The project will also incorporate 11 buildings and reinstate Brentford's historic connections to the water via a series of distinctive pedestrianised lanes and yards, paying homage to the area's integral role in industrial London's past.

What's been happening on site?

Government advice for construction industries remains that workers are allowed to travel to and work on site, while following Public Health England guidance. Based on this government guidance we are continuing to open the construction site and allow works to progress.

Safety remains our highest priority and we are doing everything available to us on our sites to maintain safe environments. We will continue to review our policy in line with daily governmental updates, and feedback from our site team and our supply chain.

What has happened on site in April?

The demolition of the last building on Catherine Wheel Road was completed, involving crushing the brick and concrete from the demolished buildings. This material will be recycled and used during the construction works.

Whilst at the south-west corner of the site, the construction of the new substation has progressed, with the reinforced concrete foundations cast and the brickwork walls built. The contractor has also poured the reinforced concrete roof slab and we're pleased to share that Virgin Media have completed their diversion works at The Ham.

Please note that our marketing suite remains closed, and the staff are working from home.

What happens next?

May is set to see the development continue apace with the demolition contractor completing its works and leaving the site, whilst the archaeological works will continue

south of Brent Way and beneath the western section of County Parade.

The new substation will be completed with new doors installed as well as a waterproofing membrane applied to the roof. In addition to this, the electrical utilities contractor will commence installing their equipment in the new substation.

The installation of the electrical ducts will start on site and on Brentford High Street, so please expect some delays on the High Street as necessary traffic management will be in place during these works.

Archaeological excavation update:

Archaeological works were paused at the end of March due to the COVID-19 lockdown, whereby the archaeological contractor left site for three weeks while the company reviewed its operating procedures.

The team has now returned to site at a reduced capacity in order to comply with the social distancing guidance, and they have re-commenced with the recording of features beneath the buildings which once stood south of Brent Way.

Rye by the Water back open for essentials!
