The following was submitted as Pastor Joe's Charge Conference Report, November 10, 2022

Will we ever get back to the way it was? ... No.

Will we ever get back to normal? ... No.

Will we ever get back to the future? ... No, that is a movie from 1985 (although a good one!)

I think we're best to focus on the first two questions for now! We yearn, I yearn for life as it was pre-pandemic, in the 90s when we were the fastest growing UM church in WV, or the 60s and 70s when I was growing up.

On my birthday, I received a card that was all the facts, experiences, and fads of 1977 which is when I graduated from Huntington High School. Judi and I loved reading and laughing at the tidbits and pictures. However, even if I wanted to go back, and I don't, I couldn't. We can't go back to the way it was. Even Nicodemus understood that he couldn't go back into his mother's womb to be born again (John 3). What he didn't understand is the new birth and new life that Jesus was talking about. For us as a church, we can't go back to the way it was, but we can experience new birth and new life for the way God is calling us in the 2020s.

The second question stimulates a follow up question, what is normal? We have different definitions and descriptions of normal. In my lifetime segregation and denying black people the right to vote was normal. In my grandmother's life, denying women the right to vote was normal. Although segregation has formally ended and the right to vote is extended to many people previously denied, there are still challenges to make our society and culture open and just. Not too long ago, it also used to be "normal" to assume everyone was in church on Sunday. But we know that has shifted. If we consider the pandemic, I believe it accelerated how our reality is changing. And maybe this becomes the "new" normal. As a society, we are more reticent to join institutions like church, commit our time to something beyond work, family, and leisure pursuits, and we seek to make decisions on how we are affected personally. The advantages and challenges of technology have changed the norm of communication, information gathering, building relationships, and have raised celebrating life events on social media as well as given more opportunities for bullying and spreading lies and threats.

It is in the present reality of life and the new normal that Forrest Burdette finds itself engaged in faithful ministry and opportunities for fruitful outcomes for enrichment and mission. It is a joy to celebrate the multi-faceted ministries of the church.

Worship is the center of our life. We have a beautiful and inspiring setting and gifted people, who are a part of the worship experience. Our current morning worship schedule is one service at 10:30. Our goal is to provide a worship celebration that blends traditional, informal, liturgical, and contemporary. Each worship service does not contain all those elements, but over a month the worshiper can experience the full range of our expression. The Vision Team is contemplating the future of worship including our Sunday morning schedule. Our music ministry is one of the hallmarks of our worship. We have a variety of quality musical expressions that move us to praise God including the choir, handbells, Praise Team, orchestra, small ensembles, and soloists. Most of the people are behind the scenes, but they are the ones who help make an inspiring worship celebration. This summer we did a worship series on

Moses and in the fall we dug into the Beatitudes. We are now preparing to start "A Season of Hope" for Advent and Christmas.

Our children's ministry has continued to offer the love of Christ to our children on Wednesday evenings and on Sundays. In addition, we have had a few intentional outreach events: Vacation Bible School, spring and Christmas musicals, and regular gatherings for all ages in our family ministries. Jayné and her crew are active in finding ways to help mold our children in the life and teachings of Christ.

Our youth ministry has remained strong. This summer we had a transition from Jeremy Daniels to David Westfall. The "passing of the mantle" took place on our mission trip to Tennessee. The youth are gathering on Wednesdays and Sundays in addition to numerous opportunities to connect with other youth and our community.

FBMUMC has had and continues to have a strong emphasis on study. Our normal includes Sunday School, Wednesday morning, and Wednesday night classes. We have Sunday School for all ages. On Wednesday morning I am teaching the Gospel of John. Our Wednesday evenings have a fellowship meal catered by a local restaurant and followed by children's and youth ministry experiences and six classes for adults.

There were two picnics this fall. The first was the cookout and activities for the entire community. We advertised through all the elementary schools in the valley and had a great response. The second was our picnic at Ed and Brenda Grant's farm. It was a lovely day, and they are gracious hosts. Our church needs to continue to find ways to engage in the community and have fellowship with each other.

This fall, we were able to complete a multi-year effort to replace our sound and broadcast system. We raised over \$72,000 for a complete replacement with most of the money coming this summer and fall. We hope the system will be in place by the end of the year.

I am excited to be working alongside a dedicated and gifted staff. Everyone is enthusiastic about Christ and the ministry that we do as a community of faith. Since last charge conference we have had several staff changes: we said thank you and celebrated the ministries of Stephanie Mills, Rev. Jeremy Daniels, and John Martin; in addition, we welcomed Ellen Bowie as our new treasurer/business manager, David Westfall as our new Minister of Youth and Young Adults, and Zach Edgell as our new Media Tech Coordinator. In addition, Jayné's title changed to reflect that our focus is about ministry; consequently, her title is Minister of Children and Family Ministries. The staff meets weekly and always studies scripture and prays, as well as plans the activities for the week, month, and seasonal emphases. In addition, we laugh and enjoy being together.

Pastoral care is an important part of our ministry and area of concern. The grief ministry led by Stacey Holley and Robbie Parsons provides space for people to share their experiences of pain and grief. In addition, they have had a luncheon with a speaker, and contact is made with all people in the church who have had a family member die. The We Care Team of lay visitors seeks to visit our homebound and folks going through challenges at least every six weeks. If you would like to be a part of this critical ministry, we can always use more visitors.

Pastoral care is a larger concern now that our Associate Pastor has left. If you feel God tugging at your heart to help in the caring ministry of the church, please let me know.

Forrest Burdette is a very generous and engaged church in missions. We are getting ready to put up our angel tree which means a lot of children will receive toys and clothes this Christmas. Our Backpack Buddies ministry with three local schools provides food for nearly 100 students every weekend. We are sponsoring Thanksgiving dinner for several local families. We are major supporters of our Community Cupboard. We support Heart and Hand with contributions of time and financial resources. In addition, we will dedicate over 400 Shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child on Sunday the 13th. We also support our United Methodist Church and the district, conference, and global ministries through our District Promotional Fund and our Fair Share of the Conference Apportionment. This allows ministry to take place throughout WV and supports mission and ministry across the world.

There are four significant challenges in front of us:

- need to grow our attendance and participation in all areas of church life,
- encourage and inspire generous giving to the ongoing ministry of the church,
- develop deep relationships with each other, and
- reach out in building relationships with our community and neighbors in ways that lead us to be invitational to church and the faith.

The Vision Team has been working since March and will help develop a vision/mission statement and a strategic plan that will chart our course into the 2030s. The church has been praying our breakthrough prayer since this summer: **"God, grant us the wisdom to know your plan for us and the strength to carry it out. Amen."** Annette Cartwright is an excellent leader of the team, and the members are committed and open to wherever God leads us. I am excited about the work of the Vision Team and its progress in discerning where God is leading us.

I know that this report is long, but our ministry is far more expansive than what can be covered in this report. I encourage you to prayerfully use this report as a call to the new normal and be engaged in ministry. Judi and I are excited to be a part of this dynamic community of faith and look forward to sharing the love and care of God with you as we move through Christmas and into the New Year.

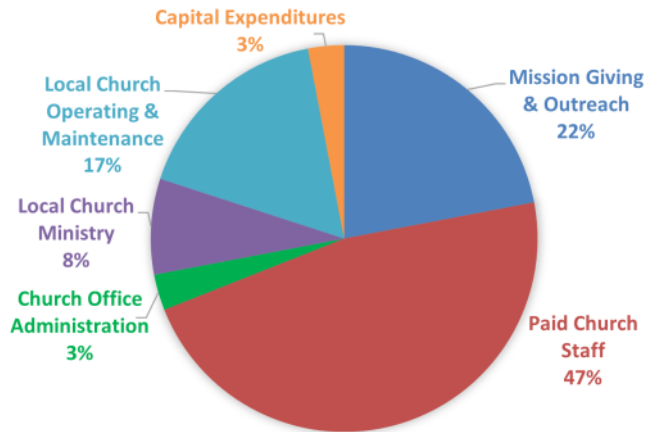
Angel Tree Report

Mission Giving and Outreach \$178,374 22%

Connectional giving is giving to the West Virginia Annual Conference to support United Methodist Ministries on a Worldwide basis, including the Midland South District, Heart & Hand, WV Conference, Ministerial Educations Fund, Africa University, and the Black College Fund, conference mission projects, campus pastors, West Virginia Wesleyan, and local ministries such as the Community Cupboard. (This figure does not include any of the general giving that our congregation makes through special offerings and designated gifts throughout the year.)

Paid Church Staff \$383,116 47%

Salaries for the Senior Pastor, Administrative Assistant, Minister of Youth & Young Adults, Minister of Children & Families, Treasurer/Business Manager, Director of Music, Assistant Director of Music, Custodian, Media Tech Coordinator, and Nursery Workers.

Church Office Administration \$27,100 3%

Church office expenses include office equipment maintenance, office supplies, postage for the monthly newsletter and other mailings, offering envelopes, Vanco fees (fees for on-line donations), and all the incidentals included in running an efficient church office.

Local Church Ministry \$61,200 8%

Local Church Ministries include evangelism, membership care, Wednesday dinners, adult ministries, Sunday School curriculum, youth ministries, college and career ministries, children's ministries, music ministries, worship, marketing, special events, delegates to Annual conference, and Website design/IT support.

Local Church Operating & Maintenance \$136,662 17%

This section of the budget covers church and parsonage utilities, general maintenance for the church and parsonage, insurance, city fire fees as well as maintenance for the piano, fire alarm, heating/air conditioning maintenance, snow removal, and van replacement.

Capital Expenditures \$24,000 3%

Church and parsonage capital expenditures beyond normal general maintenance.

Burundi: Father's Life Changed—My name is Nahimana Albert. Together with my wife Mpawenimana Pia and our children we thank God for OCC because we are now all Christians in our family. Before my son Kanty David, 9 years old, got a gift in THE NARROW DOOR church, I wasn't a good father. In fact I didn't deserve to be called a father because I was frequently drunk. My wife and my children slept hungry many times. They had no clothes, until one day my son was given a gift and a small booklet called The Greatest Gift. I started reading it secretly. I wondered what was all about this Greatest Gift. My son started The Greatest Journey and kept on telling us what they were being thought. He graduated and was given a Bible. I started reading it and decided to go and ask the pastor to help me to receive Christ in my heart. When my wife saw it, she joined me and repented. Today, we are Christians in our family, and we fellowship in THE NARROW DOOR Church. God bless OCC as you transform people's life.

Madagascar: Sharing Jesus Boldly—A shoebox recipient said, "I come from an extremely needy family. My father works in the mine and he is rarely home with us. We stay along with our foster mother and had never heard about Jesus. One lady in our neighborhood invited me to an OCC event where I received a gift box. As I went to the The Greatest Journey (TGJ) classes, my life was upside down. I am now full of joy. I became a new creature because I received a new life in Jesus. I preached Jesus to my siblings, who became Christians as well. All of us are now sharing Jesus boldly in our community. Praise the Lord and thanks to OCC."

Dominican Republic: Important to God—"One of my friends came to the farm where I was helping my uncle and invited me to go to church where they were teaching the Explorers lessons. He also said there they give us fruit juice and candies. I went with him immediately and started studying those Bible lessons. After two weeks of attending the Bible club our class teacher said to me 'because you are one of my best students now you are going to be one of my helpers.' That made me weep because at home they all used to tell me that I was good for nothing, but I understood that God made me someone important as I studied these Bible lessons."
