Silent Night- Luke 2:8-20

1. Silent Night

*Silent Night was first sung at Midnight Mass on December 31, 1818 at St. Nicholas Church in Oberndorf, Austria with two male vocalists accompanied by guitar.

-An untrue legend: the story of Silent Night being written in haste for guitar, because church mice had eaten the bellows of the organ.

*The poem was written by Joseph Mohr in 1816. Guitar music was composed by Franz Gruber two years later.

*The Austrian popular singing family, the Strasser Family, popularized the song in 1832.

2. The Reaction to Good News

*Luke's birth narrative can be divided into three parts:

1. The setting of Jesus' birth as Bethlehem (Luke 2:1-5)
2. Jesus' actual birth (Luke 2:6-7)
3. The Angel's announcement and the reaction to it (Luke 2:8-20)

-This third section can also be divided into three reactions:

1. The reaction of the shepherds (Luke 2: 15-17, 20)
2. The reaction of those whom the shepherds tell (Luke 2:18)
3. Mary's reaction (Luke 2:19)

*How can we use the carol of "Silent Night" to react to the good news like the shepherds?

*How can we use the carol "Silent Night" to react like Mary?

3. Confidence in a Fearful World

* The angel told the shepherds not to be afraid, just as Jesus preached all throughout his ministry: "Do not be afraid."

-The shepherds felt terrified and overwhelmed that Christmas night in the same way those Jesus ministered to felt afraid.

-There are parts of this world that make us feel afraid as well.

*Other stories where Jesus said to not be afraid:

-Jairus at the death of his daughter

-Simon Peter at the great catch

-Peter, James, and John at the Mt. of Transfiguration

-Mary Magdalene after resurrection

-The disciples awaiting the impending crucifixion

-The ending of the Sermon on the Mount with the story of the house built on the sand and the house built on the rock

4. Good News in a Bad News World

*The angels brought “good news of great joy for all people” which caused the shepherds to celebrate.

*Much of Jesus’ life and ministry was a celebration of the good news of God rather than something boring or burdensome.

*The world around us is fallen and broken, because of sin. Rather than a political leader like the ancient Jews expected, we needed a savior then and now. Someone who will:

1. Forgive us
2. Show us a new way to live
3. Fill us with hope
