

Message from the Rector Ways to keep cool in Advent

Dear Ones,

How are you keeping Advent this year? Maybe through trying on a new prayer practice, or reading a seasonal devotional like the Forward Day by Day (always available online [<u>Daily Prayer: A Resource of Forward Movement</u>] and in the tract rack next to our parish library).

Maybe you are revisiting books you've read in the past, like I am with the Advent scriptural meditations in Sam Portaro's *Daysprings* alongside a book of sermons and essays by Howard Thurman.

Maybe you are seeking out ways to support local charitable efforts, either financially or through volunteer service.

Maybe your Advent spiritual practice is to keep your cool and find some calm in the midst of this sometimes frantic season, of school spirit dress up days and holiday parties, work events, travel planning, gift shopping, and all the other busy-ness that goes into living in the season of Advent while the rest of the world has jumped ahead to Christmas!

During my sermon for our First Wednesday Healing Service (a Rite I spoken Holy Eucharist including anointing and prayers for healing that takes place at 12:30 on the first Wednesday of every month in the Lawrence Chapel) I mentioned a sermon I heard when I was in seminary approximately 20 years ago. It was on the occasion of a First Sunday of Advent, somewhere between 2004-2007, and its simple message of how to keep a Holy Advent has stuck with me over the decades-study, fast, pray, give alms (It works for Lent, too!)

Whatever you decide to pick up or set down this Advent season, I hope that you find a place of quiet within yourself to prepare room for the coming of the Christ child on Christmas Eve.





He Comes to Us as One Unknown Text: Timothy Dudley-Smith Tune: *Repton* (C. H. H. Parry)

Paraphrasing Albert Schweitzer's well-known meditation, this hymn reflects on the quiet and mysterious ways Christ enters human life. Set to Parry's dignified tune *Repton*, his music will be heard again during Holy Communion. This arrangement begins with the melody played by the feet, allowing both hands to accompany with rich,

legato chords.

The Best of Rooms — Randall Thompson (1963)

A leading voice in 20th-century American choral music, Randall Thompson is cherished for his lyrical writing, clarity of line, and profound sensitivity to text. Composer of Alleluia, Frostiana, and The Peaceable Kingdom, he wrote music meant to serve both singer and listener.

In *The Best of Rooms*, Thompson sets Robert Herrick's devotional poem with tender simplicity, offering a prayerful invitation to prepare the "best of rooms"—the heart—for Christ's indwelling.


Prepare the Way, O Zion - Swedish Hymn

Rooted in the Advent proclamation of Isaiah and John the Baptist, this Swedish hymn summons all people to prepare a straight path for the coming Messiah. Its lively, folk melody conveys the joy and expectancy of a world preparing to receive Christ's salvation.

O Day of Peace That Dimly Shines — Text: Carl P. Daw Jr.; Tune: Jerusalem (C. H. H. Parry)

This modern hymn text offers a prayer for the healing of the nations paired with an echo of Isaiah's prophesy. Daw's text looks toward the promised day when justice overcomes strife, divisions are reconciled, and the peace of Christ renews the whole creation. The tune is often associated with national celebrations in the UK and was memorably used in the film, *Chariots of Fire*.

What are these new signs on first floor bathrooms?





You will notice Occupied/Vacant signs on the bathroom doors on the first floor, next to the elevator. These have been added to accommodate members of the parish or visitors who need assistance from caregivers while in the restroom. Caregivers will slide the sign to OCCUPIED while in the restroom, and then will slide it back to VACANT when they have finished assisting.

We do not have a Family Restroom at St. James that is also accessible for those in wheelchairs, walkers, or in need of other mobility assistance, and so this is the best temporary solution we have found while figuring out a longer term solution.

What do I do if I need to use the restroom and the sign says it is occupied. There is another set of restrooms directly above on the second floor- simply use the elevator next to the restrooms to access those, or: knock on the bathroom door and ask if it is ok to come in.

Hospitality is a central Christian virtue, and we are trying to do what we can to be a welcoming space for all in the reality of an aging building!

MOVIE REVIEW: The Murdaugh Series

Last week for four successive nights I was transfixed by the eight episodes of Murdaugh: Death in the Family. I also confess that I was fascinated by the unfolding events of 2024 as the murders of Maggie and Paul Murdaugh pronounced "murr dock") were investigated and presented on television in real time. (The name is as Irish as the red hair.)

Of course, my initial plan was just to watch enough to see our rooms on display. But that fascination passed to the extent that I forgot to notice where the characters were and never doubted their being in their offices and halls rather than in the St. Anne's or conference room or the parlor or our hall with its telltale ramp.

What I watched was the production of a well-wrought script, expertly brought to life by a team of directors and a superb cast led by Patricia Arquette and Jason Clarke, whom I fully believed to be Maggie and Alex Murdaugh. Set against beautifully shot day and night-time sea and landscapes and glorious interiors of how the rich and famous live and, at times, lied and stole in parish rooms transformed into a law firm, the story of the latest three generations of a mighty and wealthy South Carolina family was riveting.

What is the attraction? It is the age-old morality tale of the fall of a house of mostly entitled, selfish, arrogant, and corrupt villains who will spare no one in order to have their ways until, finally, they go too far. There are only occasional glimpses of Christianity, and pretty much everyone swears and is vulgar perpetually, so be warned. The prettiness of what we see is only surface deep. Even though I read that the order of events is rearranged and some of the story is fictionalized, the overall picture is harrowing and haunting, and, finally, true to its core. This is indeed what might have happened in America, as it has in the past among medieval European royal and quarreling dynasties whose ambitions exceeded their grasp. Temporal power lasts just that long. Is this all about money and the lust for power?


