

# Dual Enrollment vs. AP Subject Testing

## Value Assessment/Comparison

First of all, let's overview the basic differences:

- **COST:** AP = \$99 per test; Dual Enrollment = \$115 per course (earning 3 college credits)
- **How do I earn a benefit?**
  - AP – score well (3 or higher – up to 5) on AP Subject test in May
  - Dual Enrollment – earn at least a “B” in my course at Saint Agnes (full-year course uses only the spring semester final grade)
- **How do I share what I earned to colleges/universities?**
  - AP – share AP subject test score report during application process
  - Dual Enrollment – request a college transcript from University of Mary, this document will list all your student’s Dual Enrollment courses, grade earned, and 3 college credits each
- **What are graduates saying?**
  - The majority of Saint Agnes alumni in recent years are highly recommending Dual Enrollment to current students. Many Aggie grads are entering college as sophomores, shaving off 1 year or more of college courses saving a ton of money.
  - That said, AP also can benefit students when we are unable to offer a Dual Enrollment class (see below).
  - Ideally, a student will have both some successful AP subject test scores with a lot of Dual Enrollment credits; together they demonstrate college readiness and can save a lot of money in college and benefit the students enrollment into higher elective/required classes.

Let's now review the overlap of AP Subject Tests we offer vs. Dual Enrollment classes at Saint Agnes:

To begin, none of the Dual Enrollment Round 1 courses have an equivalent AP test available:

- Grade 9 - Divine Revelation; Grade 10 - The Creed; Grade 11 – Apologetics; Grade 12 – A History of Catholic Dogma; Mixed grades – Photojournalism
- Students/families are advised to take Dual Enrollment for the courses listed above!
