

QR Queries: How do QR Codes work?

Now that QR codes have come to St. James, they truly are ubiquitous. If you know how to use them, you can RSVP for dinner under 30 seconds with the little square at the back of the service

bulletin. The QR code on display at the entrance to the parish hall gives you a convenient way to charge your dinner. Soon, you'll be able to skip the plate offering and charge it with a QR code in the pews. (Won't the ushers be relieved!)



But if you don't know how to use them, they can be frustrating, or even alarming. "They're a scam!" said one woman who'd heard that on local radio. Another parishioner said, "I took a picture of it, but nothing happened."

To use a QR code, open the camera on your device and simply aim it at the QR code. Once the little squares are in focus and your hands are steady, a web address will pop up on your screen. Tap that address (not the shutter-button) and the desired page will open up.

QR codes are similar in concept to those bar codes that the world has known since the early 1970s. Called QR for "quick response," the little squares and spaces direct our devices to a certain web site, then to a certain page on the web site, and maybe to a particular image or paragraph on that page, all in an instant, without our having to type an address or number.

Afraid of a scam? Look for identification in the address when it pops up on your screen. For example, the QR code for next week's Wednesday night dinner will bring up this address to your screen:

You recognize "Sign Up Genius" and "Wednesday" in there, so you can relax.

Finding God in the Brushstrokes

This past Sunday, our EYC gathered to paint along with a Bob Ross video. What started as a lighthearted and silly idea quickly turned into something much deeper; an experience that was relaxing, joyful, and surprisingly spiritually fulfilling.







As I looked around the room, I was struck by the art these kids were creating. It was more than just paint on canvas. God was moving through their creativity. Each painting was a reflection of the unique heart and perspective of our youth. Even though we were all following the same Bob Ross tutorial, no two paintings were alike. The colors were different. The landscapes varied. Each one told a different story.



Bob Ross once said, "It's the imperfections that make something beautiful, that's what makes it different and unique from everything else." That quote came to life in front of me. It reminded me how God delights in our individuality and how He uses our differences to create beauty, not just on canvas, but in life.

This little art session turned out to be more than just fun; it was a quiet reminder of how God works through joy, creativity, and community. I encourage you to take a walk past our Youth Room upstairs and see the art our students have created. I am very proud of every child that comes through our Youth Program. Each person makes every Sunday a new experience.

There are several opportunities coming up for adults who seek to broaden their knowledge base and to deepen their faith in fellowship with a friendly group.

Coming up: JANE AUSTEN AND FAITH, Sunday Sept. 7th through Sunday Oct. 5th, 9:30-to 10:15, with Laura Dabundo, Professor of English Emerita and some-time scholar of Jane Austen. *Laura writes:*

It is a truth universally acknowledged that there are some Episcopalians who might like to learn more about and discuss the faith of Anglican Jane Austen (1775-1817), author of six novels, who is being widely celebrated in this, the 250th anniversary of her birth.

- September 7th, Introduction to the class and to Jane Austen's life and works*
- September 14th, Anglicanism of her day, late 18th-early 19th centuries
- September 21st, Jane Austen's three prayers and her faith (I will make these prayers available in advance)
- September 28th, a portion of a paper I will have presented at Emory U. the Saturday before, partially on her faith
- October 5th, the faith we find in Sense and Sensibility (1795, first drafted; 1811, revision published)
- October 12th , no class for I shall be at the Annual General Meeting of the Jane Austen Society of North America in Baltimore

*Motivated students are invited to start reading *Sense and Sensibility* in order fully to participate in the discussion on October 5th. Any edition is acceptable.

Pulse of the Parish

Thanks to **Kristin Picken**'s display in the parish hall, where our Library volunteers offer books culled from our collection, I picked up for free a yellowed paperback of English poetry and re-read William Wordsworth's "Lines composed a few miles above Tintern Abbey on revisiting the banks of the Wye during a tour. July 13, 1798."

Five years after the poet visited a ruined church in a clearing of woods by the River Wye, he comes back to reflect. He recalls how the beauty of this place has sustained him during times of struggle since then, and he looks ahead, too:

The picture of the mind revives again: While here I stand, not only with the sense Of present pleasure, but with pleasing thoughts That in this moment there is life and food For future years.

By coincidence, Youth leader **Riley Dugan** was working this past week on the art project that he describes so thoughtfully elsewhere in this week's newsletter. Like Wordsworth, the young artists experienced beauty captured *in their artwork*, and they experienced how the Spirit is *leading us to accomplishments which satisfy and delight us* ("A General Thanksgiving" BCP p. 836).
