

New Rochelle High School Graduation 2022: Remarks by Superintendent Jonathan Raymond

In many ways, the class of 2022 is – and always will be – very meaningful and special for me.

It is a world defined by climate change; political extremism and polarization; social, racial, and economic disparity; Ukraine; and, most recently, Uvalde Texas.

Class of 2022, your graduation today is an opportunity for you to take the skills you have learned here, along with your unique voices, to help build and preserve a more vibrant future for freedom, a better world where human dignity can flourish.

Remember, through education comes opportunity and empowerment. My hope is our faculty and staff have educated, inspired, and empowered you to become confidently and passionately engaged learners. Use your skills and voices to help address these seemingly intractable issues facing our community, our nation, and our world. And in so doing, you will leave lasting positive results in your communities, our nation, and perhaps for all humanity. As Mahatma Gandhi said, "Be the change you wish to see in the world."

You have much to be proud of, as you have overcome many challenges and obstacles. My hope is you take strength from what you have achieved and the difficulties you have overcome and carry forward the sense of community you have worked hard this year to help repair and recreate.

I've been fortunate to meet many of you, to see you perform in athletics and in the arts, participate in science competitions, tutor fellow students in our community, and engage in culinary and other career

experiences. I am grateful for the opportunities to talk with you in classrooms and hallways and early mornings outside of the Whitney M. Young Auditorium.

As a class, you have achieved many individual and team awards, as highlighted in celebrations in these past few weeks. But perhaps most importantly, you worked hard and did what it takes to get here today – you persevered through a global pandemic and a natural disaster. You represent the very best of New Rochelle, and you are already showing that you are leaders and have what it takes to help shape a better tomorrow. We are proud of you!
