Quality Start Los Angeles (QSLA) is helping to maximize the success of children and their families at participating early learning sites across Los Angeles County by supporting the professionals from licensed centers and family child care homes in the continuous improvement of their programs. Providers who participate in QSLA receive access to training, resources, and funding to support their ongoing efforts.

WHO

QSLA is led by a consortium of key early childhood education agencies in Los Angeles County, including Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE), the Los Angeles County – Office for the Advancement of Early Care and Education (formerly LAC-OCC), Child360, the Child Care Alliance of Los Angeles (CCALA) and First 5 LA.

HOW

QSLA is not only dedicated to supporting the professional development of child care providers but also strengthening families. Families receive information about what to look for when choosing the best early learning environment for their child and have access to information, resources, and community events that highlight their role as their child's first teacher.

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WHAT

Parents who are interested in strengthening their leadership skills have the opportunity to do so by participating in the Abriendo Puertas/Opening Doors program. Abriendo Puertas is the nation's first evidence-based comprehensive training program developed by and for Latino parents with children ages 0-5. The program increases parents' self confidence, parenting skills, and advocacy on behalf of their families.

WHO

Collaboration is at the heart and soul of the Abriendo Puertas / Opening Doors model. Through the support of First 5 LA, CCALA partnered with the Mexican American Opportunity Foundation (MAOF) and completed the first phase of the Abriendo Puertas pilot, which included four sessions across Los Angeles County. Participating sites included local community organizations interested in supporting parents as leaders of their families, schools and communities. The second phase of the pilot is in progress.

HOW

CCALA staff completed the Abriendo Puertas train-the-trainer sessions to facilitate ten interactive sessions for parents. These sessions draw from real-life experiences, incorporate data about local schools and communities and culturally familiar activities, are designed with parent input and grounded in a "dicho" or popular saying. Overall, these sessions help Latino parents understand their important role in the development of and long-term impact on their children's educational outcomes.
