The CDC loosened mask requirements for those fully vaccinated. And, as you read this, we most likely celebrated our first indoor service since last March. It is a bittersweet moment in time – a small beginning to a long period of things being different.


Most importantly, though, we celebrate our community which helped us through these troubling times. We have choices for worship: we can gather on Zoom or come together indoors or join via Livestream. The key, though, is our gathering during our Zoom coffee hour. Community binds us and makes us Transfiguration, and Zoom, at least for now, is the best way for everyone to get together and share stories, birthday and anniversary wishes, and other important announcements.

We spent Tuesday getting the worship space ready for our Pentecost service, our first service indoors since last March. We decked it with festive furnishings from prior years. We also arranged the chairs to facilitate social distancing and make it easy for families, couples, and singles to sit safely. The church looks like what it is, a sanctuary ready for the congregation.

Pentecost is a festive service, a joyful time, hearkening to the disciples' experiences in the upper room. Our church becomes our upper room where we can experience the Holy Spirit. There is a prayer that asks,

*When was the last time  
that we heard the wind of your Spirit

When was the last time

We have felt the Holy Spirit throughout the pandemic. And now, we anticipate encountering the movement of the Spirit in our church. It is a blessing, a gift. We gather to celebrate that first Pentecost; we pray that we too will also experience the inbreaking of the Holy Spirit, empowering us to light a path that helps change us and the world.



The Spirit came, and our church was born. It came and quelled the disciples' fears. The Spirit came and fed the disciples, and we pray that it comes to feed our hungry hearts. The Spirit came and transformed a frightened community, and we hope that it comes and transforms ours. We pray that the Holy Spirit renews the fire within us to become the church Jesus desired.

We are not the only ones who will gather at Transfiguration as we head into the summer months. In mid-June, the Carey School will move into the downstairs classroom space. We could not ask for a better partner to work with us during this in-between time. As many of you know, the Carey School is a highly respected private elementary school. They will use the space to operate their pre-school. Of course, we have access to a portion of that space and the playground on Sundays. I can't wait to hear young voices filling the schoolyard with joy and laughter.

A lot is happening at Transfiguration. I hope you find this issue of the Journey both informative and exciting. We continue planning to make this summer more typical of summers past. Given the challenges of the last year, I think everyone can use a bit of normality.



# AROUND THE DIOCESE

## DEACONS: THE BRIDGE BETWEEN THE CHURCH AND THE NEEDS OF THE WORLD *from DioCal News and Events*

*Servant-Leaders One of Best-kept Secrets of the Episcopal Church*

They minister to the homeless. They distribute food to people who cannot afford to adequately feed their households. They provide supportive services for the mentally ill. They work as chaplains in hospitals. They also serve at the altar, proclaim the Gospel and preach sermons in church.

They provide a bridge between the church and the needs of the world.

They are deacons, one of the best-kept secrets of the Diocese of California. Presiding Bishop Michael Curry recently called the diaconate a “sacred and core ministry of the Episcopal Church.”

The Venerable Hailey McKeefry Delmas has a keener insight than most people into what it means to serve in this ministry. A resident of Belmont, she was ordained as a deacon in 1999 and has served several parishes around the Diocese. She also served as a chaplain at Stanford Hospital and Clinics, was the first deacon to chair the Commission on Ministry, and has served as administrator of the School for Deacons for the past two years.



And to emphasize his recognition of the breadth of her knowledge and experience, Bishop Marc Andrus recently appointed Hailey as Archdeacon for the Diocese. She serves as one of two Archdeacons, along with the Ven. Nina Pickerell.

How on earth did she end up doing this?

“When I was in high school, I felt a call,” she said. Mary Lou Taylor, who was a graduate of the School for Deacons in the Diocese of California, led a convalescent home ministry. Hailey went along with Mary Lou once to visit some patients in a nursing home, and Hailey’s path was set. “She gave me a list of patients and said, ‘These are your people.’ And from that day on, I felt a responsibility for my people.”

Hailey later married and moved to New York, where she

again found herself active in parish work. “One of the priests there knew that I was trying to discern whether I should study for the ministry. He told me, ‘You can run but you cannot hide from God if you are being called.’ So I entered a program and came to the realization that my heart just was not into becoming a priest and running a church, but I was very interested in working directly with people.”

She returned to the Bay Area six months after being ordained in the Diocese of Long Island. She was placed at Church of the Epiphany in San Carlos. Three years ago she began splitting her time between Epiphany and Church of the Transfiguration in San Mateo, facilitating a growing collaboration between the two congregations.

Over the years her ministry spread to include California Clubhouse, which provides support services for people diagnosed with mental illness. She now serves on the board for California Clubhouse.

So what exactly does a deacon do? Most worshipers in the Diocese probably have little or no exposure to deacons other than seeing them assist at the altar when the Bishop makes a visitation. They prepare the wafers for communion, proclaim the Gospel before the sermon, and give a shouted Hallelujah at the end of the service. But what else?

“I’ve always thought that every baptized Christian, in response to their faith, needs to find a place to use the gifts they have been given,” Hailey said. “My job as a deacon is to get to know people and what’s going on in the world around them, and point them in the direction where they can do the things they promised in their baptismal vows.”

She said there has been a renewal in the mission of the diaconate in the past 30 years. “Deacons are almost like translators. The church often does not speak in worldly terms, and the world in turn does not speak in churchy terms.” Deacons act as the bridge.

No single job description could ever illustrate the work they do. “We are like part-time secret agents out to change the world. But every deacon does it differently, and that’s why there’s so much confusion. You’ll find deacons helping the elderly, helping the homeless, advocating for change through various organizations... there are as many ministries as there are deacons. Deacons are the reminder that what we all believe has to be translated to how we all act in the world.”



Hailey and fellow Archdeacon Nina hold Zoom meetings with the rest of the deacons every two weeks. “We have 65 deacons residing in the Diocese, including those who are retired. Of those 65, 40 are working deacons while the rest are retired but often still actively helping.”

One leads worship and a feeding program called Open Cathedral in the San Francisco Civic Center every Sunday; another is a military chaplain; one provides ministry at San Quentin; some serve as hospital chaplains; another works with the Braid Ministry for youth; some help administer food pantries or housing for the poor.

There has been a complaint in years past that, because most deacons receive little or no pay, only the wealthy can afford to pursue the ministry.

“It used to be an elite ministry, skewed toward older, retired people who were well-off enough to have the time,” Hailey agreed. “But that has changed. When I was ordained in 1999, most deacons were more than 60 years old. But we have many younger people now, and they are very good at letting us know what’s needed in the world outside the church.”

Hailey sees her role as administrator at the School for Deacons as an extension of her ministry. “It (the curriculum at the school) provides an opportunity for postulants to get exposed to and involved with many types of ministry, and then we push them out the door. We equip people to recognize the gifts that God has given them and to decide how they want to use them.”

If a member of the church seems to be hearing a call to ministry, what should she or he do? Speak to your priest, Hailey suggests. If, after discussion, the idea still feels right, there is a process for discernment. The Holy Spirit will lead the way. ## GOT RADISHES?

Radishes have a bad habit of all being ready for harvest at the same time. What do you do with the extras? How about the citrus trees you finally got around to picking, or, in a few months, all those zucchini?

A new organization in San Mateo County, Harvest for Neighbors, helps backyard gardeners maximize their food production by facilitating access to Master Gardener advice and resources. Individuals and “growing groups” in turn commit to sharing some of their harvest with a neighborhood food pantry working to provide fresh produce to families who need it.

In the City of San Mateo, Harvest for Neighbors has partnered with a “food runner” organization, GROW San Mateo. Their volunteers will come pick up your donated harvest and transport it to The Food Pharmacy, a project of Samaritan House which focuses on keeping people healthy by giving them healthy food to eat.



It’s easy—when you have extra produce (but before you harvest), just email Bill Schildknecht at [bill@growsanmateo.org](mailto:bill@growsanmateo.org), to set up a time for pick-up. Tuesdays are a great time to donate because the deliveries to The Food Pharmacy happen on Wednesday. Too much fruit on your tree? Not a problem; GROW San Mateo can take that too!

If enough parishioners are interested, you can create a “growing group” and have your own Master Gardener “mentor”—someone to answer your questions and lead discussions to solve common veggie garden problems. Your sister parish to the south, Trinity Menlo Park, has done this for the past year, donating everything from asparagus to zucchini to Ecumenical Hunger Program in East Palo Alto and The Food Closet at All Saints’ Episcopal Church in Palo Alto. After a year of Zoom calls we are looking forward to gathering in person later this summer for a harvest party.

Perhaps at some point Transfig can have an onsite church garden. In the meantime, take the opportunity to pick up growing tips, plant that extra row for the hungry, and take advantage of a great local opportunity through GROW San Mateo. 

**Hungry Hearts: Essays on Courage, Desire, and Belonging;** Edited by Jennifer Rudolph Walsh

Our next book is a collection of 16 essays and stories of uncovering beauty and potential through moments of fear, loss, heartbreak and uncertainty.

#### Description from back of book:

Over the course of four years, the traveling love rally called *Together Live* brought together diverse storytellers for epic evenings of laughter, music, and hard-won wisdom to huge audiences across the country.
