The American College of Trial Lawyers Issues Statement Opposing Political Attacks on Judges
Says Political Attacks on Judges Pose Direct Threat to Judicial Independence

Irvine, California – The American College of Trial Lawyers (The College) today issued a statement opposing political attacks on judges, stating that such attacks are a direct threat to judicial independence.

The statement was made by Michael W. Smith, president of the American College of Trial Lawyers, on behalf of The College and its 5,900 Fellows.

Smith said, “In the midst of this heated campaign season, the American College of Trial Lawyers is concerned over recent comments and their effect on the independence of the judiciary. Political attacks on judges pose a direct threat to judicial independence. Judicial independence is not established for the benefit of judges, but for all of us. It is the *citizens* who are the beneficiaries of fair and impartial administration of justice consistent with the Rule of Law. Conversely, it is the *citizens* who suffer when judicial independence is compromised.

“On behalf of the American College of Trial Lawyers, I implore the participants in election processes, national and local, including candidates and commentators, to refrain from attacks on individual judges, who are not politicians and are in no position to defend themselves from political attacks. The judiciary has been described as the crown jewel of our constitutional form of government and as such, we must work to preserve its dignity,” said Smith.
