# Stewardship Message from a parishioner Something worth caring for



According to an online dictionary, *stewardship* is the "responsible overseeing and protection of something considered worth caring for and preserving." Now let that sink in and apply this definition to this church and how we can support St. James as something worth caring for and preserving.

Think of our church as a business with different departments to manage. The first department we need to discuss is Upper Management, Staff, and Utilities. Without this department we would have no priest, musicians, communications, livestream, power, water, etc., thus lacking infrastructure for worship.

The next department is the Department of Teaching that includes The Wonderful Days program, Sunday School for our children, and adult Bible study classes and EFM.

Then there is the Music Department, starting with the new Cherub Choir and going on up to adults. This department is not only for our enjoyment and worship enrichment, but for our community.

Next, we have the Outreach Department which includes going out into the community to help other people. Programs like Reach Out Mental Health, Kitting for Charity, Support Our Troops, and support for The Extension. Here is a prayer shawl that will be given to an organization called Tunnel to Towers which helps veterans, first responders, and their families in our community.

Last is the Social Department. This is everyone's favorite area! It includes breakfast, social activities like family game night, receptions, and coffee hour. This is where we come together and talk with friends and just maybe meet new friends.

With all these different departments, this business needs you to give of your time and money to operate. Some of you are thinking "I attend church, but then I leave. I am not involved in these different departments, so why should I give?"

Think about and understand that all these different departments make an impact on your life and that of others in our community. Giving to the church is vital for supporting the church's mission. I will leave you with a Scripture verse from 2 Corinthians 9:6-7. "Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."



# Remembering The Rev. Camille Hegg



A celebration of the life of The Rev. Camille Sessions Hegg drew many old friends to St. James on Saturday September 6 at 1:00. Camille was among the first women ordained in the Diocese of Atlanta, and she served as Associate Rector at St. James from 1980 to 1998.

A number of women clergy attended including The Rev Linda Pineo and The Rev Dr Patricia Miller who have served as interim priests at St. James. The Rev Hazel Glover, The Rev Claiborne Jones, and The Rev Nan Baxter assisted the Rector for the service.

Camille's daughter read a lovely remembrance of her mother, and Camille's grandchildren wrote poignant farewells that were printed in the service program.

A number of former parishioners attended the service: Dr Ruth Hepler, Ann and Kent Canipe, Patty Latch, Katie Dater, Liz Barker Welch, Rachel Warden Smith, and Carol Hagan, who

Other parishioners shared some memories for *The Bells*. Mary Nimsgern writes,



# **Sports News**

Baseball pro Charlie Condon has been back in the news, lately. He attended St. James with his family for many years and graduated from the Walker School (where Scott Smoot taught him in middle school). At the University of Georgia, he was a walk-on player who attracted national attention. He was second pick in the draft, and played awhile with the Colorado Rockies. After injury, he was sent to the Minor Leagues to recover. His story, according to an AI summary of media reports, is one of "mental fortitude" and spirit.



*AI writes*: From August 10-23, Condon had a remarkable stretch, slashing .324/.468/.919 with six home runs, including four in a three-game span. Since August 1, Condon has maintained an impressive .297/.415/.624 slash line, hitting eight homers and driving in 22 RBIs in 28 games. He ranks third in the Eastern League during this period in home runs, RBIs, slugging, and OPS (1.039).

Condon has had to deal with injuries earlier in the season. He suffered a broken right wrist during spring training.

The minor league journey is challenging, and Condon acknowledges the mental aspect of dealing with "ruts" and injuries. He is focused on building his mental fortitude and believes playing meaningful games with Hartford, who are in playoff contention, will help with this. Condon is a strong believer in himself and his process, despite external opinions or setbacks.
