We give thanks for those who have reached out to others in their communities: by delivering groceries, by making a simple phone call, by offering a gracious prayer. Keep awakening us, Loving One, to ways we can care for one another. Grant us all wisdom, grant us courage for the living....truly living of these days. Help us all to Take Heart.

For all who are grieving, for all who are dying, for all who need your healing touch. For all who need peace. For all who need hope. For all of us who long to keep singing... may we hear the music of your voice. Help us to Take Heart.



## 307 God of Grace and God of Glory
