With 362 volunteer shifts in a variety of roles, you are certain to find a position where you'll have fun helping attendees and vendors. Whether you've volunteered for years or this is your first time to the event, you are welcome to sign up. We are currently sitting at 49%, with 178 spots filled. In order to keep our festival perimeter secure and up to standards for OLCC and the fire marshal, we need to have a person at every door that is accessible - that alone accounts for 24 people - each shift.

Volunteers get perks, such as free festival admission and keepsake wine glass -- plus a festival retail booth voucher after volunteering for two or more shifts. We also provide a free dedicated volunteer shuttle to the event.

"Shuttle Crew" helps collect fee when attendees arrive at the festival, answer questions and direct attendees to the right line to wait for their shuttle when departing the event. Paired with experienced supervisor.

Crew Size: 8 to 10 adults per shift. Donation: \$1,300

"Table Clean-Up Team" removes garbage and wipes down tables in the various seating areas.

Crew Size: 2 people per shift. Donation: \$500

"Trash Clean-Up Team" monitors cans around the event and empties/replaces bags and disposes into dumpsters outside the building.

Crew Size: 3 to 6 adults per shift. Donation: \$1,000

"Parking Money Collection Team" greets arrivals to the festival. Parking at the festival is \$20 per car. Collect payment for parking from vehicles as they enter the Fairground's General Parking Lot area. Another group handles traffic management. Crew Size: 2 to 3 adults per shift. Donation: \$600

Director's Corner - A Little Light "Reiding"

When businesspeople ask me why they should join the chamber, my first answer is always, "because the chamber supports the economy in which you do business." Okay, David. What does that mean?

It's a reminder that you can have the best business model in the world, but if the local economy is suffering, chances are you will too. And, while the success of your business plays an important role in the success of our local economy, it's hard for any of us to make a big difference alone. We're interconnected and always have been.

That means the best way to protect and grow our local economy is together and, as I've said in these pages before, there's no better example of "together" than your chamber of commerce. There are six hundred of us here and we've been working together for a century and a half.

That's not to say that the chamber is a substitute for individual effort and contribution. It's to say that the chamber is a peerless amplifier of individual effort. Lately that amplifier has been turned to a wide variety of issues, legislation, opportunities, and challenges. It has taken the form of advocacy, of match-making, of conflict resolution, and of education.

We've hosted trainings on Oregon Saves and the new Oregon Paid Leave program. We've provided support for the continuation of the Warrenton Library and the Clatsop Care District operating levies. We've provided our support to grant applications for the Port of Astoria, numerous non-profits, Northwest Housing Authority, and the Warrenton Fire Department as well as some critical infrastructure projects like tide gates and water lines.

Our brand new "Nonprofit Boot Camp", sponsored by Lewis and Clark Bank, is already serving five local organizations with three more waiting in the wings. I'm particularly proud of this initiative because every significant challenge in our community from homelessness to childcare has at least one nonprofit trying to solve it. Now we now have the tools to help them become much more effective in their work.

Of course, we have also spent a fair amount of effort trying to align the Oregon Board of Forestry's proposed habitat conservation plan (HCP) with the economic, societal, and environmental needs of Clatsop County. That has involved written testimony, advocacy work in Salem, numerous conversations with industry leaders, foresters, and elected officials, and live testimony. We testified last July, helped organize and attended testimony in November in Seaside, and then joined a large local contingent and testified live again on March 8th in Corvallis. I believe this particular piece of advocacy is vital for our economic future – the HCP as written is a major threat – and we are committed to continued work on it. But it's going to take all of us on this one. If you would like to weigh in, you can email BoardofForestry@oregon.gov or contact me if you have questions on this or other advocacy issues – like the proposed beer, wine, and cider tax increase, the alternate diesel fuel bill, corporate activities tax changes, housing initiatives, childcare reform and so many more.

So, this. This is what I mean by supporting the economy in which we all operate. The work is constant and varying and, frankly, more than anyone running a business has time to keep up with. That's why chamber membership is so important and why it's critical that our chamber remain strong for the next 150 years.

Now, let's get to work.


Leaders Circle Applications Close April 15

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National Public Health Week Open House

The Clatsop County Department of Public Health is hosting an open house Tuesday, April 4 in recognition of National Public Health Week on April 3-9, 2023.

“We are bringing together Clatsop County’s diverse communities to celebrate how culture shapes our health and well-being,” said Jiancheng Huang, Clatsop County public health director. Culture is the pattern of ideas, customs, and behaviors shared by communal people. Culture affects perceptions of health, well-being and illness, beliefs about the cause of disease, and our approaches to improve health.

The April 4 Open House is from 10 a.m. – 1 p.m. and 4 p.m. – 6 p.m. at 820 Exchange in Astoria. It will highlight services and programs the department provides, such as WIC, reproductive health, immunizations, health promotion, food safety, environmental health, substance use, tobacco, and much more.

The open house will have naloxone training and rescue kits, and COVID-19 and flu vaccines, and snacks. Facility tours, including the Mobile Medical Van, will be held on 10:30 a.m., 11:30 a.m., 12:30 p.m., 4:30 p.m., and 5:30 p.m. that day. [A full schedule of activities can be found on the Clatsop County website](#). During the open house, the public may provide feedback on local health services by completing a short survey. The first 100 people who complete the survey will receive a coffee gift card.

All services provided by Clatsop County Public Health Department are open to the public. Many services are no cost or low cost & no one will be denied services if they cannot pay.

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KMUN Celebrates 40 Years on the Air

There was around \$50 in the KMUN bank account when Harriet Baskas stepped aboard as the station's first manager. Now, 40 years later, KMUN is one of the few stations where she has worked that is still on the air.

"KMUN was and is certainly an alternative to commercial radio," Baskas says. "But it is also built very much on the true idea of 'community' radio in that the goal was — and hopefully still is — to be a local resource for a very wide and inclusive cross-section of the community."

Coast Community Radio, which includes KMUN 91.9 FM (Astoria), KTCB 89.5 FM (Tillamook) and 90.9 FM (Warrenton), is the only non-commercial community station serving coastal communities in Northwest Oregon and Southwest Washington — and on April 17 we're marking 40 years on the air.

Birthday events kick off in April with the launch of a book celebrating the work of local artist Barbara Grant on April 8. KMUN's Spring Fling Membership Drive will run April 10-21 with a goal of raising \$70,000. Donations keep the station humming and support KMUN's varied content — from bedtime stories to rocking music shows to local news. On April 14, KMUN is hosting a concert at the Larsen Center with eclectic singer-songwriter Nellie McKay. On April 17, Astoria Mayor Sean Fitzpatrick will be at the Tillicum House in Astoria to officially proclaim KMUN Day. And then, on April 22, we're throwing a birthday bash featuring live music, delicious food and plenty of memories. The celebrations will continue this summer. Warrenton Community Library is managed by the City of Warrenton and established its roots in the former Hammond Town Hall Building in the 1990s, moving to the current location in downtown Warrenton in April of 2017. We welcomed two new staff members in February 2023: Director, Josh Saranpaa, and Youth Services Library Assistant, Jenny Donohue.

Serving the Warrenton area through traditional and innovative services, our library enhances the quality of life for patrons through literacy and life-long learning while connecting people to their community and world. We are dedicated to serving the North Coast community by providing access to internet, technology, books, movies, music, and so much more.

A City of Warrenton library card gives patrons access to digital and print collections at Warrenton, Seaside, and Astoria. Anyone who lives within the Warrenton city limits is eligible with a piece of mail listing their residential address. Library wifi is free for everyone to access, inside and outside of the building, whether they have a library card or not!

The Library of Things library collection supports lifelong learning and creativity by providing the physical tools necessary to explore new areas of interest and learn new skills. Just some of the items we have available are puzzles, board and card games, musical instruments, STEM kits, a sewing machine, and a video projector.

There is always something to do at the library, for kids and adults! Come to storytime on Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays, and enjoy movement, songs, rhymes and stories. Then, stay for the open play group afterwards! For kids 2nd grade and up, Lego Club meets weekly on Tuesdays at 4 p.m., and Art Club meets Thursdays at 4 p.m. Science Club is held on the first and third Wednesdays of the month at 4 p.m. Programs for adults include Library After Dark (a local author talk series hosted by Friends of Warrenton Community Library), a Sit and Stitch group, and more.

The library hosts a used book sale, the proceeds of which go towards supporting community programs and library operations. This includes fiction and nonfiction, puzzles and games, CDs and DVDs!
