The Sixth Lesson: John 1:1-14 (standing)

St. John unfolds the mystery of the Incarnation.

Adult Education: The Gospel of Luke

Led by the Rev. Tray Light, January 5, 9 a.m., Parish Hall

The liturgical Church recently began Year C in its three-year church cycle. During Year C, our gospel readings come mainly from the Gospel of Luke.
