



Hidden Colors Part 1, which was given limited theatrical release in 2011, discusses the role of African and aboriginal people in history and reveals some achievements have not been properly recorded or credited to people of African descent. Hidden Colors Part 1 features several interviews from scholars and thought-leaders within the black community on subjects such as the race, slavery and unknown black historical facts. The 13th Amendment to the U. S. Constitution abolished slavery. But it also included a provision many people don't know about and that is what this documentary brings to view. "Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist." That exception justifies the use of forced labor as long as the laborer is a convict. This documentary makes the case that inclusion of this loophole is only one of the justifications for continuing domination of people of color.
