Letter from the Rabbi



Fall is the season of turning, of change. Though the first month of the Jewish year is in the spring when we celebrate Pesach/Passover, our tradition chose to place our "new year" of Rosh Hashanah in the seventh month when the harvest is nearly reaped, and the leaves change their colors.

Change. The proverbial given in life.

September has always been when my routine has been reinvented based on the kids' schools and their new activity schedules. When we wake up, how we juggle drop offs and pickups, all changed every year. Rachel and I just brought our youngest child to college in August, and for the first time, our schedules are now our own. So many feelings. Nostalgia and gratitude; loss and freedom.

One unwelcome freedom is now having time to worry about the world our kids have been launched into. I recently read Sholom Aleichem's *In the Storm* about three Jewish families living in the same building in Kiev who face savage pogroms and the Russian Revolution of 1905. The protagonists debate the intellectual issues of their time with eerie connections to today.

The most haunting line from the book: "The hand cannot write down in a day what a disturbed, terrified imagination can conjure up in a minute." (p. 174)

Imagination. The images that come to our minds about our lives, our times, our futures. Trauma limits expansive thinking about possibilities. I worry about that.

I worry about our imaginations.

I worry about Gen Z's and Gen Alpha's ability to hope.

It is too easy to dim our imaginations because of what we believe are insurmountable challenges. The contemporary theologian Walter Brueggemann says that this is where prophetic imagination is needed. Any one of us can access this power. "Prophetic imagination" comes at the intersection of two elements: "criticality" (clear view of world's limits and pain and needs) and "hope" (sense of its promise and possibility).

Throughout history, against many challenges, people have accessed "promise and possibility" without sugarcoating the realities faced. Our Jewish people is living proof of this ability through humor, grit, and imagination. This is our task for ourselves and for the many, many generations to come.

May you experience in this season of awe, time for reflection and renewal so that you can find the resilience of prophetic imagination.



A few months ago I read the book *Four Thousand Weeks: Time Management for Mortals* by Oliver Burkeman, and as part of my mental preparation for the High Holy Days, I picked it up again. I find it a powerful if surprising spiritual nudge, and I highly recommend it, particularly for those of you who may find your “spiritual” side harder to access. The concept of time management as spiritual exercise might seem a bit odd at first, but

as the author writes, “arguably, time management is all life is.” Unlike most books on this topic, *Four Thousand Weeks* is more focused on how best to live our “absurdly, terrifying, insultingly short” lives than, say, emptying your email inbox.

The message of the book, as you by now have guessed, could be summed up as “you’re going to die, so how are you going to spend your precious time on earth?” The jacket flap promises “tools for constructing a meaningful life by embracing finitude” (which one could easily say about Judaism as well), and the “4,000 weeks” of the title—the number of weeks in the average human lifespan, about 76 years—puts that finitude front and center. But somehow, despite intellectually knowing that we’re mortal beings, we never seem to get around to the important things. We save them for the mythical “later,” for when we’ve gotten through the other stuff.

Popular wisdom blames technology and social media: there’s a “war for our attention” going on, as anyone with a smartphone knows. But rather than victims in this war, Burkeman calls us “collaborators,” writing: “what we think of as ‘distractions’ aren’t the ultimate cause of our being distracted. They’re just the places we go to seek relief from

the discomfort of confronting limitation. It’s not usually that you’re sitting there, concentrating rapturously, when your attention is dragged away against your will. In truth, you’re eager for the slightest excuse to turn away from what you’re doing, in order to escape how disagreeable it feels to be doing it....[Boredom] demands that you face your finitude. You’re obliged to deal with how your experience is unfolding in this moment, to resign yourself to the reality that *this is it*.”

But if we have the urge to distract ourselves even from doing things that we purportedly really want to do or find enjoyable, how can we possibly do things that are difficult or unpleasant, like the honest introspection that leads to true *teshuvah*, repentance? Mount Zion has much to offer that can help you on your journey: not just our services and classes, but our library, our Elul pop-up choir for learning the congregational tunes of the season, our many Mount Zion Spotify playlists (go to mzion.org/mount-zion-music-playlists). But remember, what may be most required of you is something Mount Zion can’t provide: a willingness to be present with the discomfort of facing your finitude.

Here’s my advice: be curious rather than judgmental. Be prepared to feel uncomfortable, and when you feel it, sit with it. Ask yourself: What’s really holding me back from making the changes I want to make? The liturgy of the High Holy Days isn’t shy about pointing out our mortality and the fact that we truly don’t know how much time we have left. The discomfort that goes with recognizing our mortality and recommitting to a life of meaning is a sign you’re on the right path.

From the President



A week in the life...

Recently I stood before congregants and guests and a few first-timers assembled on the ZaiKaner-Perwien Terrace on a Friday evening for the *Kabbalat Shabbat* service. As the Board Rep that evening, I reflected on the week for all those in the folding chairs, but especially for the soon-to-be *Bar Mitzvah* sitting with his family. The ideas I shared stuck with me, and I am moved to share them with you.

That week included the saddest day of the Jewish Calendar, *Tisha B'Av*, and one of the happiest (if not as well known), *Tu B'Av*. [Learn more](#). Mount Zion saw wedding blessings, golden and silver anniversaries, a baby naming, multiple funerals and shiva visits, and a young congregant becoming *Bar Mitzvah*. That was quite the week, with our usual daily services and *Shabbat* worship, and not just the variety of holidays and gatherings, but the full span of emotions, and the first and last moments in the Jewish life cycle.

“And?” you may be asking. “That happens all the time.” Exactly. In a forest-for-the-trees moment (or the reverse, actually), I wanted the young congregant to know-to realize and to internalize—that a Jewish life was already permeating into his mind, and heart, and the bones of his day-to-day. He may not feel it or relate to it now, but he is more likely to connect with his own Jewish life earlier rather than later if we are vocal about it now. Rabbi Josh Warshawsky, in Ron Wolfson’s “Creating Sacred Communities”, reflects on the days when new melodies for Jewish prayer and song were drilled into you. “Hey, just come every week. And if you come, it’s going to seep into you and you’re going to love it, I promise.” He goes on to say that it doesn’t work for most people now, and that preparation creates greater impact for individuals.

I say let’s have a hybrid. I believe that the repetition of life cycle events—the heartbeat of our Jewish lives over time- and the conscious, intentional acknowledgement as a congregation that we share these moments, these prayers, these times of joy and pain and comfort and uncertainty, combine to achieve what one used to pick up naturally by attending services and religious school every week. Mount Zion-OUR Mount Zion-is a large part of the ‘seeping’ that makes us live and appreciate our Judaism and our community more deeply.

“And the more we devote ourselves to it, the more it grows and gives.” This line from our *siddur* (prayer book) refers to the *Torah*, but I ask you to consider that it also applies to our Judaism and our Jewish community. Try to connect with the rhythm of our holidays, our life cycle events, and our comings and goings. Try to register the ebbs and flows of emotion as we celebrate and mourn and comfort and support each other through it all. Together-as a congregation-we will be more than the sum of our parts. Together we are more than all our individual experiences because we grow and give more in the sharing.

Kivvun La'Atid: Mount Zion 2040

Kivvun La'Atid: Mount Zion 2040 is the name of a visioning process led by a task force that has met since November 2021. The purpose is to envision how Mount Zion will be a vibrant, welcoming, and inspiring Jewish spiritual home in Minnesota for generations to come. They will find this “direction for the future” (“Kivvun La'Atid”) through learning and reflection, study of trends in American and Jewish life, courageous imaginings, and conversations within and outside of our congregation. Kivvun La'Atid was imagined in Mount Zion’s 2019 Strategic Plan and is being led by an organizing group that is chaired by Amy Schwartz Moore and includes Joe Konstan, Sophia Lipset-Dean, Sue Koch, Alison Mellin, Michael Tortorello, Michael Wall, Shai Avny, and Rabbi Adam Stock Spilker. This group has guided and directed the task force’s process/curriculum for study and reflection. The task force itself includes congregants who have agreed to participate in study and reflection before setting out a vision, long-term goals, and an overarching path for Mount Zion to reach those goals. The Board of Directors will decide who else should be part of year two of this process. **Congregants will be invited to provide input at various stages in the months to come as the process moves toward conclusion in May 2023.**

What has fallen short? Where do you want to grow as a Jew? How has your family and circle of friends reacted? How have you been received by your Jewish community? Participants can expect to read short texts, do short reflective writings, and share their experiences with others.

Michael Kuhne has been a Mount Zion since 1995 when his spouse Amanda found this beloved community where inter-faith families were welcomed and valued. In between his daughter and son's bat and bar mitzvah, Michael decided to convert to Judaism. Michael has chaired Mount Zion's Tzedek committee, served as Board of Directors' president (2019-21), and currently leads the MZ Bicycle Group.

Mixed Roots: Navigating the Interfaith Household Facilitated by Jessica Griffith

This is a group open to couples, individuals, and grandparents who want a welcoming and nonjudgmental environment to discuss the issues that face a mixed-root family. We will meet four times: (1) the many facets of a mixed-roots home; (2) Life cycle events at Mount Zion; (3) Shabbat and other holiday celebrations; (4) topic of group's choice and closing.

Jessica Griffith joined Mount Zion in 2000. 


Beyond the Count Follow-up Discussion

Tzedek Committee strives to create spaces of inclusion and belonging. In keeping with this work, Tzedek is sponsoring a follow-up discussion of the [Beyond the Count](#) report on the perspectives and experiences of [Jews of Color](#). Joan will lead us in a deeper conversation about our diverse Jewish communities.

This Fall, Tzedek committee members will be supporting the Saint Paul City Council's on-going work on crafting a reparations ordinance. This is an opportunity for MZ members to provide feedback to the council and help to shape reparations work locally. More information will follow.
