

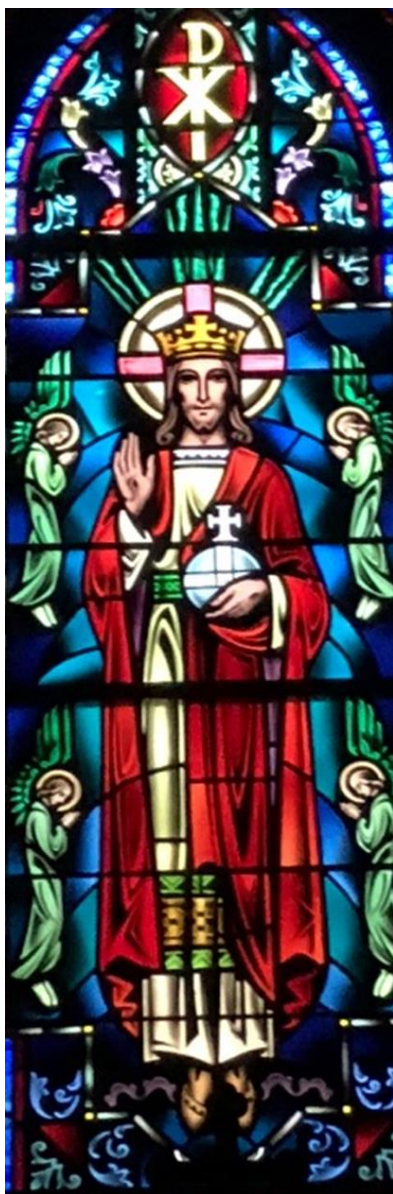

Homily

Nicene Creed *(Please note the language for the Spirit.)*

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

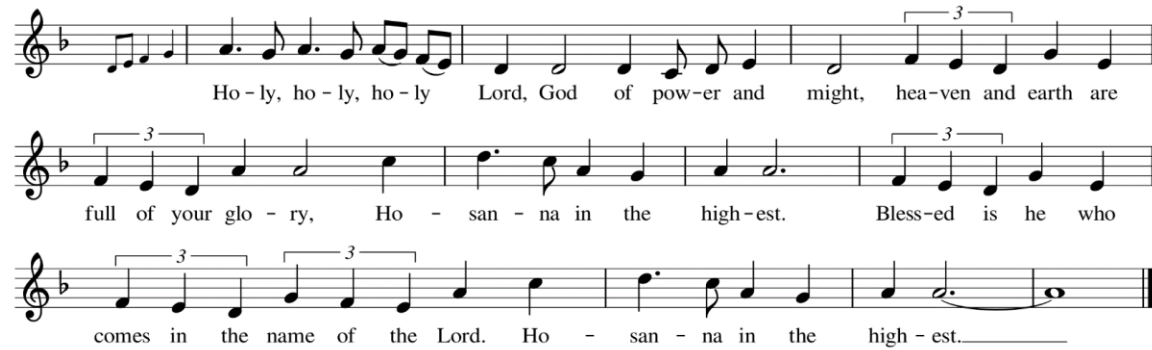

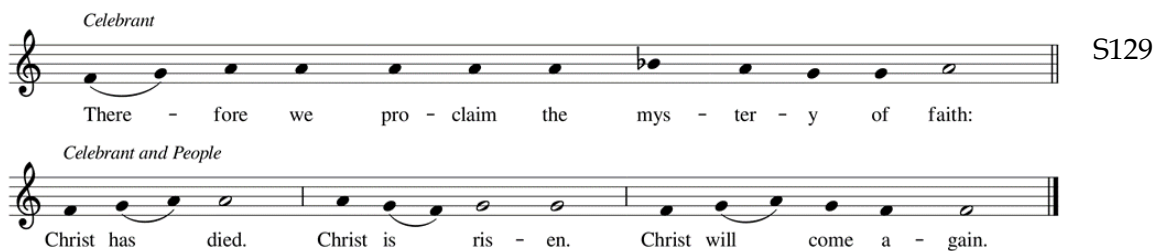


The people may stand or kneel as the Presider continues.

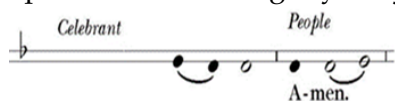

Last week, we received \$24,956 in pledges and offerings. That amount included pledges paid by mail, online through Give Plus, PayPal, and regular giving.

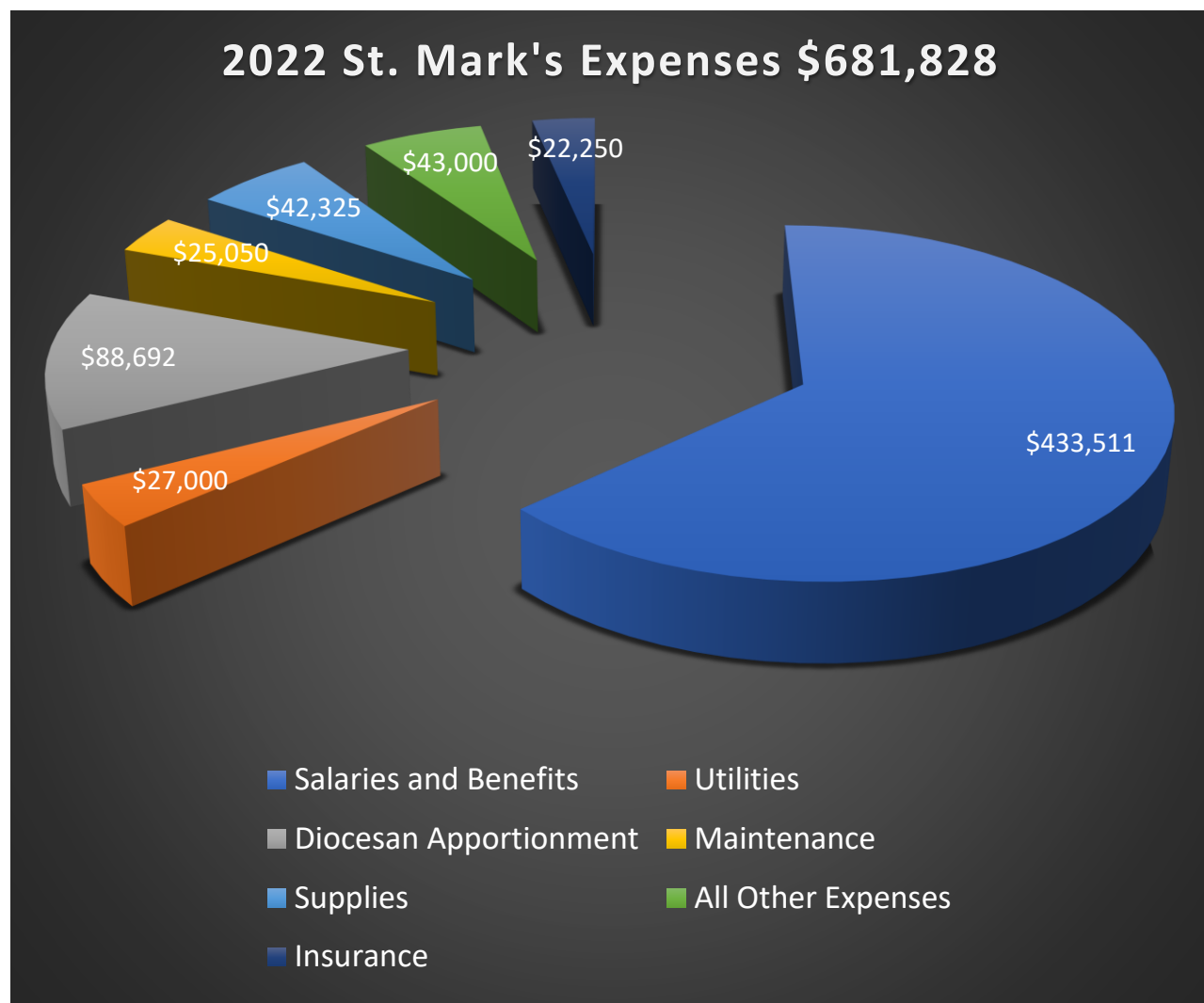

2022 Financial Plan and Needs

As we consider giving and needed pledged income for 2022, the Finance Ministry would like to provide important information regarding St. Mark's finances to inform our pledge decision. As part of our overall 2022 budget, **our goal for 2022 is \$500,000 for pledged giving towards an operating budget of \$681,828.** How did we establish a goal of \$500,000? First, let's start with reviewing our expenses in the chart below:



As you can see above, the vast majority of our expenses are salaries for our three full-time staff and eight part-time staff, our Diocesan Apportionment which must be paid to the Diocese of Western Michigan, as well as utilities and maintenance for our wonderful, but aging, house of worship. We then review the history of all of our non-pledged offerings and other sources of income to calculate what our pledged offerings need to be to cover those expenses. This year, we will need \$500,000 in pledges to cover those expenses. This pledged income represents 74% of our total income for the year and is the primary source of the church's financial health.~ *Finance Ministry*
