



Message from Mother Mariclair
From the Pages of
Forward Day by Day

Editor's note: Mother Mariclair wrote meditations on daily scriptures for the magazine *Forward Day by Day* in its issue for the winter of 2020-2021, a time of deadly political violence and a spike in COVID deaths. Your communications director, still a teacher at that time, blogged about her meditations.

Here's Scott Smoot's post from January 31, 2021:

I've found comfort and some amusement in the pages by Mariclair Partee Carlsen, rector of a church in Pennsylvania.

Carlsen likes food.

Rev. 19.9 reminded her of Fr. Robert Farrar Capon's spiritual memoir - *cum* - cookbook *The Supper of the Lamb*. As the "alchemy" of cooking transforms ingredients into something "magical," writes Carlsen, "the rough parts" of our lives combine in "a whole that transcends its constituent parts, all through Christ's love and the heat of struggles and mistakes."

From gardening, she knows that "first fruits" (James 1.18) are the prettiest of the season, but the smaller, lumpier fruits at the end of the season are just as nutritious and frequently sweeter -- and she's sure God loves those of us who may feel more like the latter than the former.

Among all the Advent readings about dire end times, she pulls out another kitchen reference from Zechariah 14.21: When Messiah comes, even the ordinary cooking pots will be sacred as the vessels on the altar.

Rev. Partee Carlsen responds to readings from Luke 16. When Jesus says "Whoever is faithful in little is faithful in much" (16.10), Carlsen says that, just as little lies can escalate in a dangerous way, a "small instance of love

can snowball into a life lived with tenderness, compassion, and grace."

Noting in the parable of Lazarus that all the dialogue occurs between the rich man and Abraham, she wonders what Lazarus would have to say. She asks us to consider who we are in that story.

About James, Carlsen guesses that he probably "wasn't much fun to know," but she thanks God for people like him, "speedbumps for the rest of us who lack their discipline...with one toe in the fountain of life."

The ominous promise to separate sheep from the goats (Mt. 25.32) prompts Partee Carlsen to observe that all of us are goats some of the time, sheep some of the time. Drawing on several other parables of Jesus, she opines that Jesus searches for the sheep in us, "searching for us like lost coins, lighting lamps, sweeping out the farthest corners, refusing to count us as lost." She adds, "We are compelled to do this same searching" in strangers we meet.

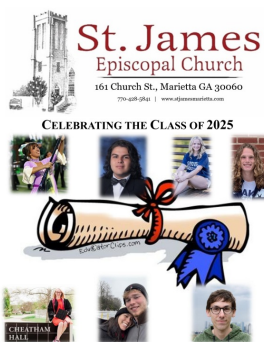

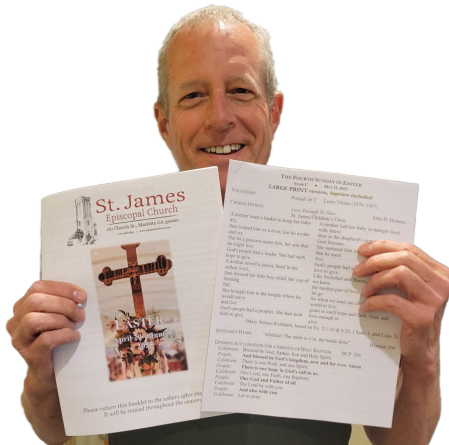


Flowers on the altar this Sunday are given to the glory of God by **Judy Auld** in loving memory of **David Auld** on the first anniversary of his death.

Pulse of the Parish

The bucks that stopped here are moving on. ("Dear Buck," said **Lanie Baxter**, "we will miss you!")

All the portraits of shady-looking lawyers have disappeared.



With them go the 2019-vintage desktop computers, boxes of fake legal documents, South Carolina lawbooks with the shelves that bore them, and heavy ornate furniture. Also gone are yard upon yard of thick cables, the trucks and cranes that filled our parking lots, and sheets of plastic wrap that protected our carpets when filming crews came in.

In other words, the filming of ***The Murdaugh Murders*** has finished. This week, the post-op crew removes the set pieces and restores our walls and halls to their ante-Murdaugh condition.

I was at church before 7a on Friday for the last day of filming **Jim Chester** relieved me around 10a. **Bill Eubanks** was here that evening from around 4p to 8:39p when the director yelled, "It's a wrap!" Bill wrote in an email that there was "much applause and hooting."

The end came not a moment too soon, according to Bill, since the thermostat had been re-set to cool the actors and crew who were crammed into our conference room with hot lights. "I won't say it was cold," Bill wrote, "but we pulled everything out of the kitchen freezers and huddled inside to warm up!"

The production wrapped early despite an unwelcome interruption. All work suspended when the fire alarm went off. Only later did Bill discover why: the Fire Safety Officer had unwittingly set off the system himself. A responsible party with the studio was relieved to hear it: "At least we know none of the crew was trying to get to recess early!"

The very next morning, a crew that Bill re-named "Tony and the Divine Dustbusters" came in to prepare the church for services. They cleared walkways, vacuumed, mopped, and wiped surfaces.

On Thursday morning this week, **Mother Mariclaire** will join **Bill**, **Jim Chester**, **Building Superintendent Erik Linso**, and the studio's site manager **Lia Towers** for a walkthrough of our campus inside and out. They will compare church furniture and decor to photographs made in January. They'll also check on floors, ceilings, walls, doors, walkways, landscaping etc. to list items for repair, cleaning, and painting.

Then this adventure will be over for good. "Unless," **Sue Hannan** wondered. "What if Murdaugh wins an appeal?" Stay tuned.
