Why Pollinate Squash by Hand?

If you are saving your squash seeds, you need to make sure your squash plant does not cross with any other squash varieties of its own species. In order to avoid crossing, we recommend an isolation distance of 1/2 mile between squash varieties. However, this is a significantly further isolation distance than many other crop types require and is not always practical, especially for home gardeners.

In the absence of isolation by distance, we recommend hand-pollination.

Why is isolation important? Isolation ensures that a crop's flowers are not crossed with pollen from a different variety, which could lead to hybrids. A squash flower that has been crossed with pollen from another variety will not produce seeds that are true-to-type.
