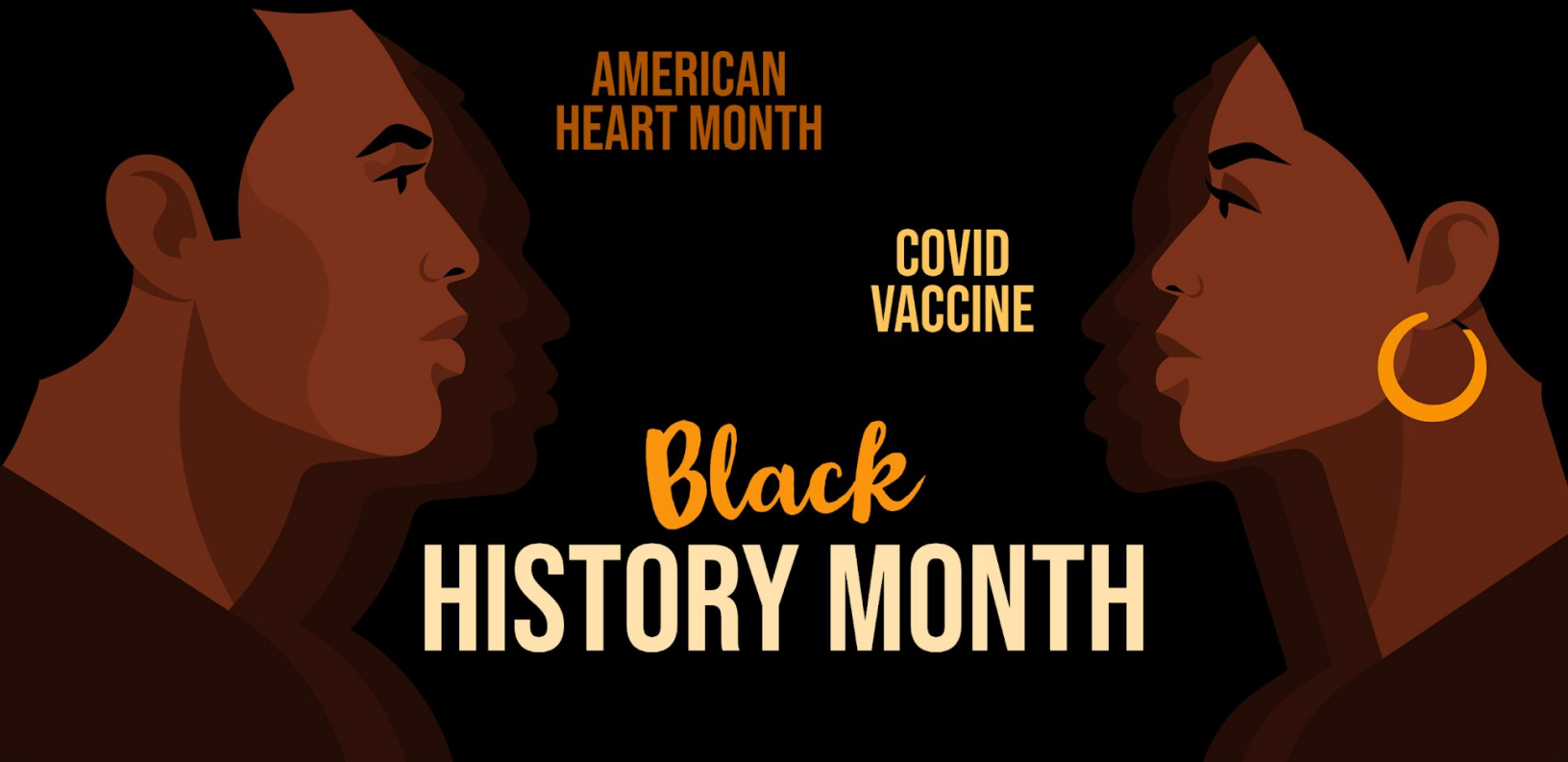

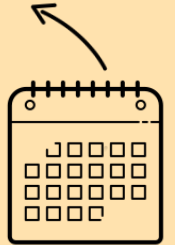

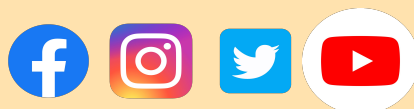

Dear Freedom Fighters,

It is said all politics are local. This is especially true as we enter the home stretch of our local elections. We must stay focused on what is at stake. We must not have short memories when it comes to who is looking out for our interest. **What is on the ballot in these elections are the thoughts and policies that will affect the lives of our families for years to come.**

Let's look at what is at stake. There are elected officials currently in office, as well as **candidates who have tried to stand in the way of government and police accountability.** They feed into **the public sphere of misinformation,** hoping you won't do your research. This information was nothing more than posturing for this election.

This election will have a number of candidates running for mayors, city councils and school boards across the quad-counties. **We must ask each candidate what is the diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) plan not for just Black History month, but every month.** There is also a 40-year African American student achievement gap that must be addressed. **We must ask each candidate their plan to close the gap** and then hold them accountable for those plans. Promises made must be promises kept.

We must also hold ourselves accountable to vote in this election cycle. **We must attend the candidates' forums and listen critically to their plans.** We must ask ourselves whether or not their plans align with our interest? We must be **we willing to show up in the same numbers as we did when we changed presidents.** We can never allow anyone to take our votes for granted or think we won't show up.

Finally, we must fight against the backlash to our historic voter turnout in the 2020 general election. We know they are grounded in baseless and racist allegations of voter fraud and election irregularities. Legislators here and in other states have introduced well over four times the number of bills to restrict voting access as compared to roughly this time last year. Thirty-three states have now introduced, pre-filed, or carried over 165 restrictive bills this year (as compared to 35 such bills in fifteen states on February 3, 2020). **If your vote is not valuable, why do they fight so hard to limit who can vote?**

Illinois Adopted The Culturally Responsive Teaching Standard On February 16. What does that mean?

Under Illinois' new "culturally responsive teaching and leading standards," approved Feb. 17, **teacher training programs will be expected to cover concepts such as implicit bias, historic inequities, social-emotional development and student advocacy.** The standards apply to programs for future teachers, principals, and school administrators but do not dictate the curriculum for public schools, which state officials stress remains in the hands of local school boards.

The HB 2170 Bill's Impact on Education

1 The legislation raises the standard creating major changes to high school graduation requirements, starting in 2024-2025.

2 Requires that schools automatically enroll qualifying students into advanced courses, such as Advanced Placement and dual credit, eliminating bias in who is selected to participate in the courses.

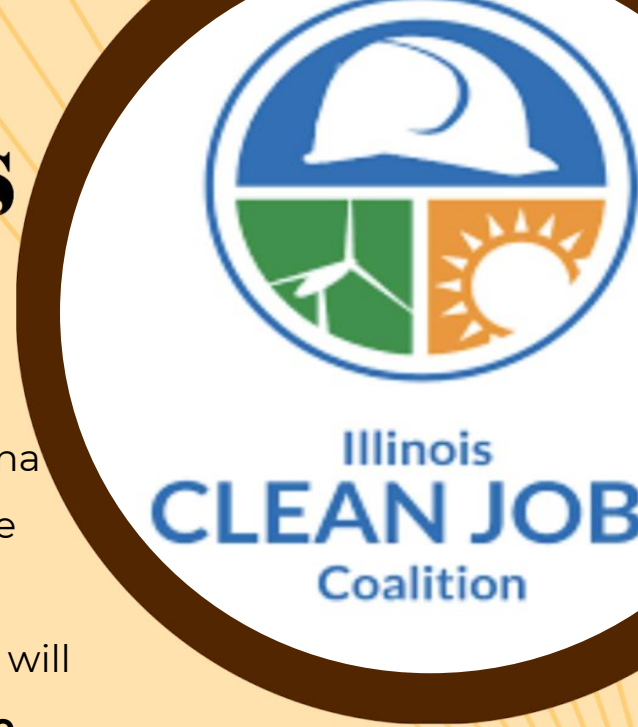

The Political Action Committee is working on a set of legislation recommendations for the General

Assembly to be included in the next **Illinois voter access legislation**. They are also partnering with several nonpartisan organizations to hold candidate forums. The nonpartisan **“Get Out The Vote (GOTV)” along with the “Local**

Elections and You: Fighting for Voter Apathy” were in session to increase voter turnout in the upcoming elections. 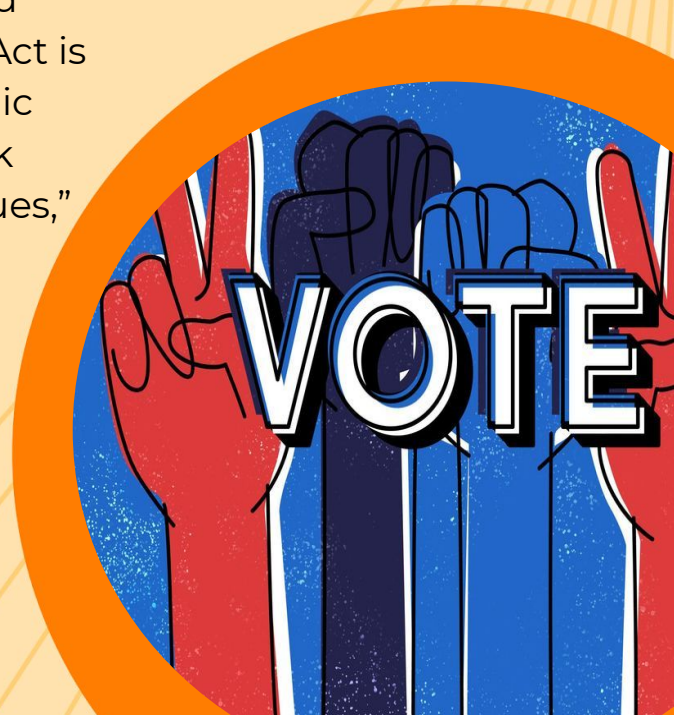

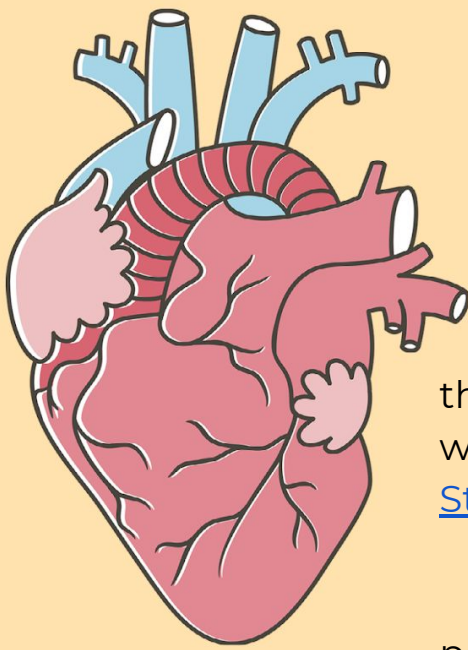
Criminal Justice Reform Panel
