THE QUESTIONS OF SPRING

A few weeks back I was fortunate enough to join my brother John and his wife Cindy in St. Petersburg, Florida, for the sea trials on the boat they are purchasing. This is a 2021 built boat that was a bad match for the original owners. A wonderful boat with the expectation that since it just was built, it should be pretty much turnkey. Indeed, the boat is in great condition, but that did not stop the surveyor from finding several pages of items to address.



My experience in St. Pete, coupled along with preparing my own boat for the season, presented this question ... at what point do you simply ... Launch ... Go Sailing ... or Go Racing? And the obvious reason for the question is that, regardless of how new a boat is, or how prepared a boat is, there is always something left on the 'To Do List.'

Therefore, in preparing my boat for the season, as well as the first sail, I broke it down as follows (Assuming the boat is finished from the waterline down and ready to launch):

1. Safety: Whether the boat is simply going to be dropped into to a launching well at the yard, slid off of a trailer or dropped in the water via a lift, the safety gear needs to be aboard. Life jackets, fire extinguishers, medical kit, etc., all need to be aboard and in proper order. The old adage applies here, 'if the boat is in the water the safety gear is aboard ...'

2. Improvements Finished: This is a bit of a curious one, but if you started a project/improvement, and it is not finished, you are further back then you were before you started. Get the improvement projects finished.


## **THE QUESTIONS OF SPRING** continued from cover

3. Go Fast Next: This all assumes we are preparing for racing and therefore, the focus of speed is next. What makes the boat go. There is obvious overlap to #2, but here, focus on in order of importance, what will make us go faster. Is fixing the creaking floorboard a priority over rerigging and/or relocating the inhauler? (I have dozens of stories about my father electing to paint and varnish before addressing issues like rerunning halyards or addressing the rudder bearing).

4. Cosmetics: Admittedly, there are times that one can address cosmetics either alone, or at times that provide for nothing better to do. And I do believe that a clean boat is a fast boat, but don't let those details stop you from a good shakedown or practice day.

So that is probably over simplified, but that is what I came up with for my spring prep.

The sun is out, spring is here. Let's all have a great 2022 season. Sail fast and sail safe.

## SAFETY COLUMN

### **A COMPELLING CASE TO ALWAYS WEAR YOUR PFD**

On the Chicago to Waukegan race in 1992, a good friend of mine, a fellow Soling sailor, crewed on one of the boats in the race. She had been racing for some 20 years, and she loved the sport. To quote her, "I can count on two hands the times I wore a life jacket. This year's beat to Waukegan was not one of them." The skipper ordered life jackets, and she handed them to the crew while she was down below navigating. When she came on deck, she forgot to wear hers. At some point during the race, she went overboard.

When she hit the water, she began to find it increasingly difficult to breathe due to inhaling water. Her clothing quickly became saturated and impaired her swimming ability. As she struggled, she saw another boat pass by with crew members pointing at her. When they left without rendering aid, she felt despair. The survival clock started ticking, and for all practical purposes, it was fait accompli!

Coldwater reflex instinctively caused her to gasp when she hit the water. Enough water entered her lungs, and her ability to get air had ended. In addition, her body quickly began to shut down. She described being fully conscious and able to see and think clearly, but it felt like light switches shutting off her body. The water felt like it seared her throat. Within a few minutes, unable to swim, scream for help, and weighted down with her clothing, she sank. Minutes after entering the water, she was near death. She told me, "I was sinking and was helpless to stop it. The last thing I saw was a bright light and Jesus." The bright light was the sun penetrating the several feet of water above her, and Jesus was a crew member from her vessel that saw her go down. He jumped into the water, risking his life, and brought her to the surface and life.



Her crew took her to the nearest port, where she physically fully recovered. But maybe not, fully recovered. The episode disturbed her enough to quit her beloved sport of sailing a few years later. A happy life has followed. She married a fellow Soling skipper whom she met on the Mackinac race. They raised a son and are still married.

"Survival begins before the accident." Had a Personal Flotation Device (PFD) been worn, the drama of this event would have been far less. Safety training and accident analysis make it very clear that

boaters need to wear a PFD at all times! It is frustrating that boaters resist this basic rule of safety. Sailors who do not realize the risk of not wearing PFDs form a mental map of their environment. Their incorrect perception of reality lets them see what they want to see, but that made-up reality is not the actual reality. The lake is very unforgiving to the unprepared. Accidents will happen; prepare yourself for them. If you don't, you may not survive! As the victim stated, "Near drowning was the most sobering experience ... under nearly any conditions, wear a life jacket. If not for yourself – for the crew." The article's author would like to add and for those who love you:

### WEAR YOUR PFD AT ALL TIMES!

Let's be safe out there.

### **ENGINE CUT-OFF SWITCHES AND PROPELLER SAFETY**

On April 1, 2021 a new federal law went into effect that requires the operator of a boat with an installed Engine Cut-Off Switch (ECOS) to use the ECOS link. The link is usually a coiled bungee cord lanyard clipped onto the operator's person, Personal Floatation Device (PFD) or clothing and the other end attached to the cut-off switch, but there are plenty of variations on the market, including electronic wireless devices. The law applies on all "Navigable Waters of the US."

When an operator is wearing a link while underway, the engine will cut-off if the operator is separated from the operating area, an occurrence that can happen if the operator is ejected from the vessel or falls within the vessel. The shutdown of the engine is essential for safety reasons. If the operator is ejected from the vessel, the shutdown may prevent the operator from impacting the vessel's spinning propeller, and may aid the operator in safely returning to the drifting vessel.

The law applies to "Covered Recreational vessels" which means any motorized boat with 3 or more horsepower that is less than 26 feet in length and took effect on April 1, 2021.

**Operator Requirement:** An individual operating a covered recreational vessel shall use an engine cut-off switch link while operating on plane or above displacement speed.

An earlier law, passed by congress in 2018, required manufacturers to install an Emergency Engine Cut-Off Switch (ECOS). The law passed on December 4, 2018, and went into effect 1 year later. Even though it is now a law, most U.S. boat manufacturers have voluntarily installed an ECOS on their boats for decades.

The terms Engine Cut-Off Switch (ECOS) and Engine/Propulsion Cut-Off Devices are used interchangeably to denote a system that disables the propulsion engine when the operator is unexpectedly displaced from the vessel.

NEW Safety Requirement for 2022 Chicago Yacht Club Race to Mackinac: every person will have an AIS Personal MOB device. AIS (Automated Information System) uses VHF to identify, locate, vector, and in this case home in on a person in the water.

Put it on your PFD so you can be found on a dark and stormy night.



This is a new device to many, *not a PLB which uses GPS and Satellite*, the NEW REQUIREMENT is for an AIS device. This year's Race to Mackinac requires all crew members to wear a personal man-overboard AIS device. Some of these devices also transmit a DSC signal. We recommend getting one with both DSC/AIS transmit capability if you have not purchased a unit. Additionally, the Mackinac Safety Regulations all require AIS reception on all boats in the race.

The Personal MOB device, using both the AIS system and VHF radios with modern Digital Selective Calling, can attach to the oral inflation tube of your inflatable life jacket, and if you fall overboard, it will automatically activate when the life jacket inflates (and can also be activated manually).

Get rescued by your own boat: If you fall overboard, your best chance of being rescued comes from your own boat, but for this to happen, your crew needs to be immediately aware of the incident and keep track of your position while the recovery is being carried out. Yet even in moderate seas, it is alarming how fast your crew can lose sight of a person in the water.

These devices are clever, simple, and exceptionally accurate.

## WHY YOU SHOULD WEAR YOUR ENGINE CUT-OFF SWITCH LINK?

A typical three-blade propeller running at 3,200 rpm can inflict 160 impacts in one second so it is critical that you are aware of what is going on around you. Be aware:

- People in the water may not be visible from the helm
- Account for passengers before starting the engine
- Inform passengers about propeller hazard areas
- Be alert in congested areas and near swimming zones
- Take extra precaution around towed watersports
- Never permit riding on the bow, gunwale, transom, seatbacks, or other locations where an occupant could fall overboard
- Children should be watched carefully at all times – it only takes a second to fall overboard
- You would childproof your home so think about childproofing your boat
- Establish rules for swim platform use, boarding ladders, and seating
- If someone falls overboard, STOP the boat; once clear begin recovery procedures
- Warning - Never put your boat in reverse to pick someone up out of the water, always circle around going forward while keeping the person in the water visible to the boat operator at all times.





### COAST GUARD DOCUMENTATION SCAM

**RCR Yachts**, serving the boating community since 1972, provide this public service announcement:

Every year vessel owners must renew documentation with the U.S. Coast Guard which costs \$26 on the USCG website. However, private companies send out similar, official looking renewal letters that demand twice or three times the actual USCG fee. The scam sites look very similar to the official USCG site.

The Coast Guard has issued warnings about such practices, but not everyone has gotten the word and even life-long boat owners have fell victim. If you choose to renew your documentation online, the website is:



## **CORRECTION: MWPHRF CERTIFICATES FOR CHICAGO AREA OFFSHORE ONE DESIGN RACERS**

A Midwest Performance Handicap Racing Fleet rating certificate is now required for ALL Distance Race racers in the Chicago Area, including One Design classes. To facilitate a One Design boat obtaining a MWPHRF certificate for the first time, a special discount has been offered by MWPHRF.

The current fee for obtaining a new certificate of \$50 will be reduced to \$20 for new applicants through May 31st of this year only. The application process for One Design is much easier than for a regular certificate – you are not required to provide measurements or sail certs – only to attest that you are racing your boat in compliance with the Class Rules of your One Design Class.

### **BEST ON LAKE MICHIGAN AND AREA BOAT OF THE YEAR CHAMPIONSHIPS UPDATE**

The Lake Michigan Sail Racing Federation is restructuring its Best on Lake Michigan and Area Boat of the Year programs. For 2022 the following will be used to name the LMSRF Best on Lake Michigan vessel and the five LMSRF Area Boats of the Year. The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and other uncertainties have led to offering of this temporary format. In coming years watch for a restructured format for the Lake Michigan Sail Racing Federation Best on Lake Michigan offshore championship.

Member Yacht Clubs will have the opportunity to name one vessel owned by a 2022 Lake Michigan Sail Racing Federation Individual Member as its Lake Michigan Boat of the Year. When making the determination of its top competitor, clubs shall use race performance based on races held on Lake Michigan in 2022 only. Clubs petitions shall provide vessel name, owner's name, and racing results that led to the club selection. A form shall be distributed to clubs and made available at [www.lmsrf.org](http://www.lmsrf.org) for this purpose.

The Lake Michigan Sail Racing Federation Best on Lake Michigan Committee will evaluate all submitted petitions. They will first vote to determine an Area Boat of the Year for LMSRF Areas I, II, III, IV, and V. Then those top five vessels will be reconsidered and another vote will determine the Best on Lake Michigan. The winning vessels will be awarded a flag at a date and location to be determined.

### **RADIO WATCH REQUIREMENT 2022 CHICAGO TO MACKINAC RACE**

Channel 16 is to be continuously monitored as required by US government rules and regulations. On the recent Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race, the first-place boat was protested for not keeping a listening watch of VHF channel 16. A personal EPRIB belonging to a crewmember was sending out a distress signal. The person it belonged to did not know the beacon was transmitting. Rescue authorities wanted to ascertain if a real emergency existed before dispatching a rescue asset. For over 90 minutes, no one could contact the boat. The errant boat received a penalty for not keeping a radio watch as the race's rules required. She lost her first place finish.

The 2022 Chicago Race to Mackinac will have a similar emphasis on keeping a listening watch.

Some racers think that safety regulations overburden us. I understand to an extent their gripes. However, the purpose of safety regulations is to safeguard race participants. Some rules go beyond regulatory compliance, and those rules are the "RULES OF COMMON SENSE." Maintaining a listening watch of VHF Channel 16 is one of the "RULES OF COMMON SENSE."

The VHF radio is an indispensable piece of safety equipment. It can provide both victim and rescuer with a quick and accurate way to communicate an emergency. It is essential and required by law that each boat equipped with a VHF radio always listen for urgent transmissions. Last year's Chicago Race To Mackinac saw a successful rescue of a participant primarily due to the vessel in distress making a timely radio call to the United States Coast Guard. Your VHF radio is the means to contact a potential rescuer, be it a rescue authority or a Good Samaritan. Their assistance would not be possible if they did not hear the distress call.

Each boat should train all its crew on proper VHF procedures. I went to a USCG Auxiliary class on VHF radios and found it to be highly informative. I wholeheartedly endorse having the whole crew take this course. Terms such as MAYDAY, PAN PAN, and SÉCURITÉ have specific meanings, and everyone should be familiar with them. VHF radios also have DSC (Digital Select Calling) capability. Make sure everyone knows all the features of the vessel's VHF radio.

To have an effective listening watch, assign a crew member for each watch. The person assigned the listening watch should be able to hear the radio at all times. Some boats may need a repeater speaker to accomplish this task. Develop a plan to allow the VHF radio to be heard at all times. The person assigned the listening watch should be familiar with all standard phraseology and forward pertinent safety information to the person in charge. Periodically check that the radio is functioning correctly and ensure that the radio's power source is adequately charged.

The bottom line, we all need to be constantly aware of what we hear on the radio and proceed accordingly. A listening watch is common sense, and it saves lives, perhaps yours.

### **SEEKING RACE EXPERIENCED PARA SAILORS FOR TEAM USA AT U25 PARA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP**

US Sailing has announced a call to competitors for the inaugural U25 Para Sailing World Championship in the Netherlands, July 18-22, 2022. This event provides a unique opportunity for young, aspiring sailors with a disability to represent the United States on the world stage and nurture their Paralympic dreams. It also establishes a starting point for the Paralympic pathway.

Sailors must meet minimum disability criteria as defined by the Para Sailing Classification Rules:

The event will run from July 18-22 and will be preceded by a 2-day Para Development Program (PDP) clinic that will include coaching. It will be sailed in RS Venture Connect class boats, provided by the organizing authority. This is a two-person event, but individual sailors may apply and be matched with a partner by US Sailing. Participation is limited to one team per country.

Deadline for application to the US Sailing supported team is midnight PDT on May 22, 2022.

Sailors must be 25 or under as of December 31, 2022 and each team of two should, if possible, consist of one male and one female sailor. You may submit an individual or team application/resume. If you are a sailor who would like to apply and do not have a partner, US Sailing will consider all resumes submitted and may select/connect sailors to constitute a team. US Sailing will select and enter the team to compete. There will be some financial support provided by US Sailing.

## SAILED OVER THE BAR

**Joseph Anthony D'Italia**, 79, of Fort Wayne, Indiana, and Harbor Springs, Michigan, passed away peacefully on Wednesday, April 13, 2022, after courageously fighting cancer for many years, surrounded by loved ones. Born April 12, 1943, in Queens, New



York, he was a son of Anthony and Lucia D'Italia. He attended college at the Indiana Institute of Technology in Fort Wayne. He married Janet Johnson in 1965 and began a career in real estate in Toledo, Ohio. Later, Jan and Joe moved to Fort Wayne where Joe was an entrepreneur and built the successful interior construction firm, The Strahm Group. After selling Strahm Group, Joe formed Harbor Investments, a commercial real estate venture. Joe served on numerous community and charitable boards, including the Summit Club, Saint Joseph Hospital and Indiana Institute of Technology. He was a member of "The Regiment," a group of friends in the construction business throughout the Midwest, and was instrumental in forming The Drake Group, an alliance of construction material distributors throughout the United States.

Joe took a leadership role in many philanthropic endeavors serving as a mentor to hundreds of people throughout his lifetime. One of Joe's great passions in life was boating. His young years were spent on a little boat exploring the local waters in Southampton, N.Y. In later years, Joe honed his boating skills on Lake Michigan and Little Traverse Bay. Joe's sailing career began in the early 1980's with friends from Fort Wayne and eventually friends from Harbor Springs, Michigan. In the early 1990's, he took a rag-tag group of wannabe sailors, trained them, and turned his boat *Pooh IV* into a top competitor during the summer yacht racing seasons in Harbor Springs. He and his crew also participated in several Port Huron and Chicago to Mackinac Yacht Races. After his competitive sailing days ended, Joe enjoyed many years with his motor yachts traveling around the Great Lakes entertaining family and friends. Joe served as Commodore of Little Traverse Yacht Club and Lake Michigan Sail Racing Federation. He was a Life Member of Lake Michigan Sail Racing Federation. All his boats were named *Pooh* honoring the nickname he gave his wife Jan. "For those of us who were fortunate enough to be part of his *Pooh Crew*, Joe D'Italia will always be our Skipper Joe." Joe was also a world class chef who loved more than anything to cook for family and friends. He spent many hours in the kitchen making sure things were just right and taste testing along the way. 

### U.S. ADULT SAILING CHAMPIONSHIP QUALIFICATION AND ELIGIBILITY

Qualification and Eligibility

- Each Regional Sailing Association (RSA) within US Sailing may select (1) one team to apply for invitation. Determinations can include qualifying event, other event or when an event is not sailed, by resume submission from the US Sailing representing RSA.
- Each RSA must confirm their selection with US Sailing via email to US Sailing Adult Championship Coordinator before a resume can be submitted.
- RSA submission shall be open to all sailors who reside or regularly compete in the RSA.
- Team members must be members from the same RSA.
- Teams from the same yacht club may apply when each team is representing a different RSA.
- The Host club may submit a team for evaluation/selection to their RSA, when all sailors meet the entry requirements. Only (1) one team will be permitted to represent that RSA.
- Team members must be current members of US Sailing.
- Sailing organizations within the US Sailing RSA must be current members of US Sailing or team members can be direct members of their RSA if the RSA offers an individual membership.

- The number of teams selected each year is dependent upon the maximum number of boats supplied by the event host. In the event an excess number of teams apply than space permits, the US Sailing Adult Championship Evaluation Committee will extend invitations based on conditions within the Selection Process (found on the event website). Those that meet the criteria and not selected may be placed on a wait-list.
- A Submission will be considered for review once the Online Application form is complete and the Non-Refundable Application Fee is paid by the deadline date.
- The 2022 event will be sailed in Viper 640 using the championship league sailing format.
- Applications are not yet open.

#### ***US Sailing Championship Selection Process***

When maximum number of resumes exceed the number of spaces available for the event, the evaluation committee will review each application and extend invitations accordingly.

Resumes will be evaluated on the following criteria:

40% Sailor Criteria – How many major events have they competed in the past three years; the number of races in these events, number of attendants

20% – Qualified through a regatta at the Regional Sailing Association level

20% – Class Criteria – size, diversity, depth, and activity of class they consistently sail nationally

10% – sailors under 30 make up 25% of the team

10% – female sailors make up at least 25% of the team

Bonus: Additional 10% if a female is a helm

### Championship History

While youth and women had national, ladder-system championships for a quarter century, it was not until 1952 that a similar championship for men eighteen years and older was established during Robert N. Bavier, Jr.'s tenure as Executive Director of NAYRU.

The family of Clifford D. Mallory, who revived NAYRU in 1925, provided a magnificent sterling silver tureen, purportedly from the estate of Lord Nelson but according to the hallmarks more likely executed after his death for his brother. It was immediately popular, with twenty of the twenty-three district associations, now called Regional Sailing Associations, competing in the inaugural match won by Cornelius Shields of the Larchmont Yacht Club. The next year, the regulations were relaxed to permit female members of the crew but not at the helm.

Beginning in 1993 the Women's and Men's Championships were held together in alternate years. Since 2006, the event has been a mixture of a ladder series starting at the club level and a resume application. In 2009, the championships began being held together each year and the two committees merged. The two fleets used the same race course, sailed different classes of boats and enjoyed social events together.

The joint events have sometimes been hosted by two cooperating, nearby clubs – otherwise by a single club. In 2013, the regulations were relaxed further to allow women to helm as well, reflecting the fact that most boats are now sailed by a mixed crew and the championship was renamed the U.S. Adult Sailing Championship. In the past, 11 boats each representing one of the 11 US Sailing Areas were eligible for participation. To manage increased interest in the event the committee voted in 2015 to change the format from an Area based selection to a Regional Sailing Association or RSA Selection process. Still sailed on provided boats, it is run in a round robin format, providing three days of challenging racing by sailors from around the country.

### U.S. SINGLEHANDED CHAMPIONSHIP AT WEST MARINE US OPEN SAILING SERIES SAN DIEGO

The 2022 West Marine US Open Regatta in San Diego, California, has been combined with U.S. Singlehanded Championships this June 17-19, 2022. ILCA 6 for women for the Helen Hanley Trophy and ILCA 7 for men for the George D. O'Day Trophy registration is now open.

- ⊕ The U.S. Singlehanded Championship was first sailed on Long Island Sound in the Finn Class, the championship was won by the late Peter J. Barrett.

"Going into the finals today I only needed to win one race to win the event," said Women's Formula Kite athlete Daniela Moroz. "It was super light wind so there was a lot of pumping out of tacks and gybes. It was key to stay in the pressure and get to the right side of the course as quickly as possible and I ended up coming away with the win on that first race of the day and securing the gold." "It was a really fun week," continued Moroz. "We sailed a wide variety of conditions and rode almost all of the kite sizes in our kit to adapt to the wind and the sea state. It was really tough and I had some very tight battles with Lauriane Nolot [from France] but overall enjoyed a great week in Hyères."

"This week went really well for us," said 49er athlete Nevin Snow. "We learned a lot every day and we managed to stay in the top three all six days of the event, finishing off in second. We're happy with how we delivered on the goals we set out at the beginning of the event and the results that came in the process of executing on those goals." "The Palma regatta and this regatta in Hyères were our first chance to test the new mast and sails, so it was a great opportunity to gather some data," added Maggie Shea. "We found some good settings and some bad settings, and we're excited to go back to the drawing board this spring and continue progressing before the Europeans and Worlds this summer." "Hyères provided great conditions and competition for our athletes to test themselves," said USST Coach Charlie McKee. "Steph and Maggie took some lessons away from Palma, put them to good use here, and sailed really well to earn a well-deserved silver. Daniela came here focused and well-prepared, and delivered an extremely consistent and impressive performance to win the gold. In the 49er fleet Nevin and Mac came back to international competition after a long absence and shocked the fleet with

their ability to immediately perform at the highest level. Their teammates (and Palma silver medalists) Ian Barrows and Hans Henken were hugely helpful in getting Nevin and Mac back up to speed, and the cooperative spirit these athletes displayed showed the true power of 'Team' within the resurgent US skiff program." "The sailors are focused, training hard and collaborating," said Paul Cayard, Executive Director of US Olympic Sailing. "We have great coaches. There is a TEAM behind the athletes and coaches. Racing on Saturday began at 0945 with cloudy skies, a 16 mph average wind and gusts up to 20 mph, and a 2 - 3 foot chop. **57<sup>th</sup> Congressional Cup****Long Beach Yacht Club, Long Beach, California****April 19-23, 2022**

Ian Williams (GBR) and Team *Gladstone's Long Beach* won the 57th Congressional Cup – and a fifth iconic Crimson Blazer – toppling defending champion Taylor Canfield (USA) and Team *Stars+Stripes* 3 to 1 in the final matches of this thrilling five-day regatta. “This is what Congressional Cup is all about! Champagne sailing and the most exciting match racing in the world, with Ian Williams and Taylor Canfield battling it out again for the Crimson Blazer in the finals!” exclaimed Congressional Cup Chair Lisa Meier. Winners of the Congressional Cup receive the Crimson Blazer – a symbol of yachting excellence akin to The Masters’ Green Jacket, in addition to honors and prize money. “They have a long history and rivalry: Ian was first to win in 2011 and 2012, then Taylor took the Cup in 2014, 2015, and 2016. But Ian stole it back in 2017, and then they traded wins in 2018 and 2019 again! These two have been at it for two decades!” But in 2021 Williams was unable to compete due to pandemic restrictions; Canfield swept in and captured his fifth title. “And this year Ian came back with fury to win the 2022 trophy!” Meier said. “So now the score is tied with five each: the greatest number of Congressional Cup wins for any skipper in history. What a thrill and honor for Long Beach Yacht Club to host the 57th running of this well-fought and iconic regatta.” The final stage took place beneath sunny skies with moderate breeze that built throughout the afternoon. It was a shift from the first four days of racing when a brisk westerly swept the Congressional Cup Stadium racecourse with winds consistently in the high teens and 20s. Conditions were testing for the crews; every tack and jibe that much more difficult in the heavy wind and chop. In the opening two days of round robin racing, Canfield took an early lead with Williams close astern. But it was a clash for the last two spots in the semifinals, with Berntsson and Poole squeezing out their rivals in the field of 10 of the world’s top ranked match racing skippers. In yesterday’s semifinals Canfield beat Poole, as Williams defeated Berntsson, to advance the old rivals to the final stage. Today began with a fleet race for the six teams disqualified after round robin series, with Long Beach Yacht Club Permanent Staff Commodore Dave Hood’s Congressional Cup team taking first place. Then it was ‘fight on’ to determine the podium places for the 57th Congressional Cup. Racing was feverish, with heated pre-start maneuvers that continued throughout the matches, up and down the course; the teams mustering their remaining strength after a grueling week of sailing. Headsails up and down, tacks and jibes, dial ups and dial downs, and penalty flags flying: the skilled teams illustrating their superior handling and knowledge of the intricacies of match racing. Canfield captured the first match and Williams the second; with a photo-finish going to Williams in the third as he did a hasty ‘spin and win’ to strike a penalty in the last seconds of the race. In the fourth flight Williams, a six-time World Champion, took control of the race from start to finish, to take match point and his fifth Congressional Cup title. “I was devastated not to be here last year; and even more gutted now that I remember what I missed,” said Williams. “I wanted to try to be the first to five wins so it feels fantastic now to have matched Taylor. What a great competitor: to match him is fantastic; I guess now it’s a race to six!” Williams applauded his crew saying, “We hadn’t been here for three years, I hadn’t match raced for 18 months, and it’s been years for some of the guys. So we had a lot of work to do, but just kept improving every day; all the way through the finals. I can’t say enough about these guys. And a shout out to Chair Lisa Meier and the yacht club too, to turn this around six months after the last event. The 2021 event was postponed from its traditional spring timeframe to September. “It’s a testament to how hard everyone must have worked, and what great stability this regatta provides the match racing world during difficult times,” noted Williams. For Team *Stars+Stripes*, it was a disappointing result, said Canfield. “The team was pushing hard all through the end, but when you’re sailing against a really good team, any mistake is very costly: they are always going to capitalize on it. We were excited to face off in

the finals and it's obviously a disappointing finish, but it just makes us hungry to come back and win some more." In the petit final, a collision between Poole and Berntsson in the first match gave the advantage to Berntsson for the win and Poole a penalty of -.75 points, adding a twist to the series. In this 'first to two points' series Poole would need to win three matches, as he was starting with a deficit. With nothing to lose, Poole put the hammer down and won the next two races; putting the points at Berntsson 1 – Poole 1.25 and necessitating a fourth match. Victory in that duel earned him third place in this 2022 event, moving up from a fourth-place win in Congressional Cup 2021. "My guys sailed really well, building off of last year," said Poole. "How we sailed those last few races in the petit final was really the highlight of the week. "The Congressional Cup is always the top of the heap as far as the competition goes. Every competitor here took a race off of us at some point, but we love the challenge, and we love being here. We went against the best of the world and feel we can hold our heads high." The Congressional Cup has represented the pinnacle of sportsmanship and match racing skill since the first event, in 1965.

**2022 Trofeo Sofía Mallorca****Palma, Mallorca, Spain****April 2-9, 2022**

Palma Bay witnessed 10 gold medal winning performances on the concluding day of the 2022 Trofeo Sofía Mallorca. With 1,015 competitors, this regatta launched the 2022 Hempel Sailing World Cup Circuit while also marking the start of a new Olympic cycle towards Paris 2024. The Trofeo Princesa Sofía Mallorca is unique among major multi-class Olympic regattas in delivering an overall winner. This year's winners are Ruggero Tita and Caterina Banti (ITA) who take the title after dominating the Nacra 17 division. The winner is the boat with the lowest average points after dividing the total points in the regatta series by the number of races completed (including any discard). The Italians won nine of their 13 races, convincing overall winners, with 11 to 15 knot winds from the north-west, the offshore breeze made for tricky Medal Race conditions.

**Nacra 17**

Tita and Banti, as the reigning Nacra 17 Olympic Champions, started their new campaign in the most dominant form. Winning by 36 points, the Italians have mastered a revised rudder system by the Class with superior upwind performance in the foiling catamaran. "We won here in Palma in 2018," said Tita after coming ashore from winning the Medal Race. "It feels good to win four years later, at the same point in the Olympic cycle." The silver medal went to Sinem Kurtbay and Akseli Keskinen (FIN) with John Gimson and Anna Burnet (GBR) in bronze.

**Formula Kite Men**

Reigning World Champion Theo de Ramecourt (FRA) won gold in the Formula Kite Men, the first time the foiling kiteboards have been seen at a Hempel World Cup Series event. Finishing in silver was another Frenchman, Benoit Gomez (FRA), with Connor Bainbridge (GBR) taking bronze. "My overall speed was really, really good compared to the others," said de Ramecourt. "I had some good tactics which meant when I made mistakes I could come back. It is good to see the whole French team really killed it here. We are really all pushing it all the time to the next level which is really nice."

**Formula Kite Women**

After a slow start to her event, Daniela Moroz (USA) has been playing catch-up with the reigning World Champion putting the hammer down to overtake the yellow jersey of Lauriane Nolot (FRA) who had led for most of the regatta. Ellie Aldridge (GBR) took the bronze. "That was one of the most intense finals of my life for sure," said Moroz. "It was so hectic. I definitely had my work cut out on the last one because I had a bad start. I just had a good attitude to keep fighting to the end, as in these conditions anything can happen. It is never over. I kept going and took advantage of every shift and came away with a bullet. It means everything to win here, everyone is super excited to be in amongst all the other Olympic sailing classes and to be in this environment."

**iQFOiL Men**

Luuc van Opzeeland (NED) went on the attack, using the three-board final to try to grab the gold medal from Andy Brown (GBR). Although the Dutchman bettered the Scotsman as they exited the start line, Brown battled back to take the lead and secure his first victory on the Hempel World Cup Series. Nicolò Renna (ITA) stormed through for silver, relegating van Opzeeland to third place. “The French and Dutch guys were really gunning for me,” said Brown. “I like to think I respond well to pressure and I did when I messed up. I got a bit of redemption there. This is a great confidence boost. I want to go to the Olympics and win and so I needed to start winning some time and now it feels good that I have.”

**iQFOiL Women**

Hélène Noesmoen (FRA) had led all week, dominating the regatta through to the final day. With the finals format of the iQFOiL format designed for the possibility of an upset, Pilar Lamadrid (ESP) seized her moment and went on the attack. However, Noesmoen was not to be bettered and kept hold of the gold medal, with Lamadrid taking silver and bronze going to Maja Dziarnowska (POL). “It is such a nice feeling to come here and win,” Noesmoen. “Today was very intense as the wind was up and down in the one race I had to win. This is another good step for me on the journey to Marseille and the Olympic Games.”

**ILCA 7**

Michael Beckett (GBR) won gold in the ILCA 7 singlehander to beat some of the heroes of his youth, not least reigning Olympic Champion from Tokyo, Matt Wearn (AUS). Wearn has been on the comeback trail all regatta after a shocking opening day and silver was a good recovery for the Australian after languishing in 32nd on day one. Germany’s 2020 world champion Philipp Buhl (GER) took the bronze. “At one point it looked like I would be last which would not have been good at all,” noted Beckett. “Matt was winning and so would have won the event. It was unbelievably stressful until I crossed the line. I have grown up racing against these Olympic medalists and so I do know exactly how hard it is to beat them because I have never done it before. It feels good.” “Second place at the first event after the Games is good, I am happy,” said Wearn. “I had a breakage on the first day and it was a bit uphill after that. It is a bit frustrating because if I had had a decent first day then I would have been in the hunt to win, but we still have Hyères next.”

**ILCA 6**

Sarah Douglas (CAN) sailed a victory lap in the ILCA 6 singlehander Medal Race, the Canadian having already secured the gold medal with a day to spare. Hannah Snellgrove (GBR) and Vasileia Karachaliou (GRE) were already assured of medals, but it was a matter of who would beat who. The British sailor managed to get ahead of the Greek, and Snellgrove’s tight cover on her rival meant she won silver, Karachaliou taking the bronze. “I am so happy with the week and the way I sailed,” offered Douglas. “I can’t believe it. It is my first podium and my first World Cup win. I am stoked. I was kind of the queen of sixth place over the last quad and I told myself I wanted to stand on the podium on this journey to Paris 2024 and so I am so happy to start off like this.”

**470 Mixed**

Jordi Xammar and Nora Brugman (ESP) have won gold at the start of the new era of 470 Mixed competition. Men and women racing together is changing the game but looking at the podium in Palma, experience from the Tokyo 2020 Games seems to have helped. Behind Xammar, the Olympic bronze medalist, was a new Italian duo of Olympians, old friends from Rome Giacomo Ferrari and Bianca Caruso (ITA) who took silver. In bronze were the French team of Kevin Peponnet (Men’s World Champion in 2018) and Aloise Retornaz (Women’s Olympic bronze medallist from Tokyo 2020). “It’s so good to win, and even better to win in Spain,” said Xammar, who arrived at the event fresh from skipping Team Spain in the SailGP competition in San Francisco, USA. “Jordi is so great to sail with,” said Brugman. “We have made a great start to our campaign and we’re loving every moment of sailing together.”

**49er Men**

After wearing the yellow jerseys all week, Erwan Fischer and Clément Pequin (FRA) won gold in the 49er Men’s skiff. However, the French were pushed hard in the Medal Race by Ian Barrows and Hans Henken (USA) who finished in silver just three points off the gold. Mikolaj Staniul and Jakub Sztorch (POL) took the bronze. “We made a bit of a mess of our start on port tack, and we had to work hard to come back from that,” said Fischer. “We’re really happy with how we sailed in the Medal Race and all week.” Pequin added: “This is our first big regatta sailing together as a team and we’re so happy. Winning this Hempel World Cup regatta is the biggest win of our career so far.”

**49erFX**

Odile van Aanholt and Annette Duetz (NED) had already done enough to secure 49erFX gold the day with a day in hand. The Medal Race was a battle for silver and bronze, with reigning Olympic Champions Martine Grael and Kahena Kunze (BRA) battling to keep the chasing pack at bay. The points were close behind the Brazilians with Belgium, Italy, Sweden, and Denmark all in with a realistic shot at the podium. Grael and Kunze won the Medal Race to secure silver. Isaura Maenhardt and Anouk Geurts (BEL) looked good for the bronze early on, but Jana Germani and Giorgia Bertuzzi recovered from a poor first leg to move up to second by the finish, giving bronze to the Italians by just two points. “Annette and I are super happy with our regatta this week,” commented Van Aanholt. “We’re a new team and we haven’t sailed together much but we’re going in the right direction.” Duetz added: “This has been an amazing week of sailing, actually pretty windy. Palma has really delivered some great conditions.”

Conditions at Macatawa Bay Yacht Club on Saturday were cold but very manageable in mandatory dry suits. To expedite rotations with B Fleet, the second race sailed three legs and

finished upwind closer to the Macatawa Bay Yacht Club. The B Fleet took to the water in similar conditions for their first two races. During the second trip to the docks to rotate back to A Fleet, the winds shifted to 235 degrees and became more variable. Fortunately, this new breeze remained reliable enough to complete and score two more races for each fleet. Just as the fourth race for B Fleet was finishing, the wind velocity dropped significantly and the direction began to oscillate wildly, a sure sign that the expected rain/snow mix was about to arrive as was forecasted. Fortunately, everyone was able to get off the water and all the boats were put away just as the rain and snow began to fall. The day ended early at approximately 1330 hours, but everyone was happy that we were able to achieve four races for each fleet prior to the wind dying and the rain/snow starting. Sunday began cloudy with slightly warmer temperatures and dry conditions. A windward-leeward course was set for a heading of 345 degrees, but the wind velocity failed to meet the minimums required by the Procedural Rules. Rather than totally abandon sailing, everyone cheerfully agreed to simply consider Sunday a “practice day” to make up for the fact that many teams had not yet had the opportunity to practice prior to this event. The A Fleet managed to sniff and drift their way around the course for approximately one and a half races before the wind totally died, dashing the Race Committee’s hopes for providing equal practice time for the B Fleet. The Abandon flag was reluctantly hoisted at 1130 hours. As the sailors put the boats away, the skies cleared, the sun began to shine, and everyone began to feel even warmer, despite the air temperature still being only about 45 degrees. Following the presentation of trophies was the traditional dunking in the lake of soon-to-graduate seniors from host teams Grand Valley State University and Hope College, prompting lots of cheers and laughter. In the end, it was a classic, early Spring Midwest regatta weekend filled with smiles, rekindled friendships, and just enough time on the water to build excitement and enthusiasm for the (hopefully) warmer weekends ahead on the Spring MCSA calendar. We would like to thank all the volunteers that made the weekend possible: PRO Scott Corder and Lisa Corder on the signal boat; Michael and Christina Norris, Marie Colville, and Frank Reeg doing markset; Marilyn and Jan Hoffer on the safety boat, Ali Swets and Liam Walz offering shoreside support; and the MBYC Dockmaster and staff. We appreciate your passion for sailing, and we couldn’t have hosted such a great regatta without you.
