A theme in Sunday's liturgy is how we in the Church must do our work even while others may reap rewards. "Don't lose heart," we read in Habakkuk. At a discouraging time, Paul lays hands on Timothy to rekindle his heart. Jesus asks rhetorically if servants who do just what they are supposed to do deserve any special reward.

The hymns we'll sing echo those themes. Hymn 3 describes serving God from sunrise to bedtime. Hymn 541 expands the meaning of its title, *Ora Labora*, that *work is prayer*, "a high calling [even] angels cannot share." In Hymn 704, Samuel Sebastian Wesley writes music for words by his uncle Charles Wesley, asking for God to light a candle in our hearts with "celestial fire."

A favorite of many priests is Hymn 312, composed for the 1940 Hymnal by David McKinley Williams. In the text from ancient Syrian liturgy, the poet prays that God will "Strengthen for service...the hands that holy things have taken" in the Eucharist, and will keep the tongues that sang "holy" in church from speaking any deceit. There are verses for ears, eyes, and feet, too -- the whole body of Christ!

The anthem tells us to remember, when discouraged, that God "reigneth," and that "they heart's wishes hath been granted by what He ordaineth." German composer Hugo Distler (1908-1942) set Hymn 390 ("Praise to the Lord"). It sounds light as a Renaissance motet, but it's crafted with 20th century techniques such as changing meters and tricky syncopations. Distler's intricacies are for fun: the high voices rhapsodize on the word "music"; the low voices make an echo after the word "resound" and ring the last word like ponderous tower bells, while the high voices chirp like birds.

"A masterpiece doesn't have to be a big dramatic number," said music director Bryan Black. "A masterpiece can be like a precision-engineered pocket watch." Living by the motto *ora labora*, Hugo Distler expressed intense religious faith in his work, for which the Nazi regime labeled his music "degenerate." He ended his short life in despair, leaving behind the gift of his joyful music.

Let them be restrained or in a carrier, please.








Retreat at St. James "Prayer and Mindfulness"

Call for Vestry Nominations

At our Annual Meeting on Nov 16, 2025, we will be electing 4 new vestry members.

Candidates for Vestry must be a member of St. James in good standing, which means:

- Not less than 18 years of age
- Baptized, as recognized by the Episcopal Church
- Confirmed or Received in the Episcopal Church
- On the membership rolls of St. James either through baptism here, confirmation or reception into the parish, or a recorded transfer of membership from another Episcopal Church to St. James.
- A regular communicant of the parish, having received Holy Communion at St. James at least three times in the preceding year,
- Is known to the Rector or Treasurer as having made and maintained a financial commitment (pledge) in support of St. James in the preceding year.

In addition the Candidate should evidence:

- A commitment to Jesus Christ, the Gospel, and His Church
- Regular attendance at church services
- Good stewardship in all areas of our Church life
- The acceptance of responsibility to attend Vestry meetings (the 3rd Monday of each month at 7PM), annual Vestry retreat (Jan 30-31, 2026), and a commitment to complete one's term on the Vestry.

If you would like to nominate yourself or someone else as a Candidate, please usethis <u>form</u>. If you are nominating someone other than yourself, please first obtain their consent.

Mail the form to St. James, 161 Church Street, Marietta GA 30060attn: Vestry Nomination. Sundays, you may drop the completed form in the plate or slide it under the door to the church office.
