## Imam Abdullah Anteppli

Imam Abdullah Anteppli is a Senior Fellow on Jewish-Muslim Relations at the Shalom Hartman Institute and Co-Director with Yossi Klein Halevi of the Muslim Leadership Initiative. He serves as Chief Representative for Muslim Affairs and adjunct faculty of Islamic Studies at Duke University, where from 2008-2014 he served as the university's first Muslim chaplain, one of only a handful of full-time Muslim chaplains at U.S. colleges and universities. Imam Anteppli also serves as a faculty member in the Duke Divinity School, teaching courses on Islam and Muslim cultures.

## Yossi Klein Halevi

Yossi Klein Halevi is an American-born journalist who has lived in Jerusalem since 1982. He is a senior fellow of the Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem where he is Co-Director with Imam Anteppli of the Muslim Leadership Initiative. He is the author of *At the Entrance to the Garden of Eden: A Jew's Search for God with Christians and Muslims in the Holy Land* and like *Dreamers: The Story of the Israeli Paratroopers Who Reunited Jerusalem and Divided a Nation*. His newest book, *Letters to my Palestinian Neighbor*, is forthcoming in May 2018.
