What is Per Capita and why is it \$53.10? The Presbyterian Church is a connectional church. That means that we share in mutual ministry and accountability with and for each other. One of the ways we do that is by sharing in the cost of the denomination. This is done through individual assessments based on the number of members in each church. These assessments, called "per capita," are mandatory and are used to support the work of the General Assembly and the Synod. Those funds are obtained either from our general Fairmont revenues or from special offerings of individuals who wish to pay their share individually. The total per member assessment for 2023 is \$53.10. That is the cost of being a member of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) denomination as opposed to the local congregation. If you would like to directly pay your share of our commitment to the greater church, the amount per member is \$53.10.

World Central Kitchen in Turkey

In Turkey, the World Central Kitchen team is working urgently to establish kitchens & scale up meal deliveries—yesterday WCK brought flour, oil, and other ingredients to a restaurant partner in Iskenderun so they could immediately begin cooking hot meals for displaced families. The quakes destroyed thousands of buildings & left thousands more unsafe to inhabit. WCK delivered meals at a parking lot in Iskenderun where hundreds of people are spending the night. Brian's Nerdy Bible Notes on Faith and Law

Some things get lost in translation. When the Bible was first translated into English, the Hebrew word *Torah* was rendered as "law." That is a problem, because while *Torah* can mean law, it more generally means teaching or instruction. This has caused enormous confusion in Christian theology and misunderstandings between Christians and Jews.

Torah refers to (1.) the first five books of the Bible, otherwise known as the Books of Moses (Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy); (2.) the combined instructions for human life contained within those five books; and (3.) in a general sense the pattern of human behavior that God intends for human beings. The important thing to remember is that *Torah* has never been a list of criteria for salvation. Jews, both in Jesus' day and our own, do not believe that compliance with *Torah*, however that is understood, is how one earns resurrection. Instead, *Torah* is considered to be the description of the pattern of human life the way God intends it to be lived. *Torah* is a guide for how to live, not a guide for how to get to heaven. We are instead saved, according to Judaism, because of God's covenant faithfulness to us, not because of our faithfulness to *Torah*.

Torah provides instead a normative teaching on how human beings should live their lives and relate to God and other people. Implicit in this idea is that there is no clear distinction between faith and action. What we believe shapes what we do and what we do shapes what we believe. A normative blueprint for human conduct is therefore also a plan to nurture faith. These collected teachings are therefore God's developmental project to transform human life and relationships.

Torah did and does however function as the criteria for who would be considered a Jew. "Israel" can therefore be defined functionally as those people who follow *Torah*. In the early church there was considerable disagreement over whether gentile followers of Jesus, who did not follow *Torah*, would be required to submit to it. Paul argued strongly (especially in *Galatians*) that they do not and should not be required to first become Jews on the basis of scripture. Paul pointed out that the vision of the coming of God's Kingdom in Isaiah specifically envisions the gentiles as gentiles coming to worship God in Jerusalem, not gentiles who now convert to Jews. So, for Paul, the fact that gentiles as gentiles were coming to worship God was proof that the Kingdom of God was approaching through the work of Jesus Christ. As a practical matter the question was settled at the Jerusalem Council described in Acts 15. When Paul, Peter, James and the other apostles decided that gentile followers of Jesus would not be required to first comply with *Torah* with four exceptions. Those four exceptions, sometimes called the Apostolic Decree or the Jerusalem Quadrilateral, prohibit the gentile followers of Jesus from: (1.) eating from food dedicated to idols; (2.) sexual immorality; (3.) eating animals that have been strangled; and (4.) consuming blood (Acts 15:20). Those four prohibitions from *Torah* remain in place for all gentile Christians.


