

JULY 4TH SAFETY FOR ANIMALS AND FIRST RESPONDER

We'd like to share some "Animal Safety & Awareness Tips" with all the first responders who will be out there working hard to keep us safe on the 4th of July:

- Be aware that there may be an unusually high number of loose dogs, cats darting across streets, and loose horses and livestock on rural roads.
- Animals will be in panic mode.
- Bright and flashing lights will immediately blind them so they cannot see your vehicle or you.
- Shaking a small bucket with pebbles, or horse or dog treats, may help you gain their attention and lead them out of traffic.
- Loud, sudden noises and honking horns will have prey animals in high "flight mode".
- Try to keep a group of loose animals together.
