"We respect the earth, we do our best to keep it healthy, we're the green team", my nine-year-old self sang loud and proud dressed in a sparkly neon green outfit. When asked, I jumped up and down at the opportunity to combine two of my passions: performing and environmental sustainability. I had spent days scribbling down lyrics that would both--make an impact on the minds of my audience, and fit the beat of *Paparazzi* by Lady Gaga. At that moment, I was Lady Gaga and I was going to perform that song as only she could. Microphone in one hand and using the fingers of my other to snap along to the beat, the audience cheered; there were smiles, and to this day I cannot get that earworm out of my head.

Project Green Schools (PGS) has made a profound impact on my life. The student-led model it employs shaped me into the young leader I am today and has contributed greatly to the concern and respect I have for our planet. Starting at the tender age of nine PGS provided opportunities for me to learn and lead among like-minded students. From as far back as I can remember, I've been fascinated by the planet and its varying functions. "Miss Robin" visited the Pinecroft School when I was in kindergarten as a classmate of her daughter, Haley. Miss Robin read us stories, played games, and explained to my class the importance of protecting our planet. The lesson began with the emphasis on the simple, like remembering to turn off lights, and continued with information about the importance of recycling and ways to reduce our carbon footprint at home. "You can do this very easily by making small changes in everyday habits", Miss Robin repeated. I was able to organize an art show at my school, prompting my classmates to create music and art celebrating sustainability, while donating gently used books to our local library. Years later, this experience eventually led me to look at colleges that provided opportunities in Business and Fashion. As I applied to Marist College last year as a Fashion Merchandising major, I recalled with great fondness that PGS fashion show where I strutted down the runway with other "models" showing off sustainable fashions to the sound of applause from the appreciative audience. That experience inspired me to start my own upcycling business "2nd Take". In this venture, I obtained gently used clothing from thrift stores and repurposed or "upcycled" them for interested consumers. I now a committed student to Marist College, and I am eager to integrate fashion and sustainability as one of its newest Fashion Merchandising majors. I have already formed connections with club members and faculty who can guide me in this journey.

I am more than thankful that the lessons I learned from my participation in PGS will become a part of my future aspirations. I am grateful for those who stimulated in me an appreciation and understanding of the environment at a young age, and I believe this unique model is important to replicate for future generations of students. Action is the touchstone for any global movement. Rather than being a bystander witnessing the mistreatment of our planet, I am proud of being a leader in demonstrating to others the importance of protecting it.
