
Mount Zion High Holy Days 5784

Mount Zion's High Holy Day Services, Programs, and Experiences Guide to Places and Platforms:

- In person: Most of our services and programs will be in person at Mount Zion. When arriving at your first service, members and those who sign up for the High Holy Days will pick up pre-printed nametags at the Summit Avenue entrance (or kitchen door for accessibility). Please wear these nametags while in the building for all of the High Holy Days.
- Streaming: You can view all of our in-person services from home through Mount Zion's website www.mzion.org or on Mount Zion's public Facebook page. All live streamed services will be available for viewing afterwards on the website and the Facebook page.
- Zoom: We will have a Zoom room available during most of our services for those who wish to pray from home in a more engaged, interactive community. Some "online only" gatherings during the High Holy Days will be via Zoom.


Saturday, September 9 - The evening that ushers in the High Holy Days

9:45 pm – Havdalah: The brief and beautiful service at the end of Shabbat, separating between the holy and the not-yet-holy. (In person and livestreamed on mzion.org)

10:00 pm – Selichot Service (In person and livestreamed on mzion.org) We will change the Torah covers to white, listen and sing the most evocative liturgy of the High Holy Days including Avinu Malkeinu, and hear the sounding of the shofar – all in under an hour. The spiritual energy of the darkened sanctuary late at night with the entrancing music is something to experience!





Preparing for the High Holy Days:

Learn, Sing, Pray, Grow



The Hebrew month of Elul precedes the High Holy Days. During this month, we change our Shabbat evening prayerbook to *Mishkan HaLev*, a slim volume with soulful poetry and liturgy. Rabbi Adler and Rabbi Spilker will also address themes of the High Holy Days during the Shabbat services by focusing on a Hebrew concept/word that appears throughout the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur prayers.

We ask God to remember us.

Friday, September 8 (6:30 pm): CHAIM

Ultimately, we seek to be written in the Book of Life. This service – a "Shabbat for the Soul" — will feature recitations of poetry from the prayerbook in Hebrew, English, and Spanish.





Yom Kippur Fast Appeal

The more tzedakah, the more peace. - Pirke Avot

Our custom at Mount Zion is to encourage tzedakah for needs outside our walls instead of a traditional Yom Kippur appeal for the congregation. Our categories are local (Mount Zion Cemetery, our local partners of Neighborhood House, Jewish Community Action, Jeremiah Program, and Hallie Q Brown Community Center), national (Mazon: Jewish Response to Hunger and Nechama: Jewish Response to Disaster), and international (Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism, our synagogue partners in Israel).

JEWISH EFFECTIVE GIVING.

The World Union for Progressive Judaism initiated an opportunity for congregations to save lives by participating in *The Jewish Effective Giving Initiative*. For our second year, Mount Zion Temple has made a commitment to join the program. This initiative highlights and vets organizations through rigorous research and the best available data. The organizations suggested by the World Union will be "efficient at saving and substantially improving lives around the world."

Again this year, we have chosen one of the vetted organizations: **The Helen Keller Foundation**.



This foundation works to save the sight of children and adults. It works in 31 African countries, where 98 percent of affected people live. It also provides programs for people in Yemen, in the US in economically poor neighborhoods, and among the Yanomani people in Brazil and Venezuela. It works particularly to eliminate River Blindness, which is caused by a parasitic worm and can cause disfiguring skin conditions, visual impairment, and blindness. The foundation's work has eliminated River Blindness in Ecuador, Colombia, Mexico, and Guatemala. It also has provided cataract surgery for those in need. In the US students in economically disadvantaged neighborhoods were screened and more than 16,000 were provided with free eyeglasses.

Emergency Campaign for Israel

Promoting our Values; Supporting our People

The year 2023 will long be remembered as part of the Jewish people's history. The debate over democracy in the Jewish state will profoundly impact all of us.

As part of our Yom Kippur Appeal, we are inviting you to consider your largest possible investment in the people of Israel who are working for democracy, justice, and pluralism. Our new vision statement includes this support as part of our core work as a synagogue.

On the Yom Kippur Appeal, you can contribute in the "IMPJ/IRAC" space. For decades, the Israel Reform Movement (IMPJ), and its legal and advocacy arm, the Israel Religious Action Center (IRAC), have been serving on the front lines of nurturing Israel as a Jewish and democratic state – one that adheres to the vision of Israel's Declaration of Independence as a country for all its citizens; and one that Jews around the world are proud to call home.

The current government is cutting more than \$1.5 million in funding to the IMPJ and IRAC. The Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism will use the emergency funds to strengthen 54 congregations and establish new ones, and increase pluralistic, Jewish educational programming in over 100 Israeli public schools. The Israel Religious Action Center needs funds for the legal and public advocacy work in the courts and Knesset on religious pluralism, women's rights, and LGBTQ rights. Their work has literally been at the front lines in Israel which the judicial reforms are trying to undermine.

Importantly, the fight for democracy in Israel and the work of IMPJ/IRAC is intimately connected to any hope for a dignified, sustainable future for the Palestinians and Israeli Arabs, Druze, Jews, and others living together.

All who contribute will be recognized publicly as part of this campaign in alphabetical order regardless of amount. If you can join Rabbi and Cantor Spilker in contributing \$1000 or more, or if you contribute at any level that is significant for you (and if you have never given, any level, \$36, \$108, etc.), we invite you to Spilkers' sukkah for drinks and dessert and a conversation about Israel on Monday, October 2, 7-9 pm. All who contribute will be contacted by email in September.

High Holy Day Inclusion and Accessibility:

If a need arises during services, please find an usher to assist you.

- **Disability Reserved Parking** Disability parking is available on a first come, first served basis on Summit Avenue and in the lot adjacent to the kitchen. A state-issued disabled parking license is required. Drop off for those in wheelchairs or those who have mobility impairments is easiest at the alley entrance where there is a ramp and an electric door.
- ASL Interpreters are available for the following services: Rosh Hashanah (Evening and Shacharit (Morning) Service); Yom Kippur (Kol Nidre; Shacharit (Morning) Service; Yizkor service through Ne'ilah). Also available by request.
- Vision accessibility Our High Holy Day prayer book, Mishkan HaNefesh, is available in an e-reader version, and we have a small number of e-readers available. If you are bringing your own device, please consider, when possible, using one that does not emit light, as these can be less distracting to others. In addition, we offer magnifier sheets to use on top of the prayer books. We continue to encourage everyone who is able to use the printed prayer book, and large-print books are available.

- Sensory accessibility ear plugs are available to those who are sound-sensitive, as are fidget items for those who need them.
- Amplified hearing devices are available at all services.

- Accessible Seating Please arrive 15 minutes before the service(s) you are attending so our ushers can help you find a seating location that will work best for you.
- An all gender, fully accessible bathroom is located near the kitchen in the hall to the parking lot entrance.
- **Scent Allergies** We ask service attendees to refrain from using any scented products and perfumes to allow those with severe allergies and asthma to remain in the sanctuary. The flowers on our bimah are scent-free.
- Livestreaming in Harris Chapel This is available in the chapel for families and others who may need a break from the sanctuary service but still want to watch the services. The space is open to all, but please note that it is particularly designed for those with young children or others who may need to move around.
- A quiet room for adults is available in The Listening Library (inside the main library).
- Accessibility to the bimah and ark We have railings and an elevator.
- Accessible Tashlich Services Tashlich takes place on Rosh Hashanah afternoon at Hidden Falls and is accessible for those who bring walkers or wheelchairs. Folding chairs on a flat surface are available, and assistance is available to help you get to the water's edge.

Update on Mount Zion's Covid-19 policies: High Holy Days 5784

In general, SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes Covid-19, is currently circulating at much lower levels, and many in our community have vaccine-acquired immune protection against severe Covid-19 disease. However, some remain at risk, including those who are older, unvaccinated, or immunocompromised. Mount Zion no longer requires the use of N95/KN95 masks in our building, but we respect and support individual congregants' choices regarding the use of masks to protect those who may be at higher risk.

In addition to the mask-optional policy, general Covid-19 precautions remain in place at Mount Zion to protect the health and wellbeing of our community:

- **Vaccinations:** We teach the value of pikuach nefesh, saving life, and from that principle we learn that having up-to-date vaccinations, including boosters, is a mitzvah (commandment) in Judaism.
- Enhanced ventilation and air filtration continue to be a priority throughout the building when possible.
- Feeling sick? Please stay home if you're experiencing symptoms of Covid-19. We ask anyone who has tested positive for Covid-19 to stay home for at least 10 days after symptom onset or date of the positive test AND be antigen-negative on a rapid test.
- Online access: Our services will continue to be accessible remotely via Zoom and/or livestreaming and Facebook.

Imagining the High Holy Day for Children, Teens, and Families


Choose the services and programs best suited to your individual family!

Tot Services: Recommended for families with babies, toddlers, and kids in preschool or kindergarten.

Our Parents and Tots Service will be in the Sanctuary during the mornings of both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The service will begin with a gathering/activity for 30 minutes in Harris Chapel starting at 9:45 am. Both services will be accessible via streaming for those who would prefer to participate from home.

Family Services: Recommended for families with elementary age children (1st-6th grade).

This engaging service for families includes the central elements of the morning service. We will continue to use the *Mishkan HaNefesh for Youth* at our Family Services in the mornings of both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. This beautifully illustrated machzor for family and



youth is comparable to the Mishkan T'filah for Youth that we use at our Religious School T'filah services.

Children's Programs: Recommended for kids in 2nd-6th grade (without their families)

On Rosh Hashanah Day (9/16) and Yom Kippur Day (9/25) we will offer children's programming for Grades 2-6, 10:00-10:45 am. Together we will welcome the new year, 5784, and engage in hands on activities and learning together. This will be an excellent opportunity to build kehillah (community), think about what the new year may bring and of course, have fun! On Yom Kippur evening at 6:15 pm, during the Neilah service, we will have an additional children's program for Grades PreK-6 before joining the congregation for Havdalah.

Teen Services and Program: Intended for teens only (7th – 12th grade without their families)

Teen Services will be held in person at Mount Zion during the evening of Rosh Hashanah and the morning of Yom Kippur. We will use the Mishkan HaNefesh Machzor for the Days of Awe that the teens receive as a gift when they become B'nei Mitzvah (and we will have extras available). These services are intended for 7th-12th graders and will be interactive and engaging. In addition to the services, teens are invited on Rosh Hashanah afternoon for a beach cleanup and games before Tashlich at the Mississippi River at 3:30pm. Join 7th-12th graders for a Yom Kippur themed program at 5:30 pm in Johnson Social Hall. At 6:15pm we will join the congregation for Neilah.

Children are welcome at all services! We also offer childcare for children through age 8 during most of our High Holy Day services: Rosh Hashanah day (8:15am - 2pm) and Yom Kippur day (8:15am - 6:00pm). Register in advance at mzion.org to guarantee your spot.
