerous in the environment. How can we do better at preserving the usefulness of material goods when they are no longer of use to us? Here are some ways you can help formerly loved objects find a new life in a new home (and maybe do a mitzvah at the same time!):

Yellow Brick Road


This lovely resale store is a local hero. A favorite place to find bargains in clothing, housewares, furniture, books, and more, Yellow Brick Road has donated over \$6.2 million to local charities over its 30 year history. 



Torah Connections:

Things you may have never heard of....

How often do you run into people, both Jewish and non-Jewish, who will say that they 'believe whatever the Bible *literally* says.'? When I hear this from Jewish folks I wonder if they are aware of the rich tradition we have, known as **PaRDeS**, which defines 4 levels of understanding Torah. The first level, the Pshat, is the literal level, but that is where one *starts*, not ends.

When I hear this comment from Christians, I wonder if they are aware of how it is very difficult to understand a literal translation without understanding what those literal words meant when written. For example, the famous verse in Devarim (Deuteronomy) 6:5,

"And you shall love HaShem with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your might."

It is true the Hebrew word is 'lev' which we define as 'heart', but what is not often known is that the word 'heart' means 'mind' today. In other words, 'heart' back then meant 'your being', today our word 'mind' is perhaps the closest match. Our English word 'heart' today means our 'center of feeling', which is NOT what the Biblical text is telling us. This is true for a huge number of words in the Torah.

In the Passover story of the plagues, the Torah tells us that Pharaoh consulted his 'sorcerers' as the plagues began, seeing if they could match what Moses and Aaron were doing. After the first plague,

"The sorcerers of Egypt did the same thing with their spells, and this strengthened Pharaoh's heart and he did not listen to them as HaShem had said." [Shemos (Exodus) 7:22]

This pattern continues, starting with the first plague (blood water), then the second (frogs). By only the third plague, lice infestation, we find this fascinating dialogue:

"The sorcerers did the same thing with their spells, trying to create lice but they were unable to do so. The lice were upon man and beast. The sorcerers said to Pharaoh, 'It is the finger of HaShem'..." [Shemos (Exodus) 8:14-15]

What you may have never heard before is that there is a **drosh** (3rd level of understanding) that Pharaoh's sorcerers might have been folks we have heard of, specifically **Jethro, Job, and Balaam**. Each of them may

represent a personality type, something which speaks to us still today.

Jethro, who later became Moses's father-in-law, depicts the person who sees HaShem's will, learns from it, and ultimately decides that he wants to be part of the Jewish people. He ends up helping Moses and one of the Torah 'portions' is named for him, **Yitro**, which contains the Ten Commandments. In the **drosh**, Jethro advised the Pharaoh to not murder the Israelite babies, which is not what Pharaoh wanted to hear, so he was exiled and he went to Midian with his wife and daughter.

Job, who might have **remained silent** when Pharaoh sought his advice about murdering each newborn male Israelite, also witnessed the miracles of HaShem and we hear of him later, in the book of Job. Knowing this about Job might give us some explanation as to why Job was selected for his well-known story and why he lost his family in that story, as he might have had a lot of blood on his hands, so to speak.

Balaam, who we hear about later on as the 'sorcerer for hire' when King Balak hires him to curse the Israelites, also gave evil advice to Pharaoh, suggesting that all the newborns be drowned in the river. Balaam typifies the person who is obstinate and egotistical. His life is characterized by not being open to learning or changing, and choosing to use his (God given) talents for evil.

Said metaphorically, Jethro stops his digging and then repairs the hole he made, Job stops digging but leaves the (harmful) hole, and Balaam just keeps digging the hole deeper.

The richness of the Torah starts with the literal reading, but our tradition has many tools that allow us to delve into the depths of the Torah, *a uniquely amazing and sacred text*. Our task is to use these tools so we may learn and understand, so we can better ourselves, our families and our communities.

We are commanded to be holy, and to be a light unto the nations. These tools, which help us understand the Torah, give us the ability to fulfill these objectives.




