MY NAME IS JACOB TOPOREK, CLASS OF JUNE 1963, AND I AM "WEEQUAHIC-HIGH-SCHOOL-PROUD." I AM A MEMBER OF THE HALL OF DISTINCTION, INDUCTED IN 2019.

LAST WEEK, I CALLED A FELLOW CLASSMATE TO FOLLOW UP ON A PERSONAL INVITE I HAD EXTENDED TO HIM AND HIS WIFE TO ATTEND THIS RECEPTION. AFTER EXCHANGING PLEASANTRIES AND CATCHING UP ON OUR LIVES, HE INFORMED ME THAT HE AND THE MRS. HAD PRIOR FAMILY PLANS AND COULD NOT ATTEND. BUT HE SAID, "JAC, IF YOU DON'T MIND, I HAVE A QUESTION." MY RESPONSE, "SURE, GO AHEAD."

HIS NEXT WORDS SORT OF CAUGHT ME BY SURPRISE, BUT HE ASKED, "WHY A HALL OF DISTINCTION? I KNOW FEW OF THE 71 HALL MEMBERS AND THEY DO NOT MEAN MUCH TO ME. WHAT IS THE CRITERIA FOR INDUCTION?"

THE LAST ONE IS EASY. BEFORE MAKING MY ROUND OF FOLLOW UP CALLS, I SECURED THE CRITERIA FROM MYRA LAWSON, THE WONDERFUL EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE WHS ALUMNI ASSOCIATION. I TOLD MY CLASSMATE, "THERE ARE THREE SIMPLE GUIDES, GRADUATE OF WEEQUAHIC, SIGNIFICANT/NOTABLE CONTRIBUTION TO SOCIETY AFTER GRADUATION AND LASTLY, BUT NOT LEAST, FACULTY MEMBERS MAY ALSO BE NOMINATED."

AS FOR THE SECOND PART OF HIS STATEMENT, I RELATED THAT I, TOO, WAS NOT FAMILIAR WITH MOST OF MY FELLOW 70 INDUCTEES. BUT GIVEN MY OVER 26 YEARS OF EDITING THE WEEKLYALUMNI "WHS NOTE," AND RECEIVING THOUSANDS OF LETTERES CONCERNING MEMORIES AND MAINTAINED CONNECTIONS WITH SCHOOL AND WEEQUAHIC NEIGHBORHOOD FRIENDS, I VERY MUCH APPRECIATED THE THINGS THAT ALWAYS BOUND US TOGETHER. THAT IS, ATTENDING THE LOCAL FEEDER SCHOOLS AND THE HIGH SCHOOL, THE STREETS AND AREA WHERE WE LIVED TOGETHER AND OUR SHARED EXPERIENCES IN THE WEEQUAHOOD, EVEN THOUGH WE MAY HAVE EXPERIENCED THEM ON DIVERSE DATES.

WE ARE A COMMUNITY TIED TOGETHER BY OUR DAYS AND LIVES IN THE WEEQUAHIC DISTRICT. AND, I DO NOT HAVE TO KNOW YOU PERSONALLY. WE ALL CAN SHARE A MOMENT, OR MORE, OF A CHANCE MEETING WITH A SOON TO BE IDENTIFIED ALUMNI OF WEEQUAHIC HIGH AND A WELCOMED AND FEELING GOOD ALL OVER CONVERSATION RECALLING A MOST MEMORABLE

LIFE IN THE PLACE WE CALLED HOME AND THE SCHOOL THAT SERVED AS A BUILDING BLOCK TO WHO WE ARE TODAY.

THE ANSWER TO MY CLASSMATE'S INQUIRY AS TO WHY A HALL OF DISTINCTION WAS EASIER THAN I THOUGHT. IT IS SORT OF A TWO-PARTER. THE FIRST BEGINS WITH THE CREATION OF THE WEEQUAHIC HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI ASSOCIATION. HAL BRAFF AND SHEP BROSS GETTING TOGETHER WITH THE NOBLE NOTION OF FASHIONING A MECHANISM FROM WHICH TO BE ABLE TO GIVE BACK TO THE SCHOOL THAT PLAYED A SIGNIFICANT ROLE IN THEIR LIVES, AS IT DID FOR SO MANY OTHERS.

NOT ONLY DID THEY SEEK TO SUPPORT THE SCHOOL FINANCIALLY, BUT ALSO TO ASSIST THE PRESENT-DAY STUDENTS IN FURTHERING THEIR STUDIES AND TO HELP THEM SMOOTH THEIR OWN PATHS TO BECOMING CONTRIBUTING MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY.

AND, LET'S BE HONEST, THE HALL OF DISTINCTION, ITSELF, DOESN'T PAY FOR THE FULLFILLMENT OF HAL AND SHEP'S LOFTY GOALS. ALSO HAVE TO REACH OUT FOR SUPPORT FROM OTHERS FOR WHOM THESE GOALS FOR WEEQUAHIC ARE EQUALLY MEANINGFUL. TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE WEEQUAHIC LEGACY AND OF THE SO MANY GRADUATES WHO THROUGHOUT THE YEARS REALLY MADE, AND CONTINUE TO MAKE, A DIFFERENCE FOR FAMILY AND COMMUNITY.

SO, WHY NOT CREATE A RECOGNITION AWARD FOR GRADUATES WHO MADE A SIGNIFICANT/NOTABLE CONTRIBUTION TO SOCIETY AFTER GRADUATION? AND NOT ONLY FOR FUND RAISING PURPOSES. BUT ALSO TO HIGHLIGHT THE WEEQUAHIC LEGACY, MAINTAIN THE WEEQUAHIC SPIRIT, CONTINUE TO RAISE THE WEEQUAHIC BANNER HIGH AND MAKE CERTAIN THAT WEEQUAHIC WILL PROVIDE THE COMMUNITY WITH WOMEN AND MEN WHO CAN FOLLOW THE ROAD THAT OTHERS HAVE SUCCESSFULLY WALKED BEFORE THEM. AND, AT THE SAME TIME, HELPING THEM BECOME CONTRIBUTING CITIZENS OF THE COMMUNITIES IN WHICH THEY WILL LIVE AND RAISE THEIR FAMILIES.

PLEASE KEEP IN MIND THESE RESPONSES TO MY CLASSMATE AS I LIST FOR YOU MEMBERS OF THE HALL OF DISTINCTION. I BELIEVE, THEIR STORIES WILL GIVE YOU A TASTE OF THE DIVERSE FLAVOR OF OUR HIGH SCHOOL'S PAST. THAT PAST, IN AND OF ITSELF, IS ONE OF DISTINCTION WITH A CAPITAL "D."

I, FIRST, APOLOGIZE TO THE INDUCTEES NOT INCLUDED HERE, BUT IT'S NOT A SIGN OF DISRESPECT OR INTENDED OMISSION. JUST NOT ENOUGH TIME ALLOTTED ME FOR A COMPLETE LISTING.

DR. VICTOR PARSONNET, CLASS OF 1950, WHO CELEBRATED HIS 100TH BIRTHDAY ON AUGUST 29, REMAINS HIGHLY REGARDED AS ONE OF NEW JERSEY'S PREEMINENT CARDIAC SURGEONS. HE AND FAMILY WERE PRINCIPAL FOUNDERS OF THE NEWARK BETH ISRAEL HOSPITAL.

SID DORFMAN, CLASS OF JUNE 1937, IS RESPECTED FOR HIS 73 YEARS AS A JOURNALIST WITH THE STAR LEDGER AND FOR DORF FEATURE SERVICE, ONE OF THE LARGEST NEWS BUREAUS IN THE COUNTRY.

CARRIE JACKSON, CLASS OF 1968, A VOCALIST WHO HAS PERFORMED AT MANY TOP JAZZ VENUES IN NY AND NJ, THE USA AND ABROAD. SHE IS GIVING BACK TO HER HOME COMMUNITY BY PRODUCING AND PROMOTING MUSIC FESTIVALS IN NEWARK AND PERFORMING IN THEM, AS WELL.
