

San Francisco Renovation Project Upgrades Facilities

The Jewish Home San Francisco’s new campus footprint is specifically designed to preserve and enhance the very best of our current facilities and introduce new programs and services in thoughtfully constructed modern structures.

Thanks to the ongoing support of our community to address the issues of aging in the 21st century, and the economics and policies that impact this stage of life, our transformed campus will encompass:

Updated facilities including 230 skilled nursing suites;

120 short-stay rehabilitation private suites; and

12 behavioral private hospital suites.

The new Lynne & Roy M. Frank Residences will include 115 assisted living apartments and 75 memory care & support assisted living private suites.

The brand new 45,000-square-foot Byer Square will serve as an innovative marketplace of programs and services such as a primary health care clinic; healthy aging and wellness programs and services; lifelong learning and engagement programs; care navigation and caregiver support; and The Square On-Line.

The bottom line is that we will go from serving 374 residents and short-stay patients daily to answering the needs of approximately 575-600 people per day. Furthermore, we anticipate that Byer Square, once fully operational, will serve thousands of individuals on a monthly basis.
