FROM THE RECTOR

“Follow Me,” He said, and they did!

Today I went to visit a parishioner who is unable to get to church on Sundays. I took communion, and the reading from Sunday to share with her. I realized as I opened the bulletin that it was the same reading we had used as inspiration for the Men’s and Women’s retreat themes this year. It is the call of the disciples. As I opened the text up and began to read it I was aware that this older member of our community was no longer able to get up and follow anywhere. So it was with humility that I finished reading about two men getting up out of a boat and chasing after Jesus. I paused for a moment as the story sank in, and then asked: “what do you think of that?” As though knowing what I was thinking, and fully aware of her situation my communion companion said: “well, we don’t all have to get up and follow him, we can follow him in here too.” She placed her hand on her heart as she said this.

For a moment I was a student again, learning from wisdom. An experienced and faithful parishioner knew exactly what was going on while I was still searching.

“Follow me” is our motto for our retreats, and it can mean as many things as there are people who read it. We hope that the Women’s retreat planning team are going to take it in their own direction. I don’t want to tell you what was said at the men’s retreat in detail (what happens there stays there), but I do want to share one reflection.

We all read this text from the perspective of the neophyte, who needs to get up and do some following. I wanted to talk to the men about this from a different perspective. I told them that as a group of 15 men from the bay area (and beyond, welcome back Matt Longnecker and George Philipp), they were



bucking all the trends by being at a church men’s retreat at all. This suggested to me that they didn’t need to drop what they were doing and follow Jesus. On the contrary, they had all made that decision years ago, and their presence on the retreat was



evidence of this. Most of you reading this text follow Jesus already, and I want to thank you for that, and thank you for the example of faith you give me day by day. That doesn’t mean that we cannot refine and focus our followership in various ways.

On the Men’s retreat we do a service project, which is a reminder that Jesus lived a life of service. One of the projects was to create a lighted pathway, and the other was to build stairs into a hillside. Both of these tasks will help other visitors to St Dorothy’s follow Jesus in future. Some of the pictures of these projects can be found on the surrounding pages. It is also nice to see someone following in the footsteps of another on the Men’s retreat, such as when Bobby Howie learned to shuck oysters following Brian Leckey’s example!

We want to explore this idea of what it means to respond to Jesus request to, “follow me,” as a community this spring. We have spent so much energy reimagining our site, and putting effort into creating new spaces for us and the community to use that it feels right to remind ourselves: why?



We are refreshing our site so that everyone can follow Jesus, without the barriers created by stairs or steep hillsides. We want every generation and every person no matter their level of mobility to be able to follow Jesus. We also want the smallest children to follow in his example of love, and will be creating an Early Learning Center to facilitate this. We want musicians and singers to be able to follow their conductors in our space, and create beautiful music that makes every one of us turn our faces heavenward and contemplate the Jesus we worship and follow. We want to make sure people can follow Jesus to peace in our buildings, and sobriety, and wholeness.

We are remaking this space so that we can follow Jesus better, and invite others to do the same. So we are spending some time reflecting on what following Jesus really means to us as we prepare to occupy our renewed spaces. I am going to be listening out carefully for the ways in which you follow Jesus. I hope you will deepen your appreciation of what it means to be his follower. So come on, he is calling, will you respond?

MINISTRIES

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Today's anthem for the Feast of the Presentation, sets the translation of a hymn by Rabanus Maurus—the ninth century Archbishop of Mainz (in modern Germany). In both the original Latin and Thomas Lancey's translation, the hymn is unusual in its meter, which consists of three lines of eleven syllables, followed by one line of five:

*All prophets hail thee, from of old announcing,
by the inbreathed Spirit of the Father,
God's Mother, bringing prophecies to fullness,
Mary the maiden.*

Classical scholars will be familiar with this as Sapphic Meter, so named because its first known use is by the Greek poet Sappho, who was writing around 600 BC. Ironically, during the Renaissance, various ecclesiastical authors condemned and sought to suppress Sappho's work because of her homosexuality—the word “lesbian” originates from her home island of Lesbos—yet her distinctive meter has been used in several significant hymns, not least the famous German Passion chorale “Herzliebster Jesu, was hast du verbrochen” (“Ah holy Jesus, how hast thou offended”). A modern text that also uses this meter is “We the Lord's people, heart and voice uniting,” which we sang weekly at the 10:30 service during Advent.

Because the final line of each verse has just five syllables, it is not long enough to contain a sentence, but instead has the effect of emphasizing whatever brief fragment the author or translator supplies. In today's anthem this includes “Mary the maiden,” “Christ long awaited,” and even the single word “Purification.” As the famous saying goes, sometimes less is more!

FROM THE DEACON

Tis the Season for a Litany

As we look toward Lent (which starts on Ash Wednesday, February 26), we encounter a beloved Episcopal tradition: The Great Litany. On the first Sunday of Lent, instead of saying the Prayers of the People and the confession in the middle of the service, we pray for the church, the world, the government, those in need, ourselves, and all of our concerns and regrets.

A litany is a type of prayer that uses petitions said by a leader and responses that come from the whole congregation. The term comes from the Greek word *litaneia*, which means “entreaty.” These prayers, which are often said or sung as a part of procession, may be broad reaching (covering a variety of concerns, or focused on a particular concern (for creation, for trust, for ordinations, etc.) We ask for delivery from all manner of problems: evil, sin, heresy, schism, natural disasters, political disasters, violence, death, etc.

It has a long history in Christianity. The first Litanies date back to the fifth century in Rome and was traditionally led by a deacon, with a bishop or priest saying the collects. The first litany written in English was prepared by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer in 1544 and was titled the Litany and Entreaties. He created it by taking an earlier set of prayers and consolidating into groups of petitions and responses. Henry VIII, who had commissioned the prayers, hoped that the prayers would allow for better participation in the prayers offered in procession through public neighborhoods. This set of prayers was also used regularly as part of morning prayer on Sundays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. When the 1928 Prayer Book was crafted to include the use of the litany before the Eucharist or on its own as well.

Despite its long history, we don't have to restrict ourselves to prayer litanies written hundreds of years ago. We can create and use our own prayers that follow these patterns and allow for call and response. for example, as part of our observance of International Women's Day (March 8), Transfiguration will be offering a half day retreat—and an opportunity to enter into a variety of actives including developing a liturgy for women. LENT BEGINS WED. FEBRUARY 26

New Buildings - New Holy Week arrangements!

Well the staff sat down to plan Lent, Holy Week and Easter in the club room at my apartment building on Tuesday and I thought we might do that cheeky thing that we always do: just repeat.

But that wasn't going to be the case. Every time we looked at a service and reviewed how we did it last year, we had to take into account our renovations in the hall and likely landscaping this Spring. So there are going to have to be some adjustments and we invite you to jump into them with us with both feet:

Shrove Tuesday, February 25th we will be joining the people of Good Shepherd for their pancake supper at 5:30pm. All of our youth are invited to help, as are our volunteers.

Ash Wednesday, February 26th we are able to have our **noon** service and a **7pm** service in our own church. Come and join us for this moving commencement to Lent.

Palm Sunday, April 5th we will have three services, at **8am, 9:15am and 10:30am**. Each will explore the themes of Palm Sunday in slightly different ways. Join us for passion and drama.

Maundy Thursday, April 9th we will gather in the memorial quiet garden patio at 6pm for a picnic, and then move into the family service area for foot washing. We will follow this with an abbreviated Eucharist in the Sanctuary followed by the creation of an Easter garden in the Chapel and the traditional stripping of the Altar in the sanctuary. This beloved activity will have renewed meaning as we will be stripping the altar we have just presided at. You cannot miss this. The service will be great for all ages as usual.

Good Friday, April 10th we will be joining the people at Epiphany San Carlos at noon for their liturgy for Good Friday, and at **7pm** our own choir and congregation will create a contemporary experience for Good Friday in our own church. We will be inviting neighboring parishes to join us.

Holy Saturday, April 11th: we will clean and decorate the church in the morning, and then hold our **Easter Vigil** service again at **8pm**. This is one of the most magical services of the year and promises to be full of dramatic moments, beautiful music and opportunities to deepen faith.

Easter Sunday, April 12th we will have our **9am Joyful Noise Eucharist for Easter** and our **11am Festival Eucharist for Easter** as usual. We will have a **smaller coffee hour between these two services**, provided at **Indian Springs park**, where we will also have our **Easter Egg Hunt**. This is due to the likelihood of our landscape will be under construction at that time.

After the 11am service, we will also be offering sparkling cider and prosecco and cookies, so plan to stay a bit and join us to welcome Easter in style.



RENOVATION UPDATES



Our contractors, The Bakirman Group, have been hard at work. Demolition and framing in the Parish Hall and Preschool have been completed.

When walking through the site, one gets a clear sense of the new floor plan. The front meeting room will have a beautiful view and the new conference room and lounge will be great break-out areas. Plus, the convenience of two accessible bathrooms on the main floor will be fantastic!

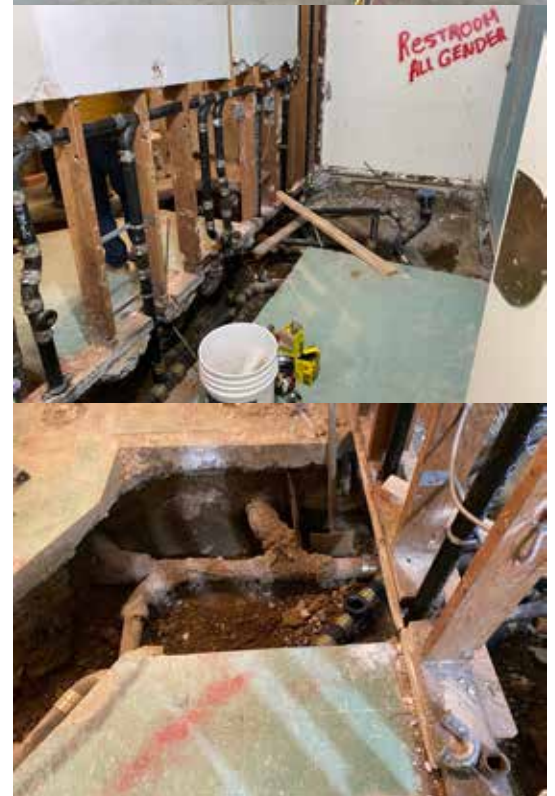
In the Transfiguration Early Learning Center, the new vestibule will be a sunny welcoming entry and the classrooms have been re-divided into three large rooms.

Currently upgrading and installation of all of our systems – electrical, plumbing, heating, fire sprinkler and even internet cabling – is underway. You can see here photos of the downstairs floors dug up for our plumbing upgrade.

Many of you have asked when the outside site work will start. All I can tell you right now is that it will be sometime after we are clear of major rainstorms.
