RORC Transatlantic Race

The Race:

- The 8th edition of the RORC Transatlantic Race starts on Saturday 8th November 2022 from Lanzarote to Grenada
- The race is 2,995 nautical miles across the Atlantic Ocean from west to east
- Organisers: The Royal Ocean Racing Club (RORC) in association with the International Maxi Association (IMA) and the Yacht Club de France
- The 2022 RORC Transatlantic Race will see a collaboration between two eminent yacht clubs; The Royal Ocean Racing Club and Yacht Club de France
- Supported by: Calero Marinas: Marina Lanzarote & Puerto Calero, Canary Islands & Lanzarote Tourist Board, Camper & Nicholson's Port Louis Marina in Grenada and the Grenada Tourism Authority
- The event also acts as a feeder race for the RORC Caribbean 600 which starts from Antigua each February for the 600nm race around 11 islands
- Entries include high performance monohulls, classic yachts, performance cruisers and Two-Handed teams. The RORC Transatlantic Race Trophy is awarded to the best yacht after IRC time correction
- The IMA Trophy is awarded to the best corrected time under IRC for yachts of 60ft and over
- Before the start, the fleet will be docked in two Calero Marinas: Marina Lanzarote - set in the heart of the most easterly of the Canary Islands capital, Arrecife, and also in Puerto Calero - positioned in a naturally protected enclave on Lanzarote's sheltered south coast
- The finish will be hosted by Camper & Nicholson's Port Louis Marina on the beautiful spice island of Grenada in the Southern Caribbean
- The fleet is highly diverse, with the MOD70s and fast multihulls expected to take between anything from 7 or 8 days to 11 days, with an ETA from 15 January 2022, dependent on weather conditions. The majority of the fleet will arrive in 12 and 14 days, with late finishers taking 17-20 days



Start and finish ports:

The start is off Calero Marinas – Marina Lanzarote to Camper & Nicholson's Port Louis Marina, Grenada

International competitors:

- Approx. 260 crew will be racing on 30 boats from 27 different countries: Great Britain, Belgium, Germany, USA, France, Switzerland, Ireland, Spain, Australia, Portugal, Chile, New Zealand, Russia, Italy, Netherlands, South Africa, Denmark, Norway, Austria, Sweden Finland, Antigua & Barbuda, Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Slovenia, Czech Republic
- Crews taking part include RORC regular racers, corinthian sailors seeking an offshore challenge, as well as a host of over 50 top professional sailors, with Volvo Ocean Race, Olympics, America's Cups and round the world races under their belts
- Two boats will be competing Two-Handed and others fully crewed with up to 29 crew!

Statistics and fun facts:

- As in previous years, the race has attracted a diverse range of yachts from:
- The smallest at 10m (33ft) is Jangada, JPK 1010, sailed Two handed by Richard Palmer and Jeremy Waite (GBR)
- Largest is Comanche, Vplp/verdiere 100 Super Maxi skippered by Mitch Booth at 30.46m (100ft)
- Two teams will be sailing shorthanded with just two crew: Richard Palmer's JPK 10.10 Jangada (with Jeremy Waite) - overall winner in 2019 and their third RORC Transat, and Remy Gerin's Faiaoahe - a spirit of tradition classic, built in 2006 to sail around the world. The 65ft (19.8m) cutter-rigged sloop will be raced in the IRC Two-Handed class by skippers Remy Gerin and Bernard Jeanne-Beylot. Faiaoahe
- MOCRA – multihulls – 7, including previous competitors: Multi 70 Maserati (ITA), MOD70 PowerPlay. New to the race, MOD70 Argo and two Orc50s, a new Gunboat 68 Tosca and a Maxi Multihull Ultim'emotion 2
- French teams have lifted the RORC Transatlantic Race Trophy on three occasions: Jean-Paul Riviere's Nomad IV (2015) Eric de Turkheim's Teasing Machine (2017) and Olivier Magre's Palanad 3 (2021)
- Two stand out teams racing under the burgee of the Yacht Club de France will be Jacques Pelletier's L'Ange De Milon and Remy Gerin's Faiaoahe
- The youngest crew member on file is just 18 years old: Swedish sailor Filip Henriksson will be competing on the Volvo 70 HYPR skippered by Jens Lindner, which is one of 11 11 Maxis eligible for the IMA Trophy
- The firm favourite for Monohull Line Honours is the 100 ft (33 m) canting keel maxi Comanche (CAY), skippered by Mitch Booth. Comanche holds the Monohull West-East Transatlantic sailing record (Ambrose Light - Lizard Point. 5d 14h 21m 25s) and has

taken Monohull Line Honours in the Rolex Fastnet Race, the RORC Caribbean 600, the Rolex Sydney Hobart, the Transpac and the Rolex Middle Sea Race

- Giovanni Soldini's Maserati Multi70 (ITA) is a fully-flying foiling set up, capable of lifting all three hulls out of the water. Maserati first competed in the RORC Transatlantic Race in 2016, coming second to Phaedo 3. In 2018, after a thrilling race with Peter Cunningham's PowerPlay, Maserati crossed the finish line in Grenada just 45 minutes ahead, after over 6 days of high-velocity racing

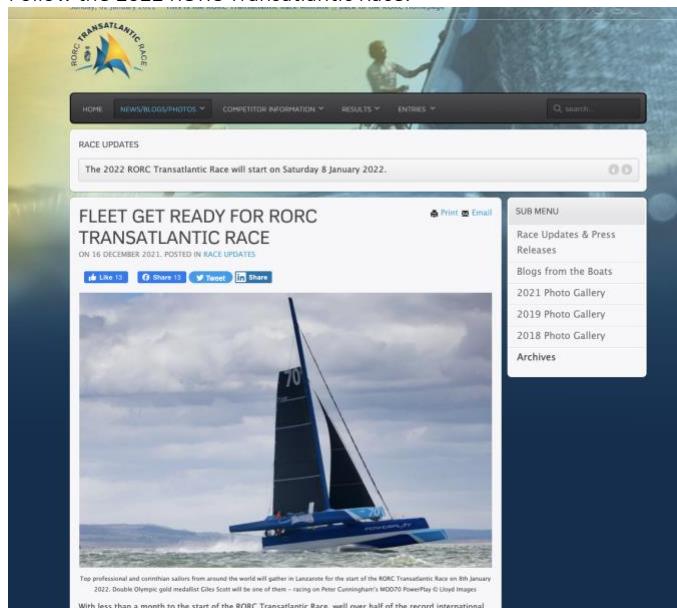
RORC Transatlantic Race Programme Highlights:

- Thursday 6th - Gala Dinner - Amura Restaurant's Terraza Atlántica, Puerto Calero
- Friday 7th - 1030 - Press Conference – Room B30 in Marina Lanzarote, next to the restaurant Lilium
- Friday 7th - 1730 - Skippers Briefing - Sala Estribor in Amura Restaurant in Puerto Calero
- Saturday 8th – 1100 (local time) – start off Marina Lanzarote, turning mark off Puerto Calero

THE ROYAL OCEAN RACING CLUB:

- Established in 1925, The Royal Ocean Racing Club (RORC) is best known for the biennial Fastnet Race and the international team event, the Admiral's Cup. RORC organises an annual series of offshore races from its base in Cowes as well as inshore regattas in the Solent
- The RORC works with other yacht clubs to promote their offshore races and provides marketing and organisational support. With the first race in 2009, the RORC Caribbean 600, based in Antigua and the first offshore race in the Caribbean, has been an instant success. The RORC extended its organisational expertise by creating the RORC Transatlantic Race from Lanzarote to Grenada, the first of which was in November 2014
- The RORC has 4,000 members and a clubhouse based in St James' Place, London. After a merger with The Royal Corinthian Yacht Club in Cowes it now boasts a superb clubhouse facility at the entrance to Cowes Harbour

- The IMA rule defines and categorises maxi yachts: it aims to embrace all maxi yachts and encourage any development that has a positive effect on the construction and performance of maxi yachts
