

COMPARING AP TESTING & DUAL-ENROLLMENT:

Remember, both have different benefits and uses. If a student can do both, that is best. If a student just chose one, choose Dual-Enrollment. That said, a number of Dual-Enrollment courses are not AP eligible, and a number of courses that have an AP test don't have Dual-Enrollment available. See below.
