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20th Annual Butterfly Ball Raises Record \$2.3 Million for Science Education

CHICAGO – (May 21, 2018) – The Chicago Academy of Sciences / Peggy Notebaert Nature Museum's 20th annual Butterfly Ball on May 4 was a tremendous success, raising more than \$2.3 million in support of the Nature Museum's critical science education initiatives that impact thousands of Chicago students and teachers. The Nature Museum honored Annie and Greg Jones, Edgewater Funds, with its fifth annual Leadership in Science and Education Award.
