Reflections on the Weekend Scriptures Acts 3:13–15, 17–19 / 1 John 2:1–5a / Luke 24:35–48

• The eleven remaining apostles had just been told that Jesus had appeared to two disciples on their way to Emmaus, had walked with them, spoken with them, and eventually sat down at their table and broken bread with them. Yet, they are troubled and in fact terrified when moments later he appears to them. It is startling whenever the risen Lord appears to his disciples. Though filled with joy, they are incredulous. They wonder if he's a ghost. It takes some time for them to understand and accept that it is really him in the flesh and that he really did rise from the dead. We are those disciples now, often surprised and incredulous when we encounter him. May our understanding that the Lord can make himself known in many ways help us recognize his presence.

• It is likely that the disciples are also troubled by guilt and grief. They had abandoned him after the Last Supper. Then they are told that he had been put to death and was already buried. Not only have they lost their friend and mentor, but their entire mission appears lost. In this passage, we see that Jesus comes to them when they are troubled. Last Sunday, in John's Gospel, we heard Jesus come to Thomas when he had doubts. So it is that Jesus comes to us when we have doubts or are troubled. And his first words each time? "Peace be with you" (Luke 24:36, John 20:19). Even now, he offers peace to our troubled hearts.

• After offering them peace, Jesus calls upon the disciples to extend his peace to all the world. How? By preaching repentance for the forgiveness of sins. True repentance brings forgiveness, which can give us peace in our hearts. This is what Peter preaches in the first reading. This is what we're called to bear witness to as well.

Feeding the Flock

While the world talks about the solar eclipse we experienced earlier in the week, this may be a good time to discuss the most famous solar eclipse of all time: The eclipse occurring during the crucifixion of Christ in Jerusalem.

Three gospels note the darkening of the skies, and a common biblical translation translates this as an eclipse. But, is this accurate? Was there a solar eclipse while Christ hung upon the cross? The first difficulty in answering this is determining the date of the crucifixion itself (widely thought to be April 3, 33 AD). This is determined by reckoning the date to the date of Passover. This presents a problem in that the date of Passover is connected to

a "new moon" and lunar records do not have this occurring on that date. In fact a new moon (connected to the date of Passover, on any year) basically eliminates the possibility of a lunar eclipse. Therefore, although many have tried to change this over the years, including Sir Isaac Newton, it is impossible to reconcile a lunar eclipse with the fact of Christ's crucifixion.

So, where does this leave us? The first Gospel written, Mark, was written nearly two generations after the life of Christ. It was composed placing into written form oral sayings, stories, and elements of Jesus life spoken of at the time, probably shame including what a dark event it was....dark, as in theupon humanity of putting an innocent man to death. While this is accurate, it would add drama to the event with a three-hour eclipse of the sun (although, as we all just saw, a "total" eclipse only lasts a few moments). Even long ago, it was possible to calculate the date of an eclipse, so they were known at the time.

Lacking a physical answer as to why, we move on to a theological answer. Darkness has placed an important roll in the passion and death of Jesus both for shame and humiliation in putting him to death and also to present a proper bright setting for the resurrection on Easter. It seems that this explanation of this form would be the best one available in the face of mathematical impossibility.

Roman society presented many advantages in Jesus' time, especially the advantage of written records. It might have been a cloudy day, but there was no eclipse. Fr. Roger
