## 2018-19 STATE POLICY PRIORITIES

Support the State's ongoing investment in the delivery of a seamless, consistent, high-quality child care and early education system throughout California

### ACCESSIBILITY

#### Increase funding for more child care spaces



##### Alternative Payment Program (CAPP)

Expand access to flexible child care spaces for all income eligible families



##### Underserved Families

Increase child care access and investments in strength-based supports to underserved families (i.e. foster care and families living in poverty)



##### Mixed Delivery System

Support a mixed delivery of child care to meet the diverse and unique needs of families

### AFFORDABILITY

#### Increase funding for providers and families to reflect true cost of care



##### Single Reimbursement Rate Structure

Simplify reimbursement rates for all subsidized care based on true cost of providing quality care



##### Regional Market Rate (RMR) Survey

Continue to expand investments in provider payments by increasing RMR survey to 85th percentile

### QUALITY

#### Expand quality child care and early learning programs



##### Resource & Referral Partnership

Expand the critical role of the Resource and Referral system as a community-based support for parents and child care providers



##### Quality Care Settings

Create quality improvement efforts to enhance practice for all types of providers with a focus on trauma-informed care and other family-strengthening initiatives



##### Workforce Development & Compensation

Reinforce child care provider recruitment and training and advocate to improve compensation for all child care providers

### INFRASTRUCTURE

#### Strengthen the child care infrastructure to advance family well-being and economic prosperity



##### Community Support

Strengthen strategic public and private partnerships



##### Statewide Database System

Bolster investments to strengthen data systems for child care consumer education and workforce professional development



##### Family, Friend & Neighbor Care (FFN)

Advocate for fair compensation and solidify the role of FFN in the child care system



##### State Administration

Strengthen infrastructure and program collaboration among key State agencies
