

# Minister's Musings for December From Rev. Karen Armina

I'm excited to have a great lineup of guest and lay preachers to offer you while I'm gone, and grateful for the staff and leadership of our congregation, who will carry various new responsibilities while I'm gone. I'm looking forward to hearing what you discover about yourselves in my absence, and your dreams about we'll do next, when I return. Palestinian-Chilean singer-songwriter, Elyanna, shared the song "Olive Branch" on social media when she announced the postponement of her North American tour, which was set to take place in November. This emotional song, written with the help of her mother and brother, expresses the pain of witnessing what is happening in her homeland from afar. I've watched both the original video and the heartwrenching live performance she gave at the opening ceremony of the El Gouna Film Festival. Since first listen, her melody has stuck in my mind. And when I am transfixed by a song, my first impulse is

to learn to play it. I admit, the piano cannot entirely capture the emotion of this piece. It lacks the expressive subtleties of Elyanna's voice and the way she pours her words onto the melody. But learning to play a song always helps me feel closer to it. And since I learned it, I want to share it with you. I'll be playing my arrangement during offertory on Sunday. I hope you'll take a moment this week to listen to the original and read the lyrics.

The UUA Board will officially receive the revision at the next board meeting, November 13, 2023, but it is available to you now.
