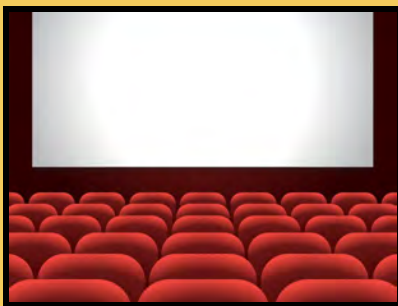

HMS Orchestra Concert

Just recently, the HMS Chamber Strings and grade-level orchestras had a concert at our very school. If you weren't there to see it, don't worry... there are always more to go to in the future! At this concert, all 4 HMS string ensembles played different songs. The 6th grade orchestra played "March Momentous" by Elliot Del Borgo, "Legend of Dark Mountain" by Soon Hee Newbold, and "Sunchasers" by Tanner Otto. "March Momentous" had lots of feelings and not only was it played by the orchestra, but also at the 1988 Olympics! "Legend of Dark Mountain" was a song that portrayed mythology and all the gods and monsters that make it up. There are many parts during this piece where the bass section (cello and bass) and the higher instruments (violin and viola) had what we call *arguments*. This happens when one part plays, then another, then the first again, all of this in a very loud and dynamic way. "Sunchasers" is a quick and happy song composed by Tanner Otto in his mid-20s. All of the sections have a great part in this song and according to some 6th graders, it is easy to get stuck in your head. They did a very good job playing all of these songs and it was really worth going to the concert to hear them play. One other ensemble, the 7th grade orchestra, played "Mahler's Mysterious March" by Gustav Mahler and arranged by Jim Palmer, "Ear-igami" by Richard Meyer, and "A Knight's Quest" by Loreta Fin. "Ear-igami" is by far the best one that they played as they played their instruments with blue pieces of cardstock. The song was very much like a Japanese traditional song and really reminded you of origami...but it

was for the ears, which is most likely why Mr. Meyer decided to call it "Ear-igami". "A Knight's Quest" and "Mahler's Mysterious March" were also very interesting songs that were mysterious. "A Knight's Quest" was very medieval and was dedicated to the cellos. "Mahler's Mysterious March" was a variation on "Mahler's Theme", which was "Frere Jacques" in D minor. 8th grade orchestra played very complicated songs such as "Get Reeling" by Neridah Oostenbroek, "Aurora Borealis" by Michael Hopkins, and "Boreas" by Todd Parrish. All of these songs were very impressive and the tune was really catchy. According to some of the 8th graders who performed "Get Reeling", it was not challenging to perform but the tempo (speed) was quite fast. Just like the name suggests, the song "Aurora Borealis" reminds the audience of the night sky and watching the stars. It turns out that in this piece, the violas have a bigger role to play than in usual songs. "Boreas" sends a chill down your spine and it was perfect for this concert as Boreas is the Greek god of the north wind. This song has a lot of staccato and as an audience member, I really enjoyed it. Out of all of the orchestras, Chamber Strings is the only auditioned string ensemble at HMS. They audition to play outside of the town and even out of state. This ensemble was one of few at middle school level selected to go to Peoria, Illinois to the Illinois Music Educators Conference (IMEC). This is a really big deal and is actually one of the highest recognitions a public school group can receive. At the concert, the songs that Chamber Strings performed at the concert were "Eleanor Rigby" composed by The Beatles and arranged by Larry Moore, "M to the Third power (Minor Meter Mix)" by Carol Nunez, and "Viva la Vida" by Coldplay, also arranged by Larry Moore, and all of these songs were quite impressive. "Viva la Vida" is a song that is still played on a radio. "M to the Third Power" is a very fast song with a great beat, and "Eleanor Rigby" was a song written by the Beatles a long time ago, but is still a great song.

Big Rewards for Small Art

On Wednesday, November 6, 2019, there was an art show called the Chicagoland 4x5 hosted at Oswego High School. The Chicagoland 4x5 is named so because all the pieces of artwork submitted must be 4 inches by 5 inches, and is also known as the “The Largest ‘Small’ Art Exhibit in the Nation”. There could be 2D pieces of artwork, 3D pieces of artwork (sculptures 4”x5”x4”x4”x5”x5”, or 4”x4”x5”), or relief work (a 3D piece of artwork slightly like a sculpture, and is carved or raised out of a material and attached to that background material). The show was originally only for high school students, but according to Hinsdale Middle School art teacher Mrs. McGee, “This is the *first* year the Chicagoland 4x5 program opened up the show to middle school and I am so proud of the amazing conceptual ideas and extraordinary skilled work the HMS kids produced.”

There were approximately 2000 pieces of artwork from mostly high school students and 15 middle school students, including HMS. place)! Hinsdale Middle School students had *more award winners* than any other middle school! 

Winter Movie Review

This winter, it's going to be a race for second place at the box office. Leading the pack will be **STAR WARS: THE RISE OF STARWALKER** with a projected domestic gross of over 800 million

dollars! Here are all the movies you need to know about that are arriving this holiday season: Coming out November 15th is **FORD vs FERRARI**.

This film tells the incredible story of how Ford motors beat a Ferrari automobile in the annual 24 hours of Le Mans. At the time of this writing, **FORD vs. FERRARI** stands at 91% on “Rotten Tomatoes”, which is very good. This movie also has a cast headed by Matt Damon and Christian Bale. Two sleepers that could do well when award season comes around are **A BEAUTIFUL DAY IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD** starring Tom Hanks, and **DARK WATERS** starring Mark Ruffalo. These

movies both place great actors in the leading roles, and are doing impressively with critics. Both movies have a score of over 90% on “Rotten Tomatoes”.

Another movie that could make a splash at the box office is the “kid friendly” **FROZEN 2**. According to “Rotten Tomatoes”, **FROZEN 2** is scheduled to make 500 million dollars in the U.S.

Serves: 45 cookies

Time: Depends

Notes:

These are icing cookies, so these go great alone but even better WITH THE ROYAL ICING.

Ingredients

Cookie:

- 3 sticks soft butter
- 1.5c sugar
- 3tbsp cream cheese
- 1 egg
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- ½ tsp almond extract
- 1tsp salt (kosher)
- 1.5 c all purpose flour

Sugar Cookies

- ½ tsp of baking powder
- 1 tsp cream of tartar

Icing:

- ¼ c pasteurized egg whites
- 4c powdered sugar
- ½ tsp salt
- 1 tsp vanilla
- Gel food color
- Water, as needed

Directions:

1. Cream together butter, sugar, and cream cheese on high speed for about 5 minutes until fluffy and sugar is mostly dissolved. Add the egg and yolks, extracts and mix.
2. *Sift* the flour, salt, baking powder, and cream of tartar into a bowl of dry ingredients. Gradually add dry ingredients into the wet mixture.
3. Chill in the refrigerator for at least 2 hours or 3-4 days.
4. Preheat the oven to 350 F. On a floured surface, roll out the dough to ¼ inch thickness. Cut out cookies from cold dough and place onto pan. Chill for another 20 mins.
5. Bake for 10-12 minutes. Cool completely.
6. Sift powdered sugar into a bowl. Put all the liquids onto one side of the bowl and slowly incorporate them . Divide into bowls and add food coloring. Using a piping bag or just a spoon (or even the dip method), ice your cookies with the royal icing.
7. Let them sit a while to let the icing harden.

Christmas Worldwide

Christmas is coming soon and we all know how we are going to celebrate (and if we are going to celebrate); however, there's a whole world out there with so many different ways to honor the season!

* **Russia** celebrates Christmas on January 7th because they follow the old "Julian" calendar. They do celebrate Advent but it's 40 days long, November 28th to January 6th. Christmas is also less celebrated than New Year's.

* **Pakistan**'s Christmas is celebrated but in memory of Jinnah, the founder of Pakistan. There are some who celebrate it as a private holiday (how most Christians celebrate Christmas) but Christians only take up 2% of Pakistan's population. Santa Claus in Pakistan is known as "Christmas Baba".

* **Sweden**'s Christmas time's festivities concur with the Swedish St. Lucia's Day on December 13th. St. Lucia's came from stories told by Monks who first brought Christianity to Sweden. St. Lucia was a Christian girl who was killed for her faith in God in the year 304. One of the most common stories told about her is how she brought food to persecuted Christians in Rome. Both Sweden and Finland keep up the tradition of the Yule Goat, which is built for the start of Advent.

*In **Latin America** there is a fireworks show at midnight of Christmas Eve.

*In **Greece**, on Christmas Eve, children play the drum, triangle and sing Kalanda, which are carols. The children will sometimes be rewarded with money, nuts, sweets or dried figs. They also have a traditional decoration which is a shallow wooden bowl with wire on its rim. From that rim hangs a wooden cross wrapped in basil. Each day someone, usually the mother, uses the cross and

basil to sprinkle holy water in every room in their house. This is said to keep bad spirits away, or 'kallikantzaroi'.

* **Estonian** children put their socks or stockings on their window ledges for little elves to put sweets inside on December 24th.

*In **Armenia**, Christmas is observed on the 6th of January, when they also celebrate Epiphany, the day of the revelation that Jesus is God's son. Some Armenians fast during the week before Christmas and then they have a feast on Christmas Eve, which is called "khetum". Santa Claus supposedly visits on December 31st because Christmas is seen as more of a religious holiday.

***Ghana** celebrates Christmas from December 20th to the first week of January. Over 66 languages are spoken in Ghana so there are obviously plenty of different cultures, that's why there are so many different festivities during Christmas time. December is also the time of Ghana's cocoa harvest.

*In **Guatemala**, on December 7th at 6pm, La Quema Del Diablo takes place. This is a ceremony where a model of the devil is burnt. On December 8th, there is the Feast of the Immaculate Conception.

*Christmas is also celebrated in the **Palestinian Territories**. Although only 20% of Palestinians are Christian, some Muslims do celebrate Christmas or are proud that Jesus was born in their country as Jesus was born in Bethlehem.

In the world as a whole, more than 2 billion people celebrate Christmas. Nine out of ten people in the United States celebrate Christmas whether they do it religiously or not. There are so many different and interesting ways to celebrate Christmas!

Christmas in Sweden

In Sweden, which is a country in northern Europe, (Ikea and Spotify come from there), Christmas is celebrated differently than in the U.S.

The name “Santa Claus” comes from Saint Nicklaus, but in Sweden, he is known as the “Christmas Gnome”. He looks the same, dressed in red with a big black belt, but one difference between Santa and Gnome is that people believed that there were gnomes working on their farm, so they put out porridge to feed them, not hot chocolate and cookies. Rudolph May get a spare carrot!

In Sweden, there is a special type of soda that is only available to buy around Christmas, which in Swedish is called “Julmust”. There are also multiple treats that can be sold at stores or made at home around Christmas, like “lussebullar (also known as Saffron Buns)”, Marzipan Figures, “knäck”, and many special holiday treats!

There is also a special event called Advent, which is every Sunday until Christmas (There is always the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th week of Advent, where one of candles lights are lit.) One every week, so on Christmas, there are four lights burning. Often a verse is said by the person lighting the candle that always mentions the light getting lit.

In Sweden, there is also a celebration on the thirteenth of December to honor Saint Lucia. The kids wake their parents up dressed as Santas, gingerbread cookies, “starboys”, and more, and at the front is Lucia, with candles in her hair and a red band tied to her stomach, dressed in a white gown. Lucia has a tray with cookies and other treats to present to the parents. Another holiday tradition is that there is also a calender for Christmas that everyone can watch with one new “fifteen minute episode” every day, starting on December 1st and ending on Christmas Eve. There’s a different show every year, and it’s like a cross between a TV series and a movie.



Christmas in Sweden is celebrated on the 24th, which is Christmas Eve in America. There is a yearly show that starts at 3:00 PM live on TV during Christmas Eve, with Disney sketches featuring Donald Duck, Mickey Mouse, Robin Hood, Santa's Workshop, and many others. At the end is Jiminy Cricket’s solo, “When You Wish Upon a Star”, and trailers of Disney movies that will be released the following year are played. Right after the show is played Santa comes to everyone's house with packages that he personally gives out.

Previously in Sweden, there used to be a Christmas goat at everyone's house, instead of Santa. If they had been good, the children got presents, but if they had been bad they got whipped. You now buy or make Christmas goats out of straw, with red ribbons to hold it together.

In Sweden, there are no stockings, because you are handed the packages directly from Santa. Some are put under the Christmas tree, if Santa doesn’t have time or if the present is too big or too heavy for the sack that Santa carries, or if the parents “find” packages somewhere.

This is how different Christmas in Sweden is from Christmas in the U.S.

The Jewish Festival of Lights



Christmas isn't the only big holiday coming up. Hanukkah, a major Jewish holiday, is beginning on December 22nd! Hanukkah is one of the most well known Jewish holidays. This is celebrated by lighting a menorah (which is a candelabrum) with 9 branches. Typically one branch is put up higher, and the candle of that branch is used to light the others. Hanukkah is a celebration of the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem. In 598 BC, the Babylonians attacked Jerusalem and destroyed the first temple that was built in Jerusalem. The Babylonians had sacked the city, and exiled all Jews from Jerusalem. It was not until King Cyrus of Persia passed an edict that allowed the Jews to return from their exile

that the Second Temple of Jerusalem was reconstructed. This is the main focus of Hanukkah, and the miracles that allowed the Jews to return to the Holy Land.

When celebrating Hanukkah, a candle is lit at sundown each day for eight days. The menorah is representative of the menorah that was lit in the Temple, which blazed for eight days when there was only enough oil to burn for one day. It is also representative of the seven days of creation, with the center candle representing the Sabbath. The Sabbath is the observance of the biblical creation of heaven.

Aside from the lighting of the menorah, there are multiple rituals for Hanukkah. One of these rituals is *pirsum hanes*, or the proclamation of the miracles that occurred when the Second Temple was built. The food that is eaten is mostly oil based, serving as a symbol of the oil based flame that was made for the Temple menorah. These include potato pancakes (known as Latkes), and jelly doughnuts called sufganiyot. Today some families also give children small gifts, one for each of the eight days of the celebration. Hanukkah is an ancient and fascinating holiday, with personal relevance to millions. So, to everyone celebrating something this month, Happy Holidays!

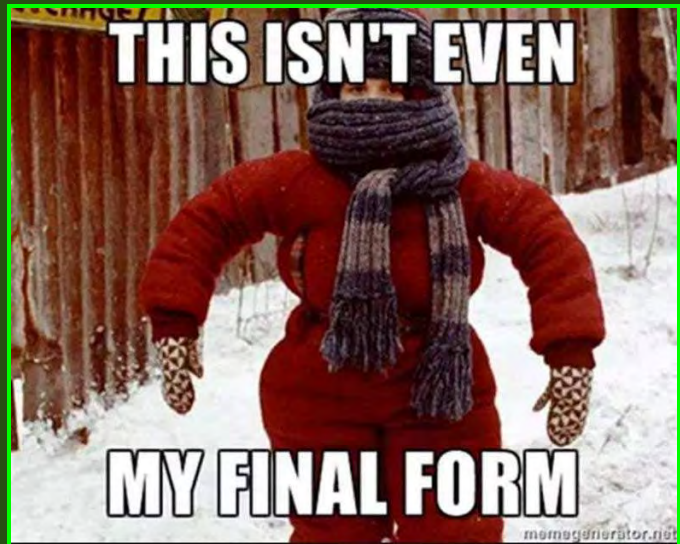
