Stewardship Message from a parishioner Why I give to St. James

Good Morning. I am Pete Goodwin, your Treasurer.

Put your calculators away: you will be relieved to hear that I'm not about to provide a financial report!

Actually, that would have been relatively easy compared with the question I am meant to address this morning: Why do I give to St. James — both in terms of time and money? Why give to the church generally or to this or any church in particular?

The short answer is because St. James is my spiritual home. By that, I don't mean the buildings and grounds – I mean the St. James community – I mean all of you. Here, amongst you, I met Jesus for the first time and learned that Jesus saves us, not only for the world to come, but also for the world we are in right now.

Before I first came to St. James almost 10 years ago, I

attended many churches over many decades — including Presbyterian, Congregationalist, Unitarian, Methodist, and Anglican churches. I called myself a Christian, but I followed my own lights rather than Jesus Christ. Jesus, to me, was a sort of "life coach" I brought in only when I was in over my head, rather than my creator, redeemer, and sustainer.

When it came to giving to the church, whichever church I happened to be attending at the time, my giving tended toward being what Jesus warns us against when we give: it was competitive, seeking of praise, transactional, and an act mostly in service of ego. I worried how my gift stacked up against others. I worried about recognition and praise. And I worried if I was making a good deal – what was I getting from the church in return?

Despite occasional pangs of guilt, my efforts were not strong enough to change my giving behavior or my cynical attitude toward giving. Change required the power of Jesus acting within me, and through the love of others who are part of the continuing incarnation — that's this congregation.

At St. James, I met Jesus – not in private study or on a mountain top talking with a guru - but in this community – amongst all of you – in worship, at Eucharist, in the EfM classroom, in Tuesday Bible Study, in Lay Eucharistic Visits, at Sunday breakfast, at Parish events, in centering prayer, at the celebration of Baptisms and Feast Days, and even during Vestry and Finance Committee meetings, not to mention the dozens and dozens of other ministries and programs that flourish at St. James.

And as that was happening, Jesus was changing my attitudes about a great many things, including giving to the church and how I view my neighbor. Jesus is with us all to the end of the age, and especially with those who suffer, including the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the sick, and those in prison; and, at one point or another, we all suffer.

Giving of time, talent, and treasure eventually transformed into my affirmation that I am a follower, however faltering at times and imperfect, of Jesus Christ, who created us, forgave us our sins, and gave us salvation, not as a reward, but as free gift to all in divine love. That affirmation, and the deepening realization of its truth, has now become for me an expression of great joy. Perhaps that is what St. Paul meant by a "cheerful giver."





Hall of Rectors enters new century Two new portraits are joining the hall of rectors, thanks to St. Anne's Chapter.

Pictures of the rectors of St. James from the 1840s forward have hitherto been in black and white. The technical innovation of color



was not introduced, presumably to give the display a tasteful uniformity.

Now that one wall is full, Cari Edwards says, St. Anne's begins a new wall for the new century.

By this Sunday or next, our first two rectors appointed in the 21st century, Roger Allen and Mariclair Partee Carlsen, will be on display.

Call for Vestry Nominations

At our Annual Meeting on Nov 15, 2025, we will be electing 4 new vestry members.

Candidates for Vestry must be a member of St. James in good standing, which means:

- Not less than 18 years of age
- Baptized, as recognized by the Episcopal Church
- Confirmed or Received in the Episcopal Church
- On the membership rolls of St. James either through baptism here, confirmation or reception into the parish, or a recorded transfer of membership from another Episcopal Church to St. James.
- A regular communicant of the parish, having received Holy Communion at St. James at least three times in the preceding year.
- Is known to the Rector or Treasurer as having made and maintained a financial commitment (pledge) in support of St. James in the preceding year.

In addition the Candidate should evidence:

- A commitment to Jesus Christ, the Gospel, and His Church
- Regular attendance at church services
- Good stewardship in all areas of our Church life
- The acceptance of responsibility to attend Vestry meetings (the 3rd Monday of each month at 7PM), annual Vestry retreat (Jan 30-31, 2026), and a commitment to complete one's term on the Vestry.

If you would like to nominate yourself or someone else as a Candidate, please usethis form. If you are nominating someone other than yourself, please first obtain their consent.

Pulse of the Parish

On his way from the parish hall to church Sunday mornings,**Bob Kuzniak** frequently sings his favorite hymns and songs of the Big Band era. He likes music to be "uplifting."

So he voiced some doubts about our use of unfamiliar service music by living composer **Gerald Near**. It wasn't uplifting, he said; it doesn't have a tune.

I pointed out that Near is emulating ancient chant. Bob appreciates the difference in chanting. Instead of fitting words to a tune, the composer of chant elevates the text, sometimes stre-e-tching syllables for emphasis. A communion hymn for a recent service was like that, "Where true cha-a-rity and lo-ove dwell" (Hymnal 606). Unlike tunes, made of repeated phrases with chords and a beat, a chant is all melody, smooth and sweet. Our word *melody* derives from *meli*, the Greek word for honey.

Bob conceded that some songs are uplifting even when they don't swing like the Spiritual that the choir sang last week. There's a piece Bob loves, with instruments playing chords under a flute melody. It all builds slowly to a high point, then falls. It's not a tune, but it's very musical and uplifting.

This week, by coincidence, the choir's anthem follows that same trajectory, reaching a climax at the text "They shall mount up with wings as eagles" (Isaiah 40:31): the voices rise while the chords in the organ add glorious color to the eagle's flight. Guess who wrote it? Gerald Near!

Bob also conceded, as we'll be singing this music through late November, "I'll get used to it."


Still, for Bob's sake, I've started sketching out service music that we might use in the future, based on Glenn Miller tunes. But we have to wait 16 years until Miller's songs go into public domain. Until then, you can imagine the Gloria to the tune of "In the Mood," and "Sanctus" \acute{a} la "Moonlight Serenade."
