This will take place at Nanpantan Hall, our residential conference centre near Loughborough, set in 8 acres of farmland, with a stunning view.

The programme will consist of joint study and a series of presentations followed by Q&A sessions on the following:

Ten principles for natural living - expanding our studies to date on: Truth & Justice; the Golden Rule; not stealing; the importance of work; the family as the ultimate unit; Mother Earth; may all be happy; just public revenue; the public realm; fundamental economic concepts.

An Introduction to Law - a new course being created and developed by the Law Faculty following last year's extensive material presentation and review. This course is intended to set out in simple steps the antiquity of our law, the stages through which it has passed - including overseas expansion – and bring us up to the present day with examples from case law. It will

remind us of how the presumption of innocence was established.

In addition, there will be smaller study sessions to review the topics presented, with plenty of time to enjoy the countryside, and discuss the issues with other delegates.

WHO CAN ATTEND?

This weekend is open to anyone with a lively interest in current affairs. There is no need to have attended a previous course in the school, nor a need for any previous qualification; nevertheless, it would help if you have followed our introductory course to Economics with Justice.

TIMING AND PARTICIPATION

Delegates will be welcome for lunch at 12.00 on Friday the 4th September to enjoy the full programme, but later arrivals can be accommodated right up to late morning on Saturday. Students can select which parts of the programme to attend. We will finish and have cleared and tidied the building by 3pm on Sunday. Accommodation is on site, in shared rooms of up to four people.
