I think I have shared before that this is one of my favorite Christmas passages. This has been a year of darkness for many people: loss of jobs, loss of "normal" educational experiences, working from home rather than with co-workers, loss of participation in church service, lack of social time and activities with others. I find hope that the darkness cannot overcome Christ, the light of the world.

One source of light for me has been Jubilee Project. As an essential service, Jubilee Project was allowed to remain open from the beginning of the pandemic. I have been able to come to work every day, and to work with either full staff of two full time employees and two workers through the senior program, or just two full time employees. Our offices are far enough apart so that we can maintain social distancing, and we clean all surfaces that visitors touch when they come in for food or to sign up for Thanksgiving and Christmas distributions.

I am thankful that Mom no longer suffers from COPD, and that Dad did not have the devastating affects from pancreatic cancer that had been detected in his body.

Co-workers and friends from Virginia and Tennessee have been lights in this darkness. I have greatly appreciated the prayers and cards received from far and near. The community of Church and Community Workers and Deaconesses and Home Missioners has supported me throughout this time.

In the midst of this crazy year, I was able to accomplish one of my goals of biking the C&O Canal Trail with my brother and with daughter Jessica as operations manager. We camped in the C&O campsites, and biked over 30 miles each day. Although brother Tim said that the scenery did not change much, we enjoyed riding beside the Potomac River on six

beautiful fall days. I also had the opportunity to spend time with friends in Virginia and from Pennsylvania and appreciated seeing and catching up with them. Jessica and I have been able to spend some breaks from work together and went hiking over her Spring Break and camping and kayaking for her birthday in August.
